



The marks of Monsignor Casey's renovation are evident in all phases of school life, while Father Klinec's ever ready camera captures and records the highlights of the year's activities.







THE REVEREND LEO J. BENEDETTI Assistant Pastor, Holy Redeemer












C. S. M. C. ROUND TABLES

At St. Mary High School, the C. S. M. C. Round Table, an interesting activity, has been carried on for many years. A kind of Discussion Club, it is devoted to the study of Catholic Missions both home and foreign.

Membership is composed of volunteer students of the sophomore and junior classes and the entire senior class. Meetings, held once a week, add up to twenty sessions in a school year.

The prime intention of this club is participation in the work of the missions by acquiring a reasonable knowledge of their personnel and work. This can be obtained only through a study of them—hence the Round Table Meetings. At these assemblies articles from "The Shield", official Catholic Students Mission Crusade magazine, selected either by the Chief or by a vote of approval of the students, are thoroughly discussed.

The advantages of this sort of work are not few, as any member will testify. Aside from accumulating a knowledge of what missionaries have done and are still doing, a Round Tabler becomes acquainted with their problems and by a careful diagnosis and weighing of evidence, decides how friends at home can best help them.

Many articles also prove to be of lasting interest. Asked to name one of their most interesting, the juniors select "I Am A Lay Apostle Overseas" by Mary Louise Tully, in the January issue. The seniors prefer, "You Can't Live Without Pride" by Jeanne Crain, while the Sophomores hold out for "Up In Uncle Sam's Attic" by the editors of the Shield—both in the February issue.






