Crawford as their teacher, they have performed many interesting experiments. As their stage production, the class presented a three-act comedy "The Meddlesome Maid", sponsored by Mr. Besco.

Thus it has come to pass, that of the forty-three members who entered in 1938, only thirty will depart, for verily, verily, I say unto you, that broad is the gate and wide is the way that leadeth to the High School, and many there be that go thereat; but straight is the gate and narrow is the way that leadeth to graduation, and fow there be that find it.

Four years hath the class of 1942 sojourned in the land and gathered the fruits from the tree of knowledge.
