Learning For Living

As we come to the time for graduation, we are aware in this year of trial and trouble that high human values are overshadowed if not obsecured by war and disillusion. We, the class of 1940, have many reasons to be thankful that we are finishing high school at the present time. Behind us are the accumulated teachings of the entire civilized world. Behind us is the history of the Anglo-Saxon race, its courage and conquest, its profound earnestness and its stern ideals, Around us is a land of promise with its people of pride, energy, intelligence and interest in humanity. Before us are the scientific wonders of material progress and the spirit of freedom to direct the work of our own lives.
