The 1941-1942 basketball season opened with our near rival Minford, the Indians emerging victorious $36-26$. As the season progressed the team spirit grew high, the fans became very enthusiastic, and the coach could see that the team had the proper coordination to win games. The squad consisting of five senior lettermen and several junior boys were handicapped by their size and height; nevertheless, they finished third in the Scioto County League with two Class A schools competing for honors.
Then came the classy Scioto County Tournament. With cowbells ringing and cowhorns blaring, the Indians were determined to give South Webster, last year's winner and a pretourney favorite, 'a run for their money'. Opening slow with a one point victory in the closing seconds of the game over Green Township, the Indians came back to down Otway $38-23$ in their second game. Then the 'fur started to iiy'. McDermott, tournament darkhorse, had upset South Webster by a ten-point margin and met the Indians. The Tigers were able to a iv.a we huaus in an exciting overtime game 34-32 to put them into the finals. In order to get into the finals the Valley cagers met the jeeps of South Webster. It was the day for the Senior 'Indians' as they went on the 'Warpath', and at one time during the game they enjoyed a 29 point lead on the Jeeps with the
final score being $50-33$. Betore 'cooling off', the Indians came back in the evening, scalping the Tigers $31-21$ to take the Scioto County Championship which was the second championship since the history of the county tournament, the other being in 1934. It was the second county championship in one day for the Valley team as the reserves won their title from Clay 28-27.

Next came the district tournament at Waverly, Valley taking Buckskin of Ross County to the tune of $48-24$, then meeting McDermott for a fifth time during the year defeating them 3423. In the semi-final contest with Western Rural (Latham) of Pike County, the tournament winner, the Green and White emerged victorious 45-28. In the consolation game which was the last game for the purple and gold, our Indians put on an exhibition tor the fans. Trailing throughout the game and six points behind (27-33) with four minutes remaining, they started and when the gun sounded the score was Valley 36--Peebles 33.

The Indians wish to express their appreciation to their coach, Mr. McKenzie, for his fine work this year. This being Mr. McKenzie's first year as athletic coach at Valley, they realize that it is an especial honor to be called "champs."
