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



We are sure that Matt will agree, though, that trouble with a police officer is not half as bad as the trouble he faced at home!!!








MOVE OVER RICHARD DAWSON


Valedictorian, Lanita Lytten, delivers a teary-eyed address.




Valedictorian, Shelley Lytten, relives her special high school memories.








Dorlese Dicks, salutatorian, addresses the audience with memories which include her fifth-grade year.
















Hold on to the Night


VARSITY VOLLEYBALL


By the expression on the players' faces, things aren't going too well.



With the loss of seven seniors in 1988, they thought I989 would be spent simply rebuilding the TIGER team; but the TIGERS simply reloaded!


Conditioning began early in August. Practicing twice a day, often in 100-plus degree weather, the TIGERS were well prepared when the season began.

The team met with its only loss when they were edged out in the sectional semifinal game by a Wheelersburg team that they had beaten twice during the regular season.


Although the team did not make it to district play, they LEFT THEIR MARK when they won an unprecedented third consecutive S.O.C. title.



The 1989 New Boston baseball season started off at a standstill. Four of the first five games were rained out, but this didn't seem to bother the 14 guys on the team.


When the rain finally stopped and the season got underway, the players found out that they all enjoyed winning.




