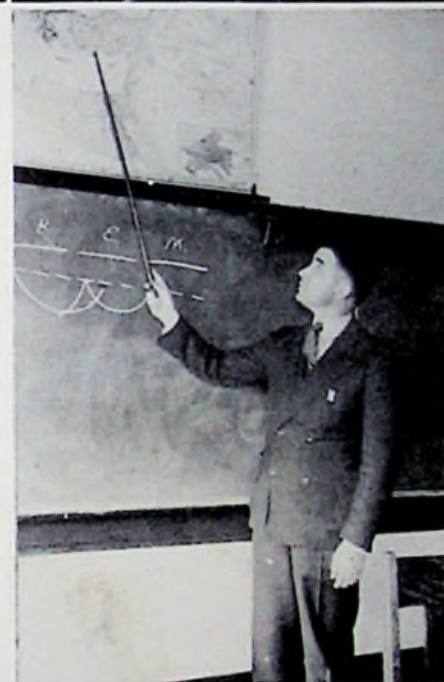

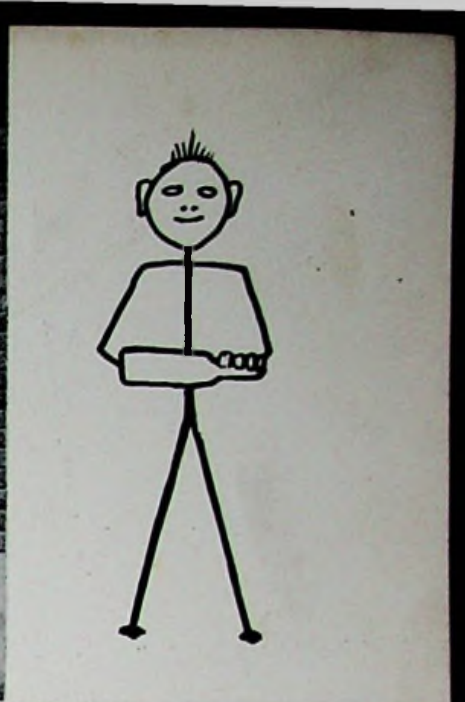

At the opening of the 1935 fall school term there appeared at the portals of Glenwood one hundred and forty-three lively boys and girls whose goal was graduation in 1939.

These green young lads and lassies began their activities for the year with the election of Bill McClurg, president; Jack Moore, vice president; Donald Rice, secretary; and Quinton Conklin, treasurer. Throughout this year of adjustment they were ably guided by Herman Bender, their faculty advisers. The chief social events of this year were a Halloween masquerade and a Christmas party.

Winning the traditional tug-of-war honors, they took leave of G. H. S. to return in the fall as Sophomores.

The following officers steered the course of the class ship during its Sophomore year; Raymond Fraley, president; Jack Moore, vice president; Phenolpha Boyd, secretary and treasurer; Mildred Pfau and Paul Duncan, faculty advisers. The outstanding social event of the year was a Christmas party.

In the annual scrap on Freshman Day the class, unbeaten the year before again came out the victor.

Two events far overshadowed all others in the Junior year. The first was the Class' s dramatic offering, "Mama' s Baby Boy." The second the Junior-Senior Prom, was certainly the greatest achievement of the class thus far in its career. The theme for the Prom which was beautifully planned and executed, was the Sesqui-Centennial Celebration of the Northwest Territory.

Class officers for this year were Arnold Williams, president; Bill McClurg, vice president; Jack Moore, secretary; and Bernice Brown treasurer, with Fern C. Wheeler and MaryHelen Southwick, advisers.

1939 finds 67 dignified Seniors remaining from the 143 who entered as Freshman four year ago.

Arnold Williams, Bill McClurg, Ada Fremont and Wanda Bowen with the aid of Mr. Irwin Washington and Mr. Herman Bender make up the guiding body.

With their presentation of "The Flatter", the seniors ended their high school dramatic career.

After the Baccalaureate service May 28, and Commencement June 2, another class of students of Glenwood become a group of Alumni of Glenwood.

The year 1936 brought to Greenwood another of green freshmen. Despite their many difficulties they elected to guide them Mr. L. Roy Boher and Miss Elaine Gunthe. As a whole the class forged ahead and at an early date showed remarkable scholastic powers. The annual tug-o-war ended with the freshmen receiving their first "ducking" in Millbrook lake.

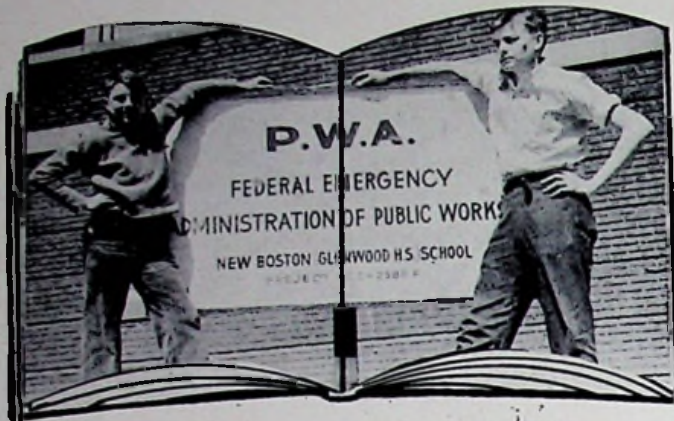

... TOO MILD

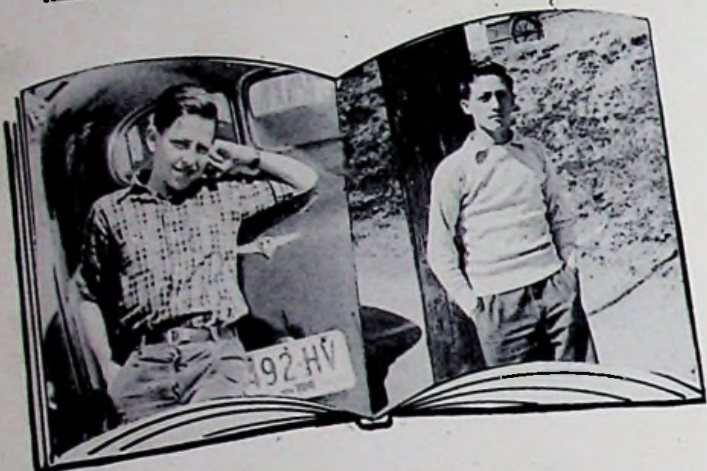


The 1938-9 Sophomore Class matriculated at Glenwood High School, September, 1937 as freshmen. Through the year of adjustments, they were led by Miss Elaine Gunther and Mr. Leroy Borer. A weiner roast at Camp Oyo climaxed their whirlwind of social events. With the arrival of Freshman Day came the time of conflict with the sophomores. The three-legged race, the sack race, the wheelbarrow race, and last, but not least the eventful tug of war. Winning this event among many others of the day gave them a chance to take their share of honors.

Entering upon their second year at Glenwood, the sophomores chose the following officers: Dee Semones, president; Russell Imes, vice president; Alden Blair, secretary; and David Lodwick, treasurer. The class advisors were Miss Mildred Pfau and Mr. Paul Duncan. The gala social events for these sophisticated sophomores were a Christmas party and a weiner roast.

The one hundred and twelve sophomores were divided into two groups for home room assembly. Miss Pfau guided the students in room 216 and Mr. Duncan the students in room 208. Mr. Duncan's home room discussed class affairs, had debates, and planned much of the sophomore entertainment. An outstanding feature in Miss Pfau's home room period was the formation of a class court to try cases of misconduct, poor citizenship, and other misdemeanors.

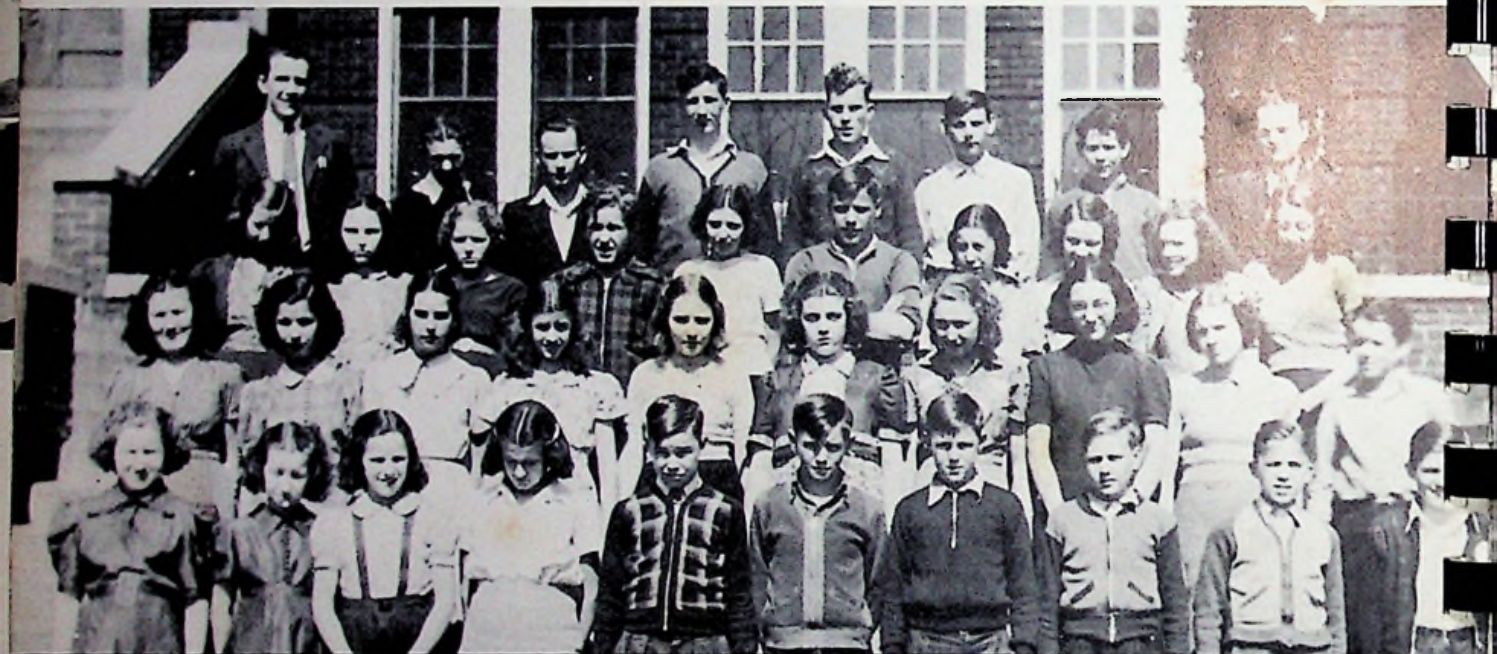
