



CLASS HISTORY

The class officers that were elected to guide us through the year were Esther Crowe, president, Eva Mae Martin, vice president, and Esther Cook, secretary and treasurer. Our class adviser was Miss Humphrey. We again gave a three-act comedy, "Dotty and

Daffy".

The fall of 1941 brought together thirty members, still in search of more knowledge. This time they chose Rosemary Brown for their leader and Esther Crowe and Esther Cook as her helpers. Due to the demand of some members of our senior class, chemistry was introduced this year. The seniors who took this course enjoyed their work very much. With Mr. Crawford as their teacher, they have performed many interesting experiments. As their stage production, the class presented a three-act comedy "The Meddlesome Maid", sponsored by Mr. Besco.

Thus it has come to pass, that of the forty-three members who entered in 1938, only thirty will depart, for verily, verily, I say unto you, that broad is the gate and wide is the way that leadeth to the High School, and many there be that go thereat; but straight is the gate and narrow is

the way that leadeth to graduation, and few there be that find it.

Four years hath the Class of 1942 sojourned in the land and gathered the fruits from the tree of knowledge. Now they depart, each to go his separate way, each to do the work for which he has here begun his preparation. We will endeavor to do that work so well that Green Township High School will always be proud of the Class of 1942.
