JUNIOR HIGH

Junior high school is a constantly changing world. The junior high student leaves his grade school days behind him--no more recess or childish games. Things move faster now. Now he joins in social activities, clubs and sports. He has several teachers, changes classes and is assigned a locker. He comes into close contact with people of various ages. As a result of these changes, he envisions newer, higher goals.

Not only is the junior high student a part of a changing environment, but he too is changing. He is not sure of himself or of what his purpose is. He is sometimes fearful of what lies ahead. He must overcome social problems such as shyness and a feeling of inferiority. He must accept new responsibilities which may seem too great for him to handle. He finds it necessary to look to his upperclassmen for an ideal--someone who has survived the trying and embarrassing moments of junior high school. From this ideal he forms opinions and patterns which help him overcome his difficulties and which help prepare him to be a future example of this journey through life.

And, what is his reward? The paycheck is small, the hours long, the effort seemingly fruitless. Perhaps his only real reward is a student's understanding and learning to mature. No one must be as dedicated and patient as a good teacher; without him, the progress of all other professions would be held at a standstill.

There must be someone to whom the teacher may turn

for guidance and assistance: the administrator. These all-important people, the teacher and the administrator, work together to keep young people in pace with our fast-moving world. They are the true leaders of our school--the men and women to whom we look for inspiration. They correct and criticize ... listen and help ... share their knowledge with us endlessly.

A teacher or administrator knows that he leaves more than facts in the mind of a student. Hopefully, he leaves a well-marked pathway paved with high ideals, lofty goals and the skills and motivation to achieve a successful foothold on life.

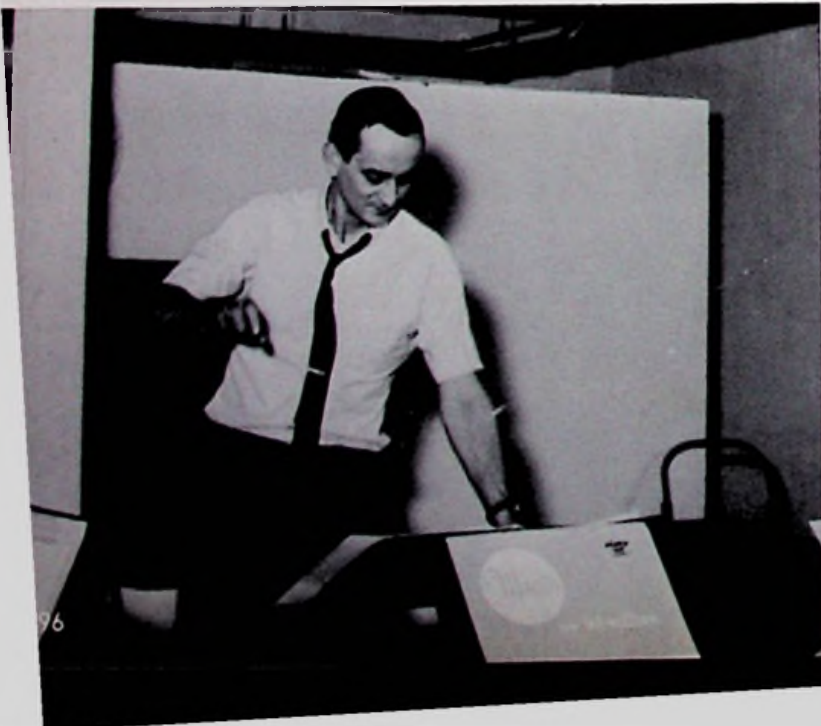

ELEMENTARY NONGRADED INTRODUCED

Not all students learn at the same rate of speed. In elementary school, where many pupils share the same classroom daily, this difference in learning aptitudes is a crucial one. In the past, a great tragedy of elementary education was that of the child who was "left behind" by his classmates - the fear of "failing" and spending another year in the same class. In the newer teaching methods, however, this natural difference in students is recognized and the "grade" system is abolished. The nongraded system places students with similar aptitudes together so they may be taught on the same level.

Previously, a student who was "retained" wasted a great deal of time reviewing, in the second year, subjects he had learned in the first. Now, the child who cannot understand one subject reviews only that which he does not know and can keep going forward in his other studies. Thus, in the new Aggressive Learning Program (ALP), just introduced at Minford, much of the boredom of school is eliminated for all children and each child learns more in the time he spends in school.

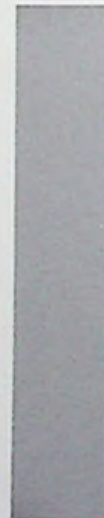

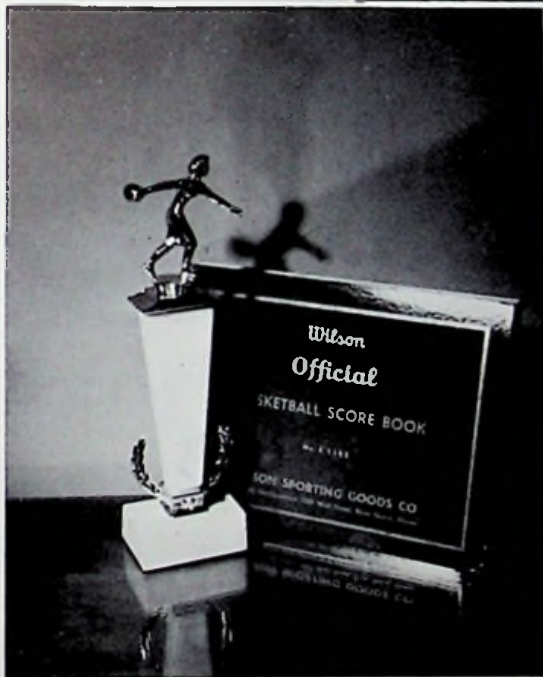

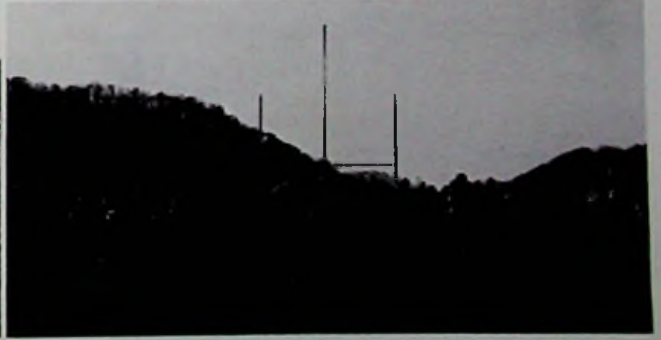
FOOTBALL IS . . .

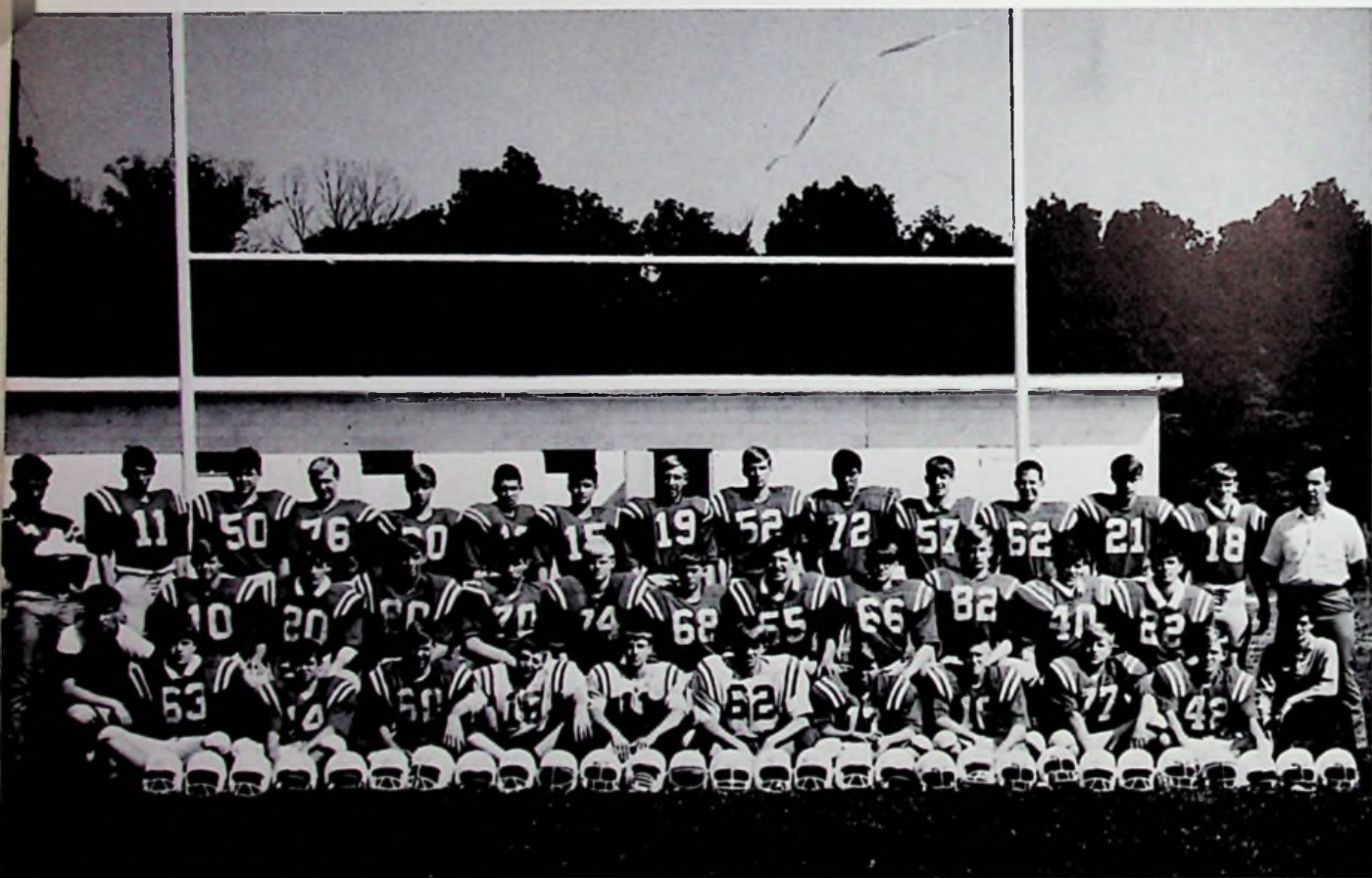

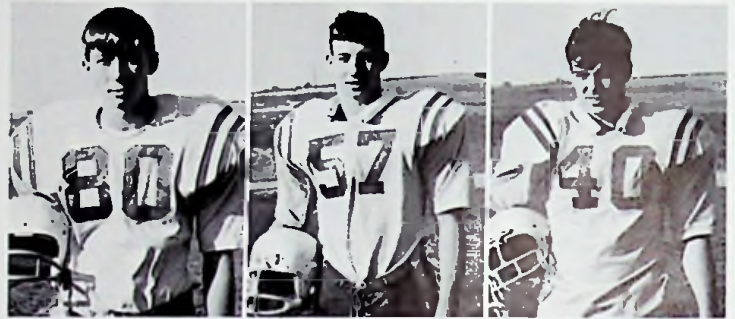

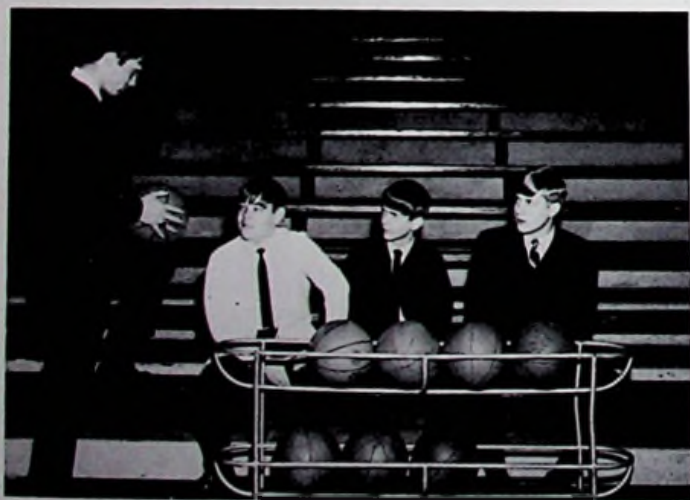
Basketball is winning and losing, celebrating and crying, and after a Tuesday night game, facing the faculty on Wednesday morning without having prepared your homework.

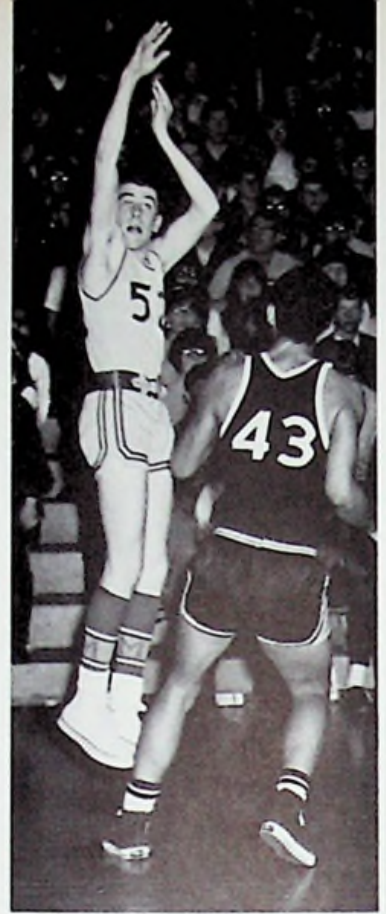

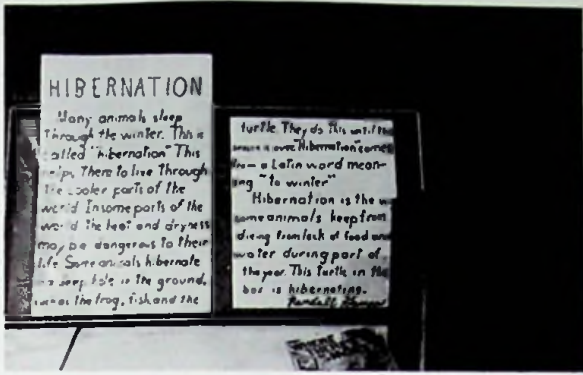
