Throughout thi: year of adjustment they were ably guided b; Herman Bender, their faculty advisers. The chief social events of this year were a Halloween masquerade and a Christmas party.

Winning the traditional tuE-of-war honors, they took leave of $G$. H. S. to return in the fall as Sophomores.

The following officers steered the course of the class ship during its Sophomore year; Raymond Fraley, presjdent; Jack Moore, vice president; Phenolpha Boyd, secretary and treasurer; Mildred Pfau and Paul Duncan, faculty advisers. The outstanding social evert of the year was a Christmas party.
