## ELEMENTARY NONGRADED INTRODUCED

Not all students learn at the same rate of speed. In elementary school, where many pupils share the same classroom daily, this difference in learning aptitudes is a crucial one. In the past, a great tragedy of elementary education was that of the child who was "left behind" by his classmates - the fear of "failing" and spending another year in the same class. In the newer teaching methods, however, this natural difference in students is recognized and the "grade" system is abolished. The nongraded system places students with similar aptitudes together so they may be taught on the same level.

Previously, a student who was "retained" wasted a great deal of time reviewing, in the second year, subjects he had learned in the first. Now, the child who cannot understand one subject reviews only that which he does not know and can keep going forward in his other studies. Thus, in the new Aggressive Leaming Program (ALP), just introduced at Minford, much of the boredom of school is eliminated for all children and each child learns more in the time he spends in school.
