











#### Saved the Best For Last





During the ceremony, scholarship recipients rise as their names are called. Nearly half of the class received an award or special honor.



#### It's Vocational



In younger days, math and science had nothing to do with each other in normal meaning, but later in high school the two make a difficult combination.




"Environmental Science brings all the science classes that I have had and combines them into one. It is really challenging so you have to work hard,"stated Chad Throckmorton.








## The Creative Way







#### Let's Get Physical

"P.E. was really fun since we got to play various sports instead of just a few. Health class was a big learning experience," commented freshman, Eric Kingrey.






## In Other Words

mas songs to sing to the elementary students during the holidays.






"NHS is more of a challenge due to the larger classes," commented Ms. Patrick, whom took over Mr. Davis' job after his retirement at the beginning of the school year.




## Cuttin' Up

"Now with the new technologies in the shop department, Industrial Tech is for those who are interested in something different. You not only get to work








The JOG and Peer Listening classes help prepare students for activities inside and outside of school. They learn aspects of life by helping others and practicing for the future.


Students, receive community service hours for their work. They get first hand experience on filling out resumes, job applications, and participating in interviews to prepare them for the workforce.








"My favorite part was getting to sing for the elementary students," stated




## Playing the Field


### Driven To Success








