## TRADE AND INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION

O. M. GWINN, Vocational Supervisor

Vocational education prepares boys to enter trades and industrial occupations. Three hours each day are spent in the "shop" of the student's choice where the correct use of hand and machine lools are taught. The work performed in the shop must be on a useful basis under actual job conditions so far as possible. Students are given individual attention rather than group instruction in their shop training.
Approximately thirty percent of the student's time in school each day is devoted to the study of trade
technology which includes shop mathematics, science, blueprint reading, sketching and trade information. These subjects differ from general subjects in that they are designed to apply directly to the chosen trade.

## TROJANS NOSED OUT IN OPENER 66-62
