


GHS lost its long-time guidance counselor when Steve Reed retired early this spring.
















CLASS HISTORY

For our final prom, we journeyed to the Shawnee Lodge for "An Evening of Elegance" on April 27, 1990.


We are now anticipating graduation and our future. As we prepare to say goodbue to our alma mater, we realize that we will never forget all the time we spent at Glenwood. —



The juniors believe that the prom was truly an "evening of elegance" and a memory that will last forever.





















The Tigers suffered two especially painful losses during the season. At Clay, a foul called at the buzzer gave the Panthers the









Todd's favorite college basketball coach is Bobby Knight because he "teaches the game the way it should be played." He dreams of playing for Bobby Knight at Indiana University. Another of Todd's dreams is becoming an optometrist. Since he maintains a very high grade point average that dream could very well become a reality.

When asked to comment on the basketball program here, Todd says that "I don't like (our) gym because we are a fast break team and need more space,"; however, he does like the gym due to the fact that "opposing teams hate to play in the 'den'." Being the type of player who likes to make it happen, he definitely likes taking the ball to the basket, putting up a reverse layup or maybe throwing one behind his back to a teammate.

Taking it to the basket he does—even way back when he was a 6th grade pee-wee star and scored 43 points in one game. Currently Todd's high school points record is 1124.

Todd is only 257 points shy of the Glenwood record. Todd scored 488 points this season so the outlook is good that he will break the all time record which is 1380. Todd already holds the record for all time leading assists (over 400), first freshman to hit a 3 point goal, and most assists in one game (16). He also has the distinction of being the first to score 1000 career points since 1972.

Todd has many career highlights which include: Athlete of the Year (back to back years) and playing varsity in his

freshman year.


He was experiencing the best year of his basketball career when tragedy struck on Saturday, February 24. It was the last game of the regular season when Todd began experiencing some discomfort with his left ankle. Thinking he only had a sprain, he continued playing in the game. It turned out to be a much more serious injury. Todd went to a specialist three days later and found out he had a break in the fifth metatarsal bone of his left foot. That was the night of the first game of the sectional tournament. His teammates went into the gym with their spirits high while Todd went into the gym on crutches and a cast up to his knee. For Todd, "It was tough to handle.

The Loper-less Tigers went on to win the sectional tournament. Todd's spirits were lifted when he heard the cheers of appreciation and encouragement from many New Boston fans as he climbed the ladder (with help from his teammates) to cut down his piece of the net.

Todd will be back next year in full force to continue making his mark in the record books of Glenwood High School.


