I SPEAK FOR DEMOCRACY

Democracy, a form of government in which the laws are dictated by the people, is based upon the accepted theory that the citizens of a nation, while they might deviate from the best of courses for short intervals, will in the long run make the decisions most beneficial to the large majority. This theory has been proven correct by the citizens of this very prosperous democracy, the United States of America. Although the United States displays strong tendencies toward the republican form of government, it is one of the best modern day

examples of a democracy.

At its birth the United States was populated by men and women, who having been victims of tyranny in their native lands, strove without self-regard to set forth a government which while it was not new in principle, as it was more or less patterned after the ancient Roman government, was entirely unprecedented in that age of monarchs.

Wise as these martyrs were they realized that mistakes would be made and so they made provisions whereby a majority, and only a majority, of the citizens would be able to alter any law such as they desired. As time progressed their genius and forethought were realized.

Today we enjoy conditions never before seen in this world of ours as far as history records. Largely because our ancestors chose the democratic and capitalistic ways have we been able to prosper so. If they had chosen socialism instead, it most likely would have led to the complete deterioration of the basic freedoms and ended in the establishment of a police state as is asserted by the many socialist countries existing today. The establishment of a kingdom, likewise, would not have led to the favorable results procured by a democratic government.

If I believe a law unjust, it is my duty as a citizen to find a number of fellow citizens to back me, introduce the revision to the legislative branch of our government through my representative, and then if the largest part of my fellow citizens are favorably inclined toward the revision, it becomes a law. We as citizens of a democracy are not limited by the laws in engaging in business ventures. Daily we risk our fortunes in order that we might gain further. In the socialistic government this element of personal gain is eliminated thereby doing away with the incentive to risk all for more. Neither do we depend on the intelligence of a handful of leaders but on the pooled resources on one-hundred and sixty-odd million people.

While we who are so fortunately endowed bask in contentment, we should keep a weather eye out for the trouble which, it seems, is always brewing. A nation such as ours is always either advancing or regressing. We, the citizens of this great nation, must see to it that we keep pace with the times.

Don Burchett was awarded the free throw trophy sinking 22 out of 25 tosses. Don made 78% of his free throws during the season.



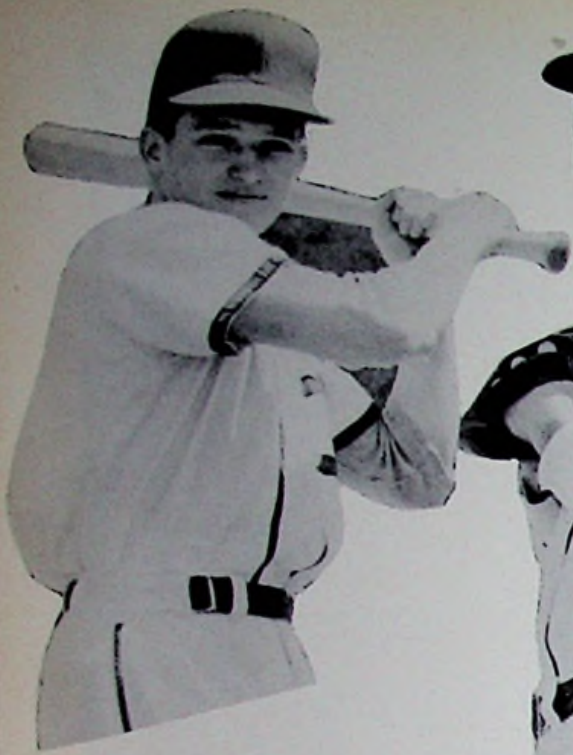
