


THE REVEREND T. A. GOEBEL




Sister Florentine, organizer of St. Mary's first mission Unit, accompanies group of delegates to 1933 C. S. M. C. Convention in Cincinnati.

TECHNY, 1918— IN THE FLAT GREEN FIELDS TWENTY-FIVE MILES WEST OF CHICAGO SEVERAL STRAIGHT-WALLED BUILDINGS HOUSE THE TRAINING CENTER FOR THE SOCIETY OF THE DIVINE WORD. THIRTY VISITING STUDENTS AND PRIESTS FROM FIFTEEN SEMINARIES ARE ENGAGED IN LIVELY DISCUSSION.

THE PLEA OF CLIFFORD KING, A TECHNY SEMINARIAN WITH IDEAS OF A MISSIONARY YOUTH GROUP IN AMERICA, HAS BEEN GRANTED. THE CONVENTION HE PRAYED FOR HAS BECOME A REALITY.

AFTER THE OPENING ADDRESS A DISTINGUISHED SPEAKER, FATHER JOHN HANDLY, IS CARRYING THE DELEGATES TO NEW HEIGHTS OF ENTHUSIASM.

THE SEMINARIANS AND PRIESTS ARE DRAWING UP A CONSTITUTION FOR A NEW ORGANIZATION, THE CATHOLIC STUDENTS' MISSION CRUSADE.

CINCINNATI, 1920— It's always fair weather when old friends get together at an alumni banquet—especially at Mt. St. Mary Seminary. But what is this that Father Beckman, the Rector, is explaining about a Crusade Movement? The heart of youth must be directed toward the spread of Christianity throughout the world! Most of the Reverend Fathers have read about it by now, but father Beckman does believe in being practical, doesn't he? Father Tibertius Goebel, pastor of St. Mary's Church in Portsmouth, like every other alumnus, receives an explanatory letter and a number of pamphlets to carry home. 'Tis well that assistance from the Sisters can be relied on when he gets there!

PORTSMOUTH, 1920— SEATED AT A DESK ON THE THIRD FLOOR OF A STURDY RED BRICK STRUCTURE, ST. MARY HIGH SCHOOL, THE PRINCIPAL, SISTER FLORENTINE, IS BUSY AT PLANNING SCHOOL ACTIVITIES.

SUDDENLY SHE LOOKS UP. WHAT IS THAT HANDFUL OF SUSPICIOUS-LOOKING LITTLE BOOKLETS THAT FATHER GOEBEL, STANDING IN THE DOORWAY, IS GUARDING CAREFULLY?

AS THE SUPERINTENDENT EXPLAINS, THE PRINCIPAL LISTENS—FIRST WONDERING, THEN INTERESTED, THEN JOYFUL. A MISSION UNIT AT ST. MARY'S! A PLAN THAT CAPTURES THE SPIRIT OF A DAUGHTER OF ST. FRANCIS!

WHEN SISTER FLORENTINE IS ALONE AGAIN, THE LAST WORDS OF FATHER GOEBEL REPEAT THEMSELVES OVER AND OVER, "SEE WHAT YOU CAN DO WITH IT!" AND THE STACK OF MISSIONARY LITERATURE IS THE SPARK THAT STARTS THE C.S.M.C. ON ITS CAREER.

In the same year as St. Mary's first graduates left her doors, the C.S.M.C. was organized and the threefold motto of prayer, study, and sacrifice was adopted. Each class pledged itself to a definite financial goal. Year by year improvements were added; always the study of missions was emphasized. Students represented St. Mary's at Mission Conventions. Clubs within the organization were formed — Stamp Club, Remailers, Correspondence Club — Round Tables were organized; debates were held. A junior unit found hearty support from pupils eager to ransom pagan babies through the Holy Childhood Association.

CINCINNATI, 1933— THE BALLROOM OF THE GIBSON HOTEL HAS RARELY RECEIVED SUCH GUESTS. SEATED ON THE STAGE AMONG OTHER NOTABLES IS BISHOP JOSEPH SCHREMBS, THE MAIN SPEAKER OF THE CRUSADE CONVENTION.

Among the audience are Sister Florentine, principal of St. Mary's School, Portsmouth; Sister Mathia, moderator of the Senior Unit at St. Mary's; Sister Eustochia, moderator of the Junior Unit, and a group of St. Mary's students.

"Why be an apostle and a crusader? Your duty as a Christian can never be fulfilled if the salvation of the world leaves you cold and indifferent. As Catholics we believe in the true brotherhood of man. The fields are ripe for the harvest. How will you become true Crusaders? By your fidelity to Christ—Ian principles and to Christian Life."

Ingenuity effected continuous developments in St. Mary's C.S.M.C. At every monthly meeting a <u>CSMC NEWS</u> was handed to each student. Scrapbooks and Christmas seal sales caught the interest of the Junior Unit, while the Senior Unit supplemented these activities with Christmas boxes for the poor, membership in the Propagation of the Faith, penny parades, displays, projects — anything to keep all reminded that the world must be won for the Sacred Heart and that St. Mary's must do her share.

Each year the Paladin Jewel has been given to an outstanding Crusader. In 1937 Sister Mathia was presented with the Grand Cross, the highest honor that can be given for C.S.M.C. activity.



FATHER CHARLES JONES, GUEST SPEAKER, LOOKS FROM THE ALTAR RAIL UPON YOUNG CRUSADERS SEATED BEFORE HIM. IT IS A PRIVILEGE, HE SAYS, TO BE HELPERS OF CHRIST IN HIS WORK. AND HOW BEST ASSIST MISSIONARY LABORERS? BY BUILDING UP STRENGTH OF CHARACTER AND PERSONAL HOLINESS IN EACH INDIVIDUAL SOUL.

As the ceremony closes, Christ is raised above the bowed heads of today's Crusaders and sends them forth renewed in His blessing even as He sent the Apostles of old.

The Catholic Students' Mission Crusade has burned a message into the hearts of all who have left St. Mary's. The hope of to-day's graduates is that it continue even more active. God Wills It!
