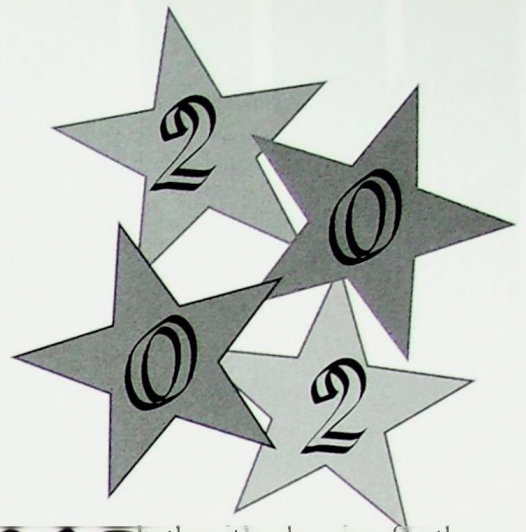

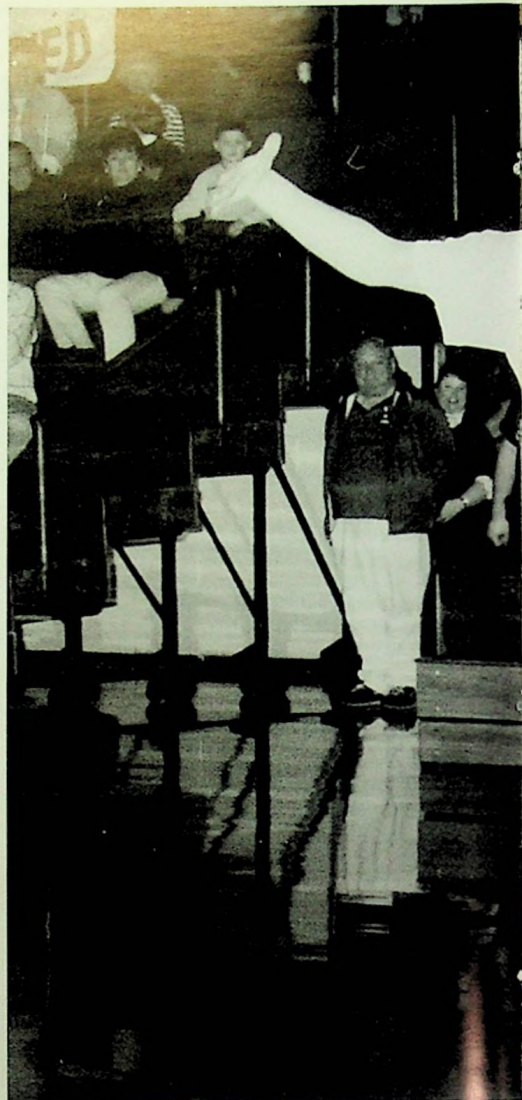

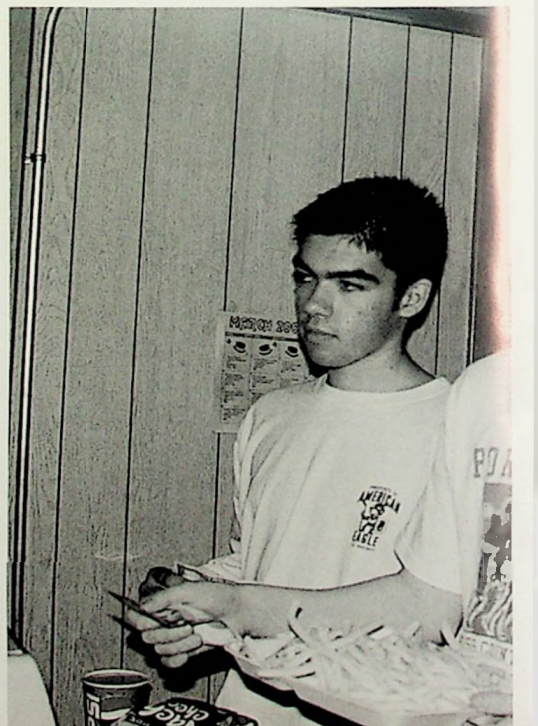

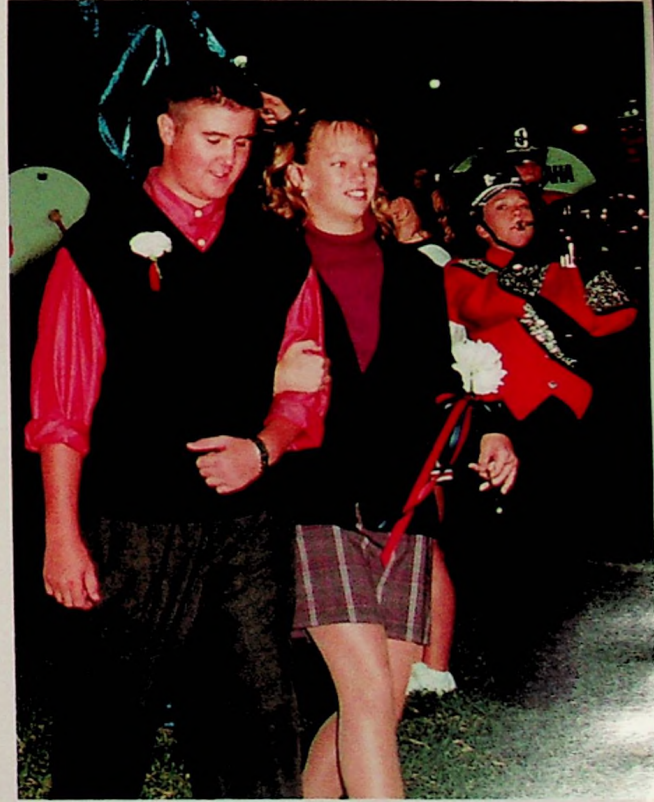
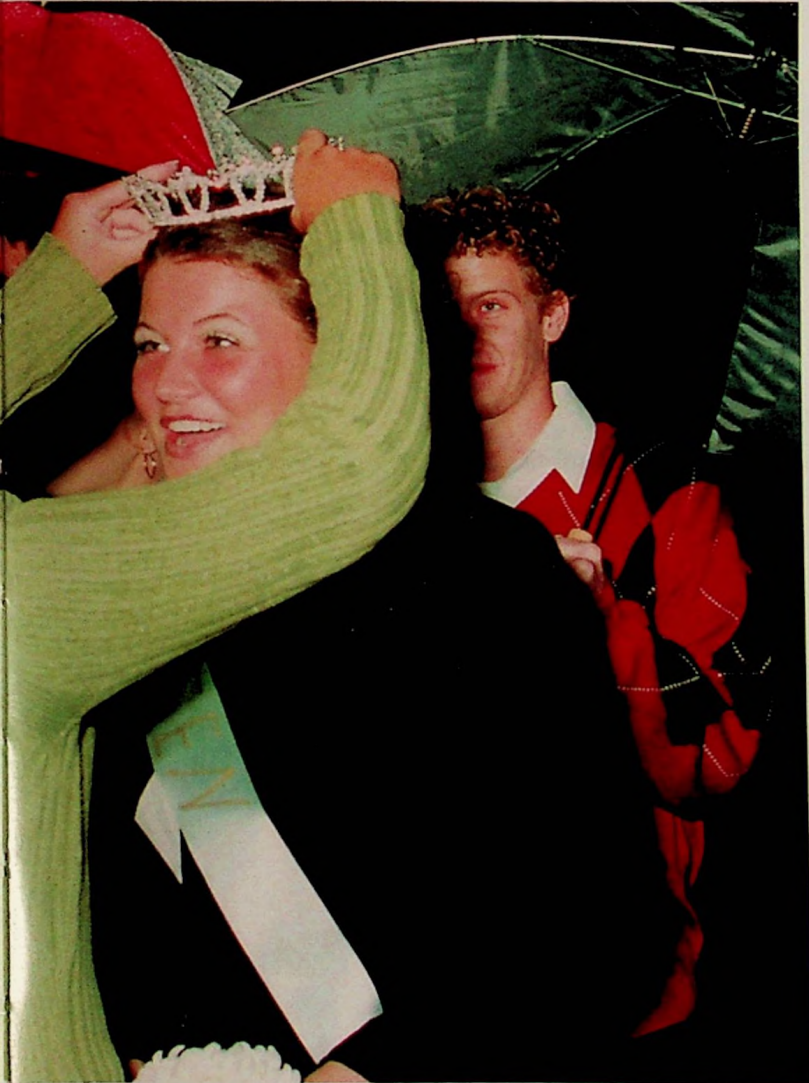
Oh, What a Night!

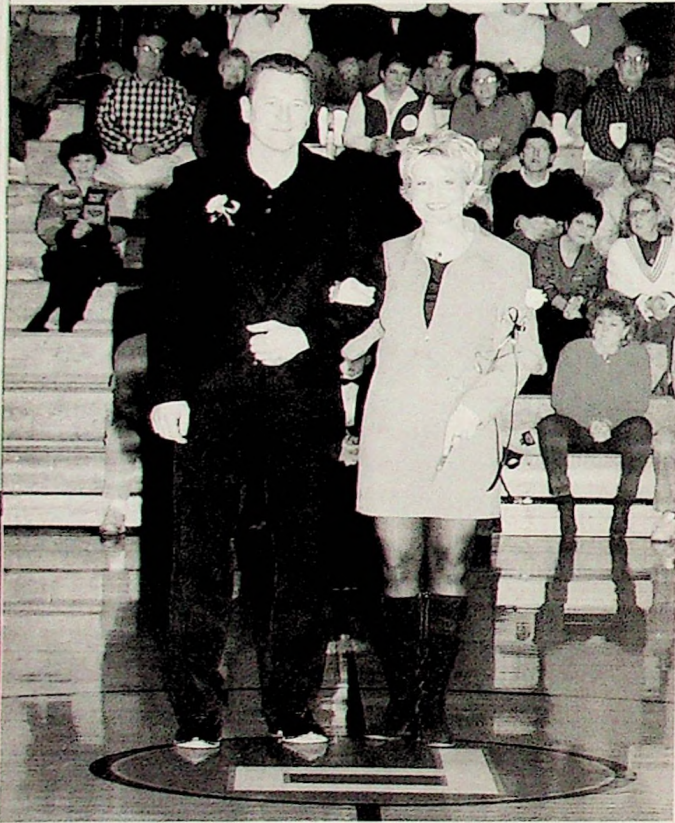

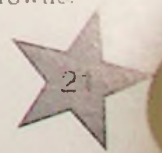

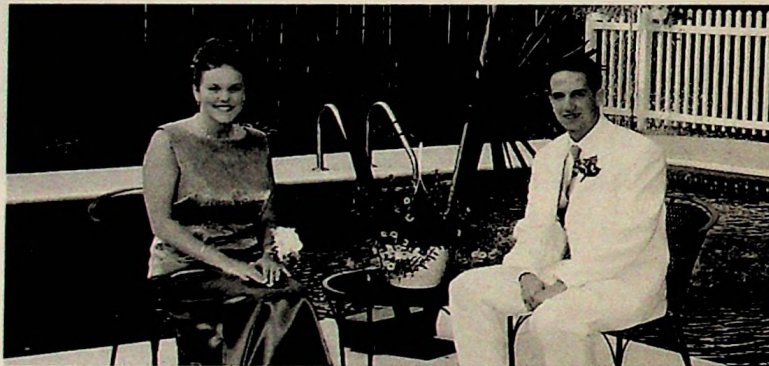

Night on the Town

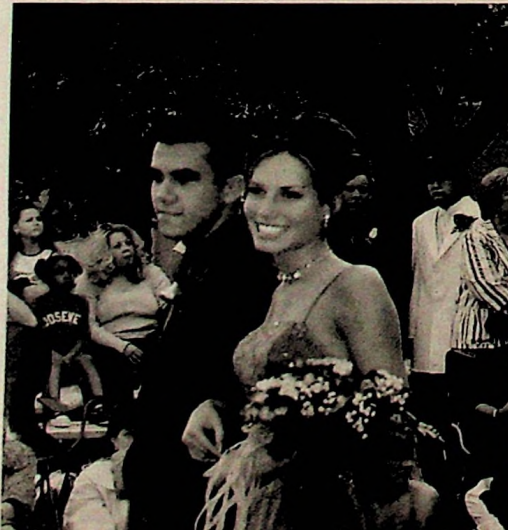

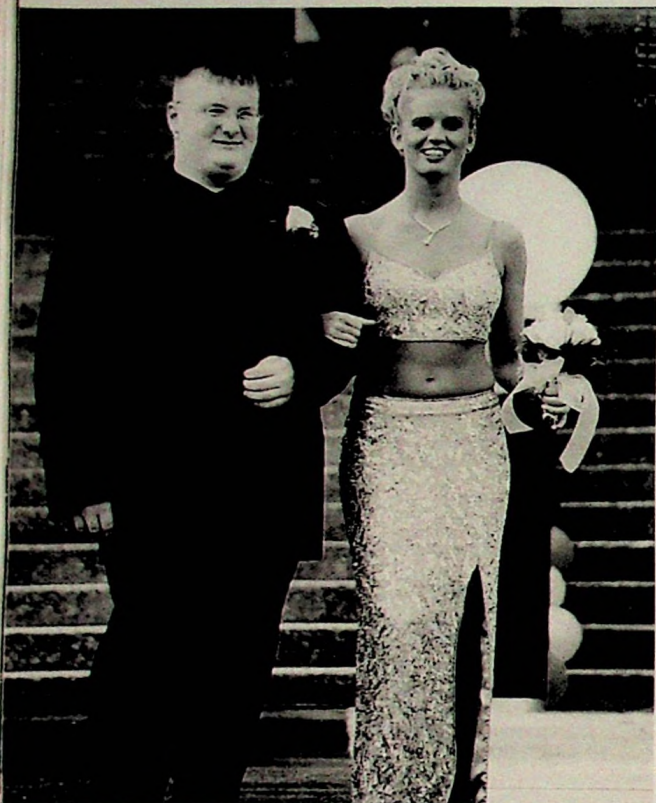

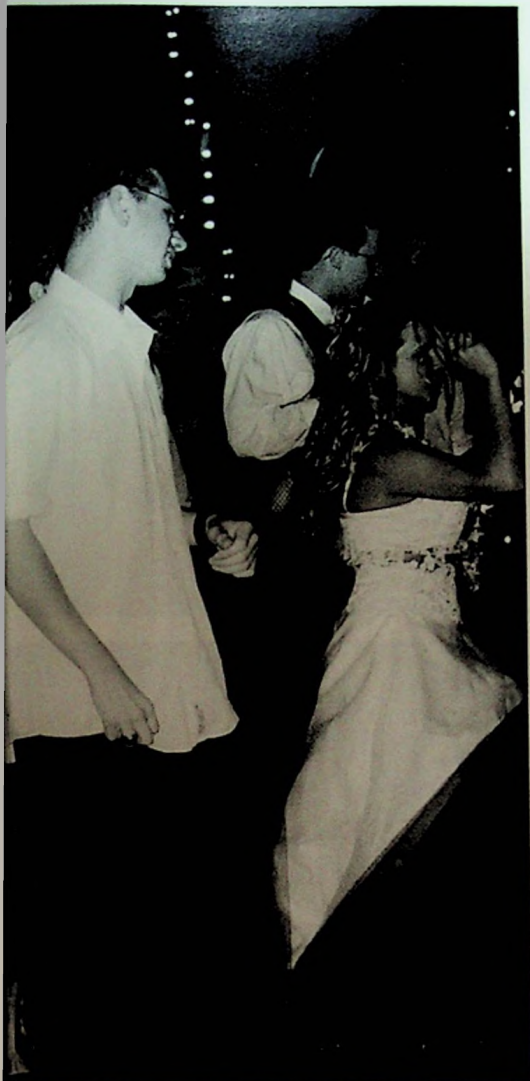

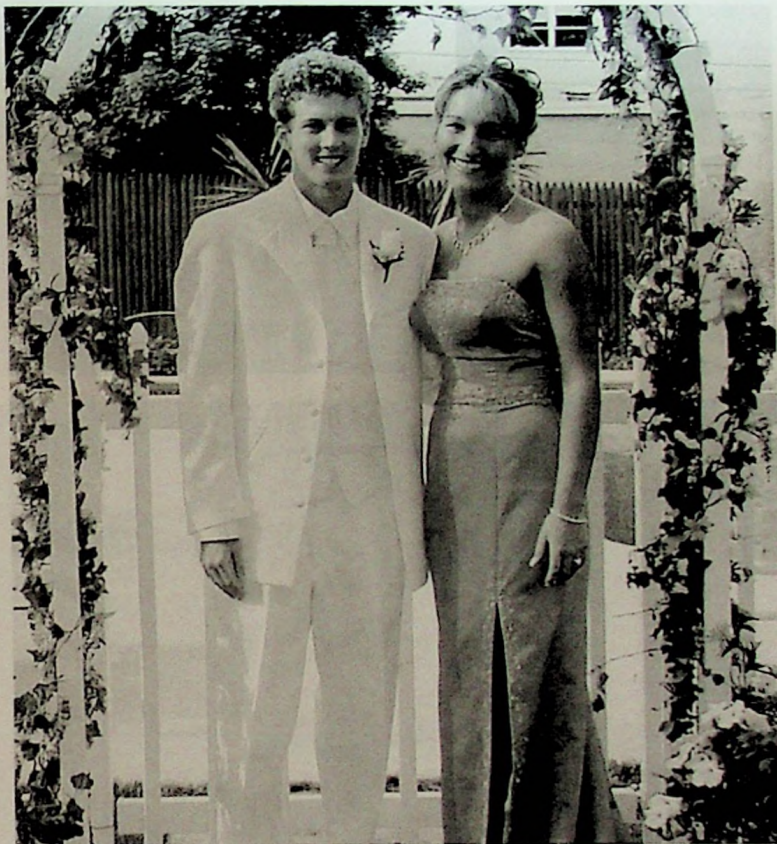

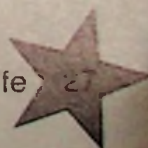

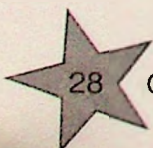

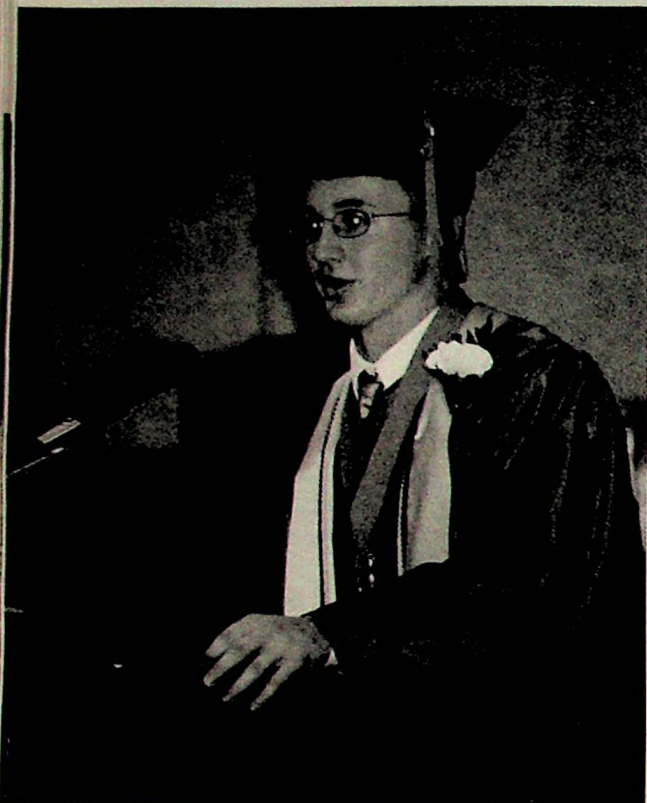

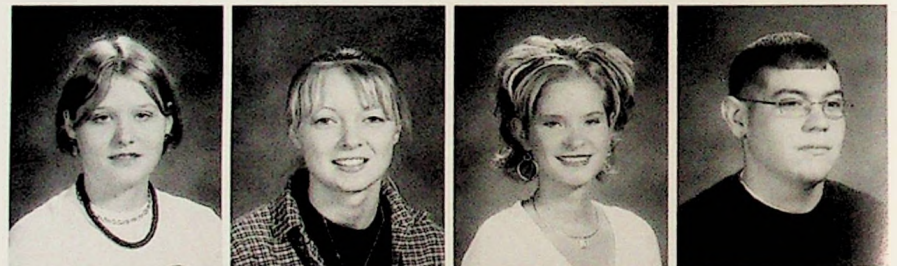
Hanging on for one more

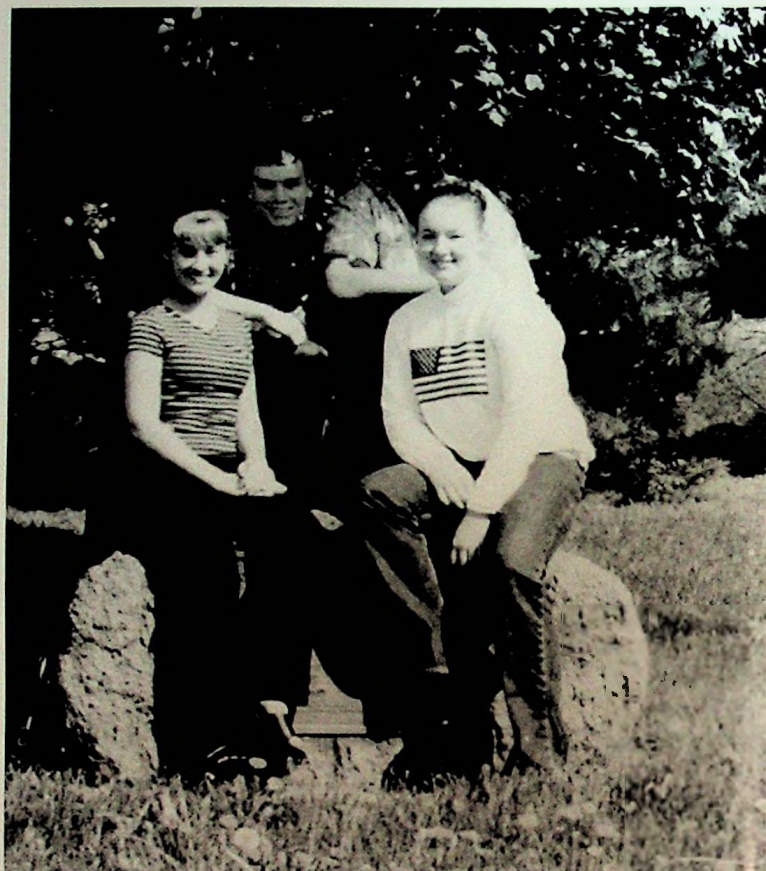
Sophomores Settle In

Ohio has offered the Post Secondary Enrollment Option Program (PSEOP) to high school students to attend any Ohio college. PSEOP has been available to PHS students for the past ten years. Each college sets its own requirements for admission into the program. Shawnee State requires the students maintain a 3.0 gpa. Qualified students may elect to take courses at the university and earn both high school and college credit. To add Post Secondary to your schedule, you must first meet the college requirements, sign up in the guidance office for the correct amount of study halls and then take a placement test. PSEOP has become quite popular to PHS students. It is free college! The Post secondary Enrollment Option is a great opportunity for students to get out on their own and see what learning on a college campus is all about for free.

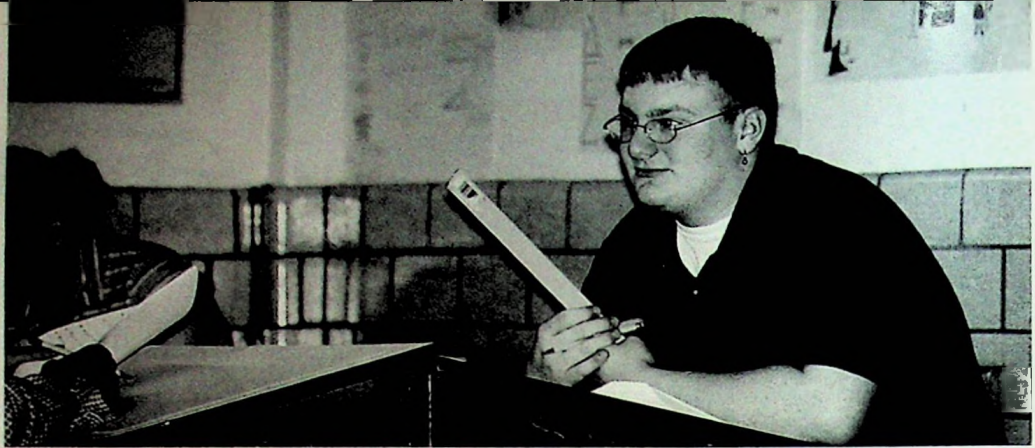

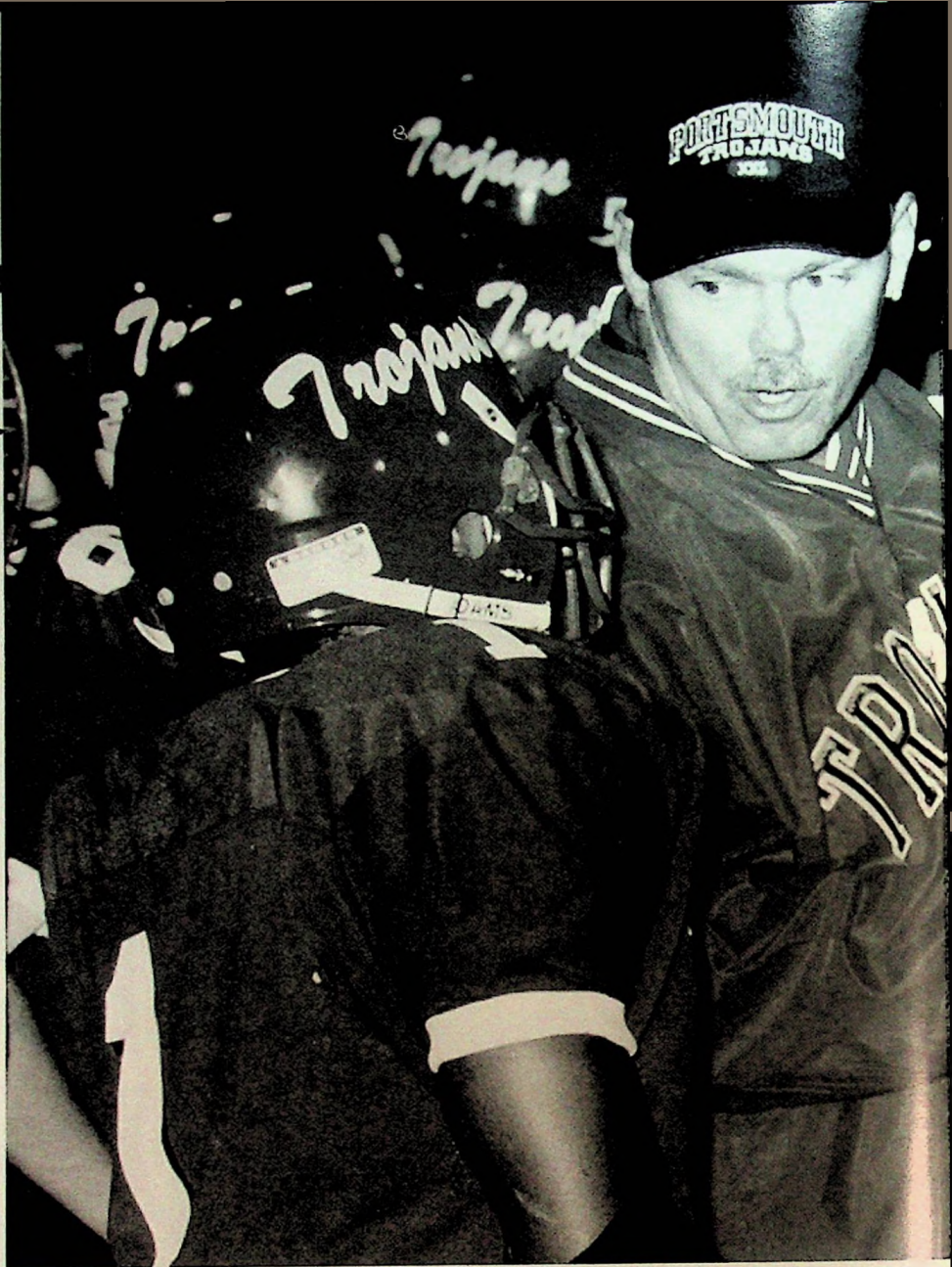

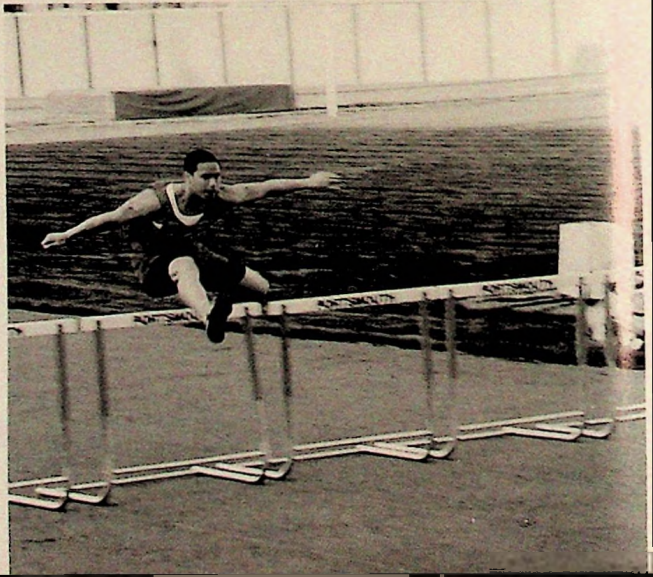

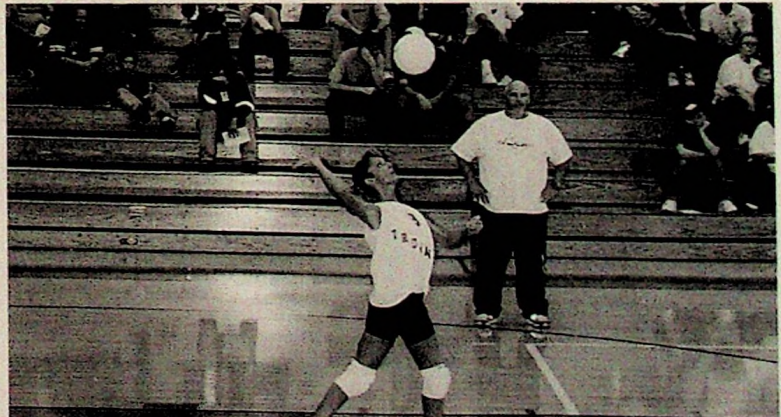


SETTING THE STANDARD

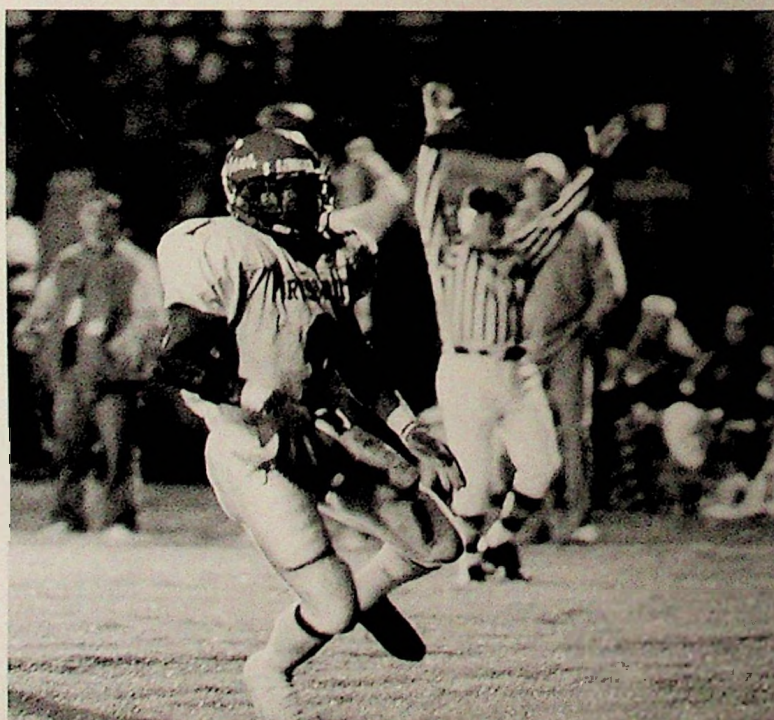

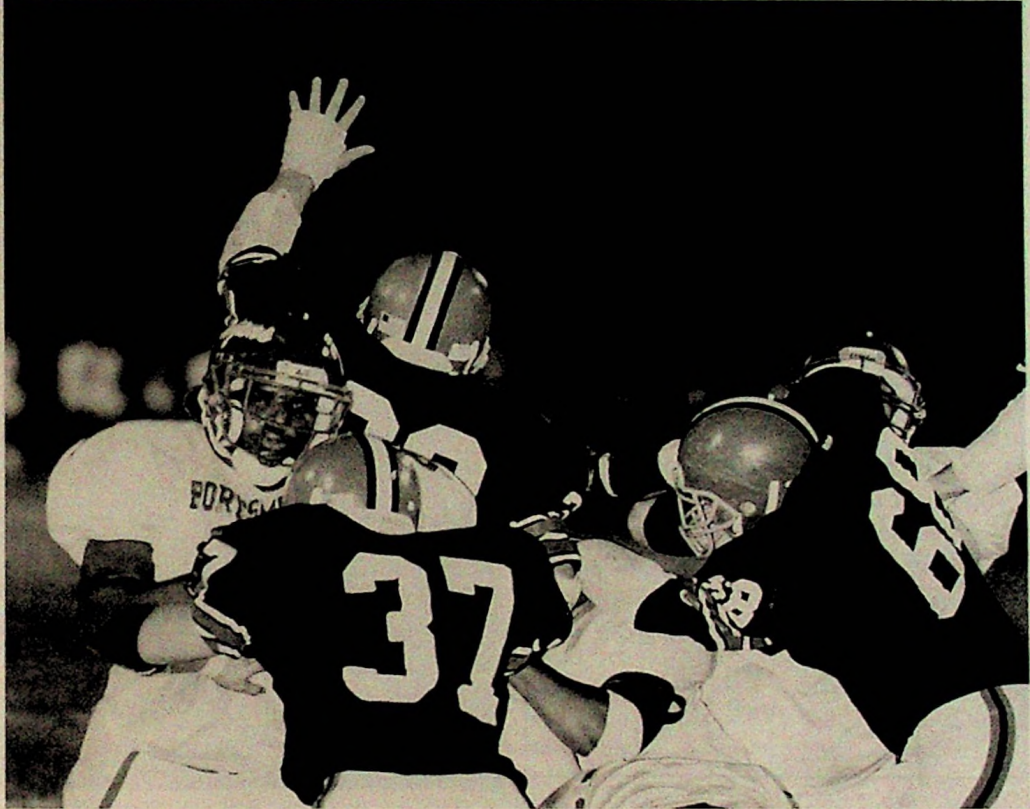

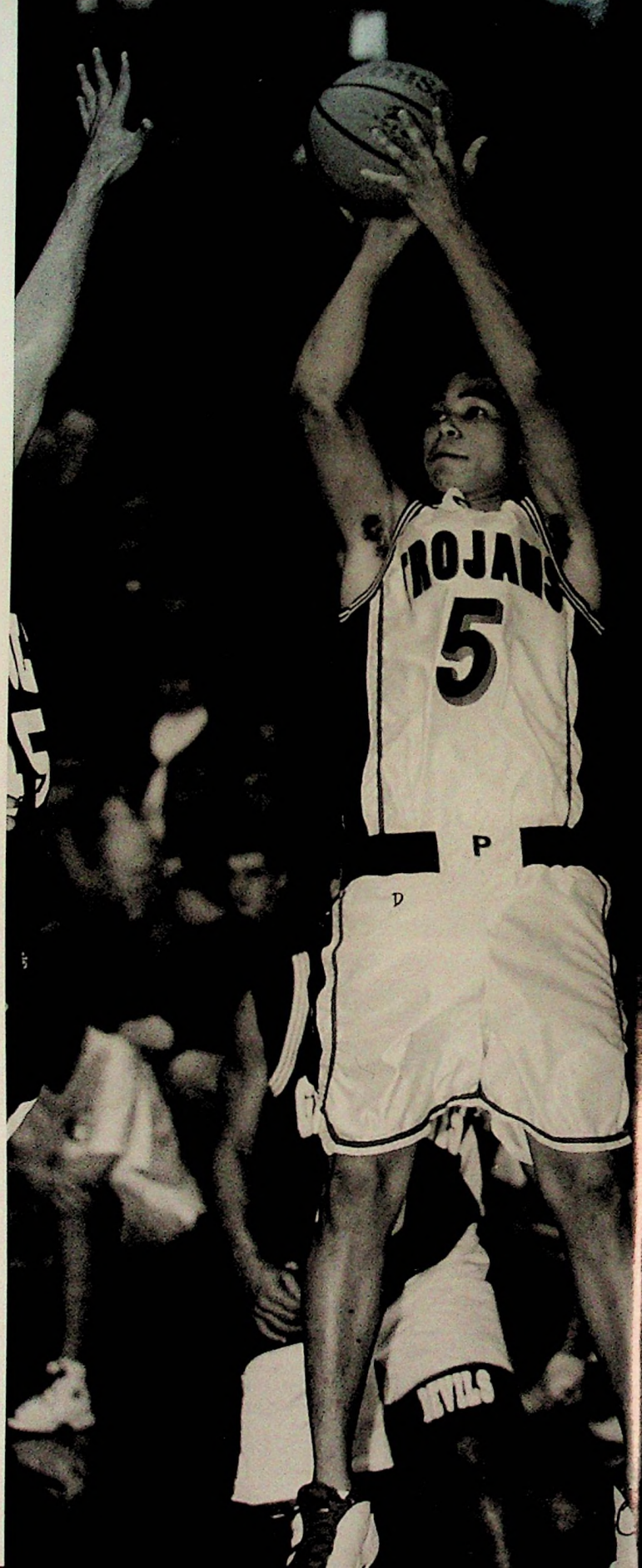
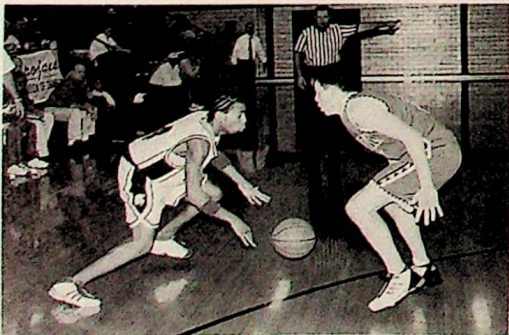
The boys then suffered a 39-61 loss to the Huber Heights, Dayton, then rolled by South Point, Lakeview Academy, and Wellston with three

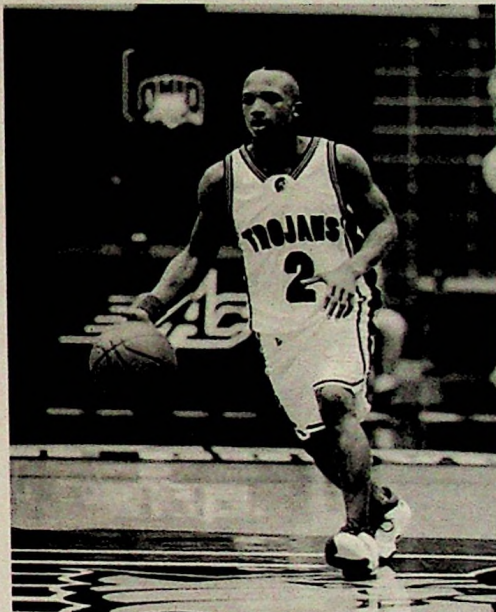

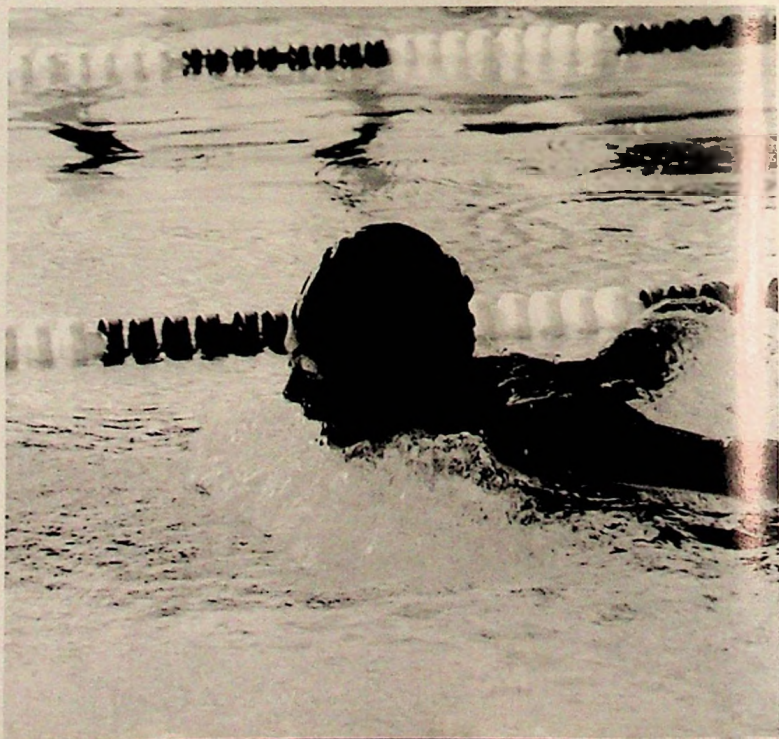

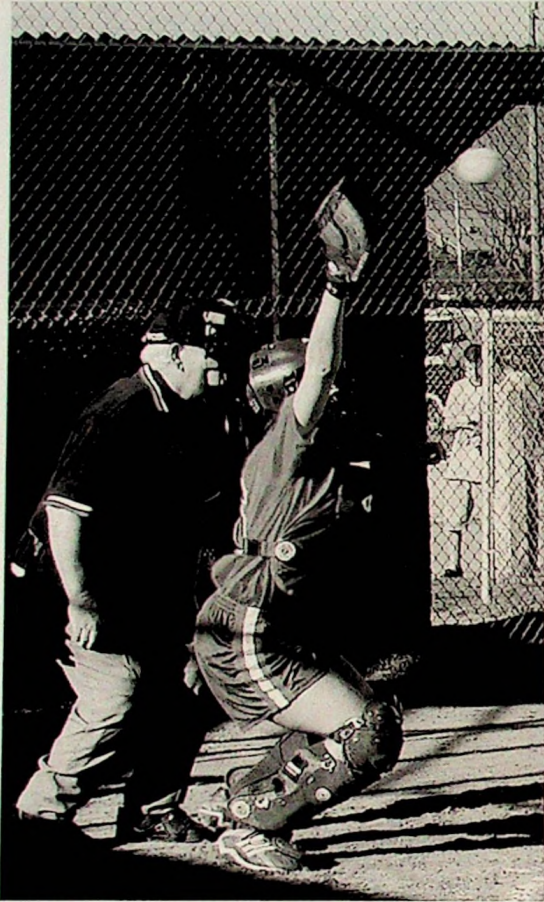

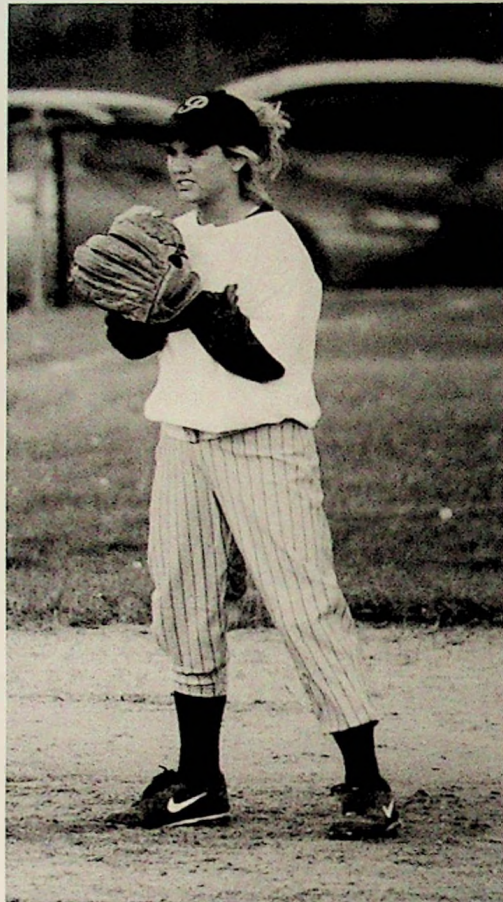

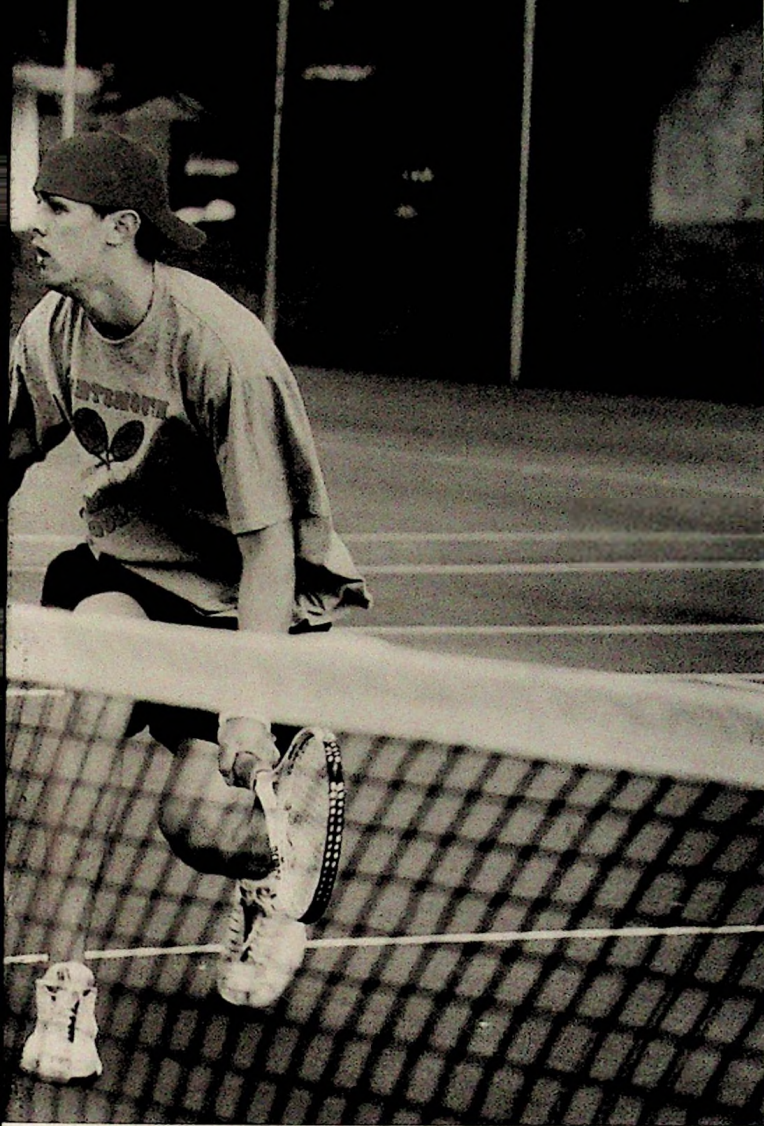

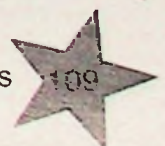

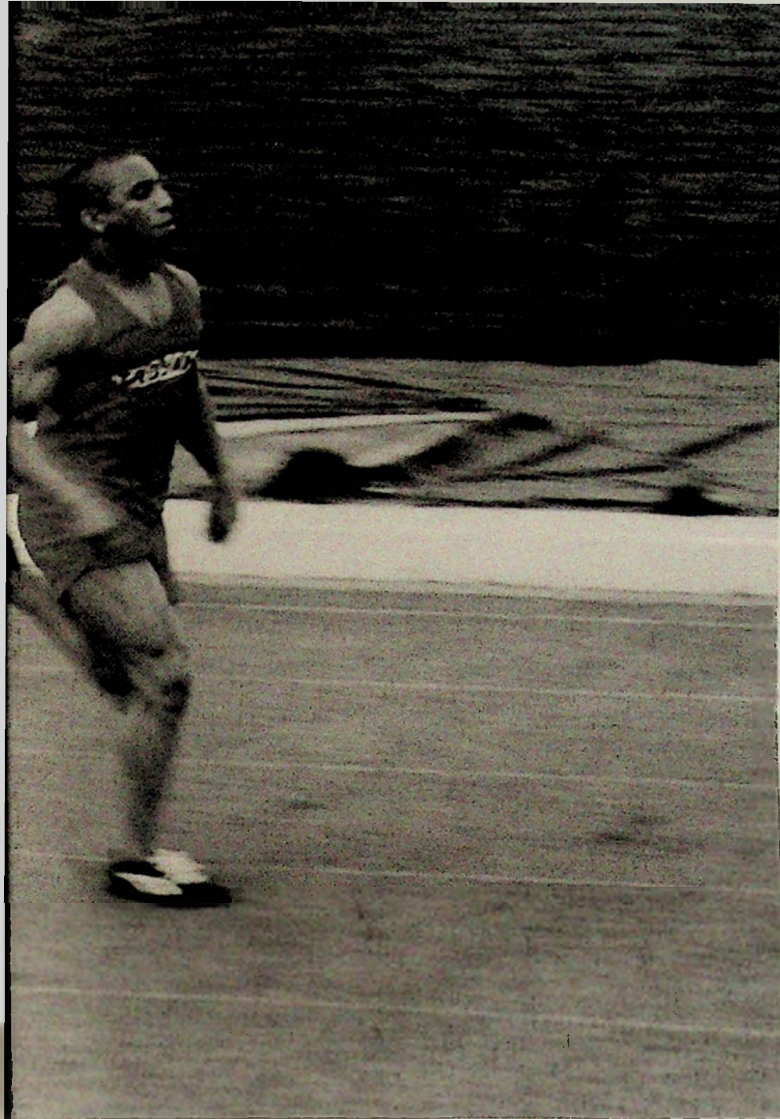


FUN TO RUN

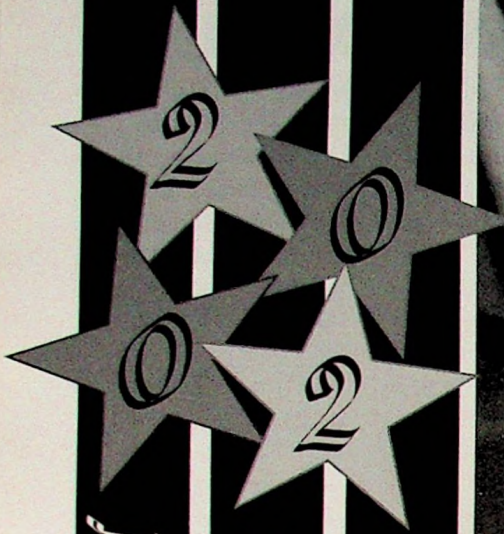

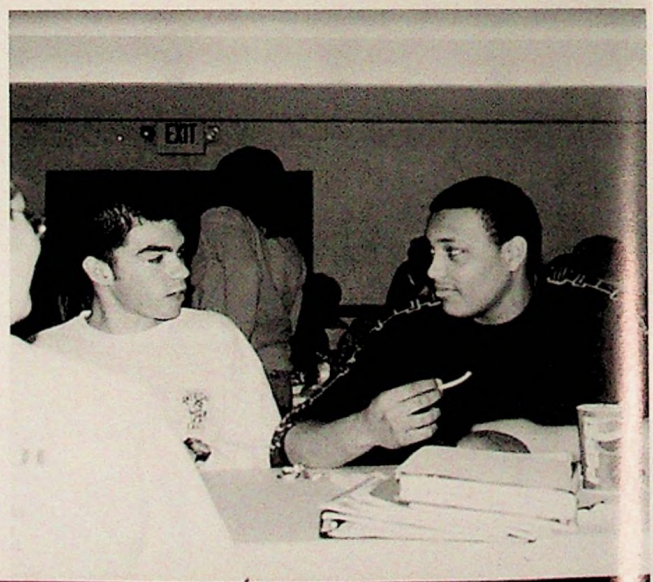

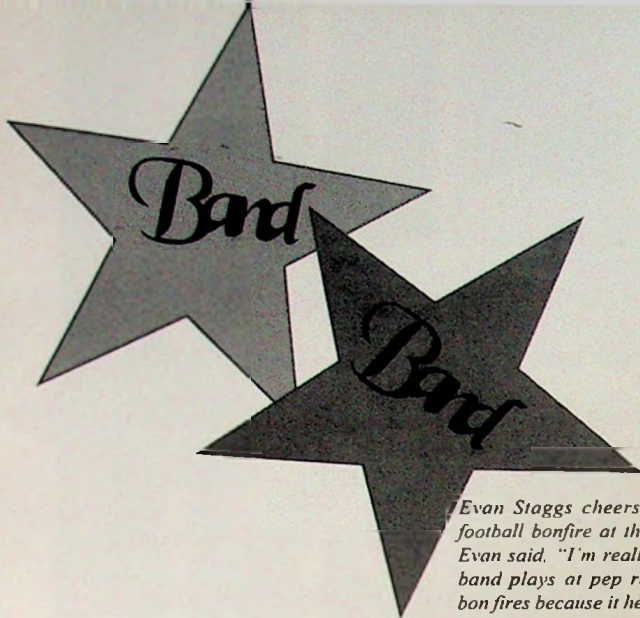
The Real Thing

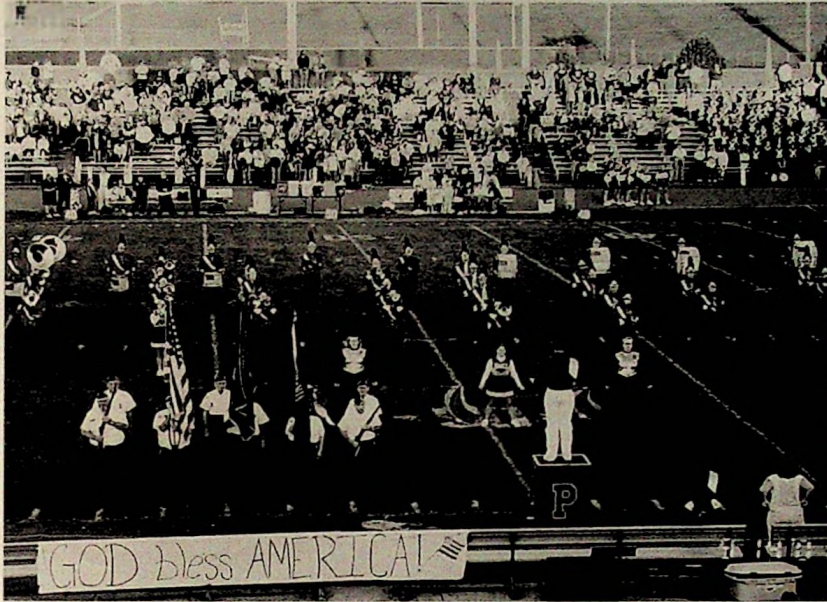

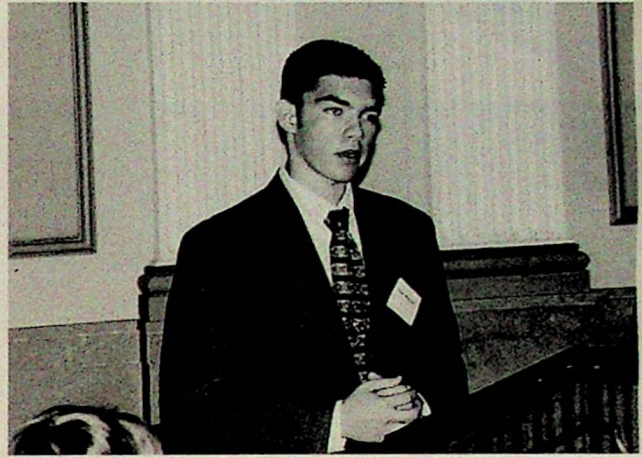

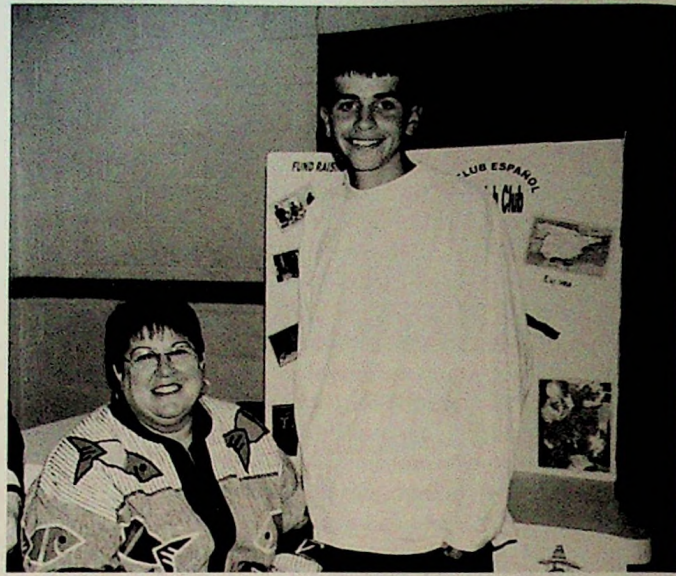
