## Trade and Industrial Education

O. M. GWINN. Vocational Supervisor

Are you mechanically minded? Do you like to work with tools and blueprints?

Students study and work in the "shop" of their choice where the correct use of hand and machine tools are taught. The work performed in the shop must be on a useful or productive basis under actual job conditions so far as is possible. Students are given individual attention rather
than group instruction in their shop training.
Approximately thirty per cent of the student's time in school each day is devoted to the study of trade technology which includes shop mathematics, science, blueprint reading, sketching and trade information. These subjects differ from general subjects in that they are designed to apply directly to the chosen trade.

The Trojans held the McKell's team scoreless in the first half. The Bulldogs' lone touchdown came in the third quarter. In the remaining few minutes, Mckell tried to score again, but an interception by Tom Adams blocked the drive and ended the game.

## CINCINNATI-TAFT OUTPLAYS TROJANS IN 47-14 LOSS

## Municipal Stadium, Sept. 23

Cincinnati Taft charged into Municipal Stadium on the night of September 23, defeated the Trojans, and then paraded back to the Queen City with a 47-14 victory.

The Trojan warriors indicated at the start of the game that this was not to be their night. Cincinnati Taft, led by a fleet of backs, churned up the gridiron at will with their lightning speed.
in the second quarter, a penalty against Taft placed the ball on the 10 yard line, from where Jim Fuller, on two carries, scored the Trojans first touchdown.

In the third quarter neither team was able to score. Taft did drive on the Trojan goal, but excellent play by Weaver, Foreman and Cranston halted the threat.

With only 6 minutes left in the game. Fuller hit Ray Pope with a 40 -yard pass to give the Trojans their second and final tally of the night. Bill Parker scored the extra points on a pass.

## TROJANS OUTCLASSED BY NO. 3 TEAM IN STATE, 32-0 <br> Evans Stadium, Sept. 30

The Trojans played Springfield to a 0.0 deadlock in the first half but let down in the third period to suffer their second setback of the season.

The Trojans played a brilliant first half. However, the power and the bench strength of Springfield began to tell in the third period, as it physically wore down the Trojans.

The first half of the game was played entirely on the Portsmouth end of the field as the Trojans were unable to move the ball beyond the mid-field stripe.

Over 200 students trekked to Springfield by special buses to view the game. The loss was a bitter disappointment to the loyal fans.

## CHILLICOTHE STUNS PORTSMOUTH 6-0

## Herrnstein Stadium, Oct. 7

After 39 years of football frustration, the Chillicothe Cavaliers ended the jinx which had plagued their school since 1921, when they defeated the Trojans 6-0.

The first half of the game was played on even

terms with neither team able to score. Chilli. cothe did manage to make nine first downs in the first half. but fine defensive play by Truglio, Cranston, Craft. Pope, and Fuller stopped the high-spirited Cavalier attack.

The only score of the game came with about 4 minutes left in the third period when the Cavalier substitute, halfback Jim Martin, took the handoff from quarterback Dave Smith, rolled out to his left, and threw a 22 -yard pass to Ron Hall in the end zone.

It was the first victory for Chillicothe over Portsmouth in 25 games. A 13-13 tie in 1923 was the closest Chillicothe had come to defeating a Portsmouth team.

## FIGHTING TROJANS SUFFER 40.16 LOSS

## Municipal Stadium, Oct. 14
