The Developmental Reading course was added to the curriculum last year. Under the instruction and supervision of Ms. Carmen Westerfield, this unique skills lab is designed to identify the strengths and weaknesses of each reader and improve his over-all reading ability. Each student has an individual program designed exclusively for his needs and works at his own rate. Past testing has shown such dramatic results as a four year gain in over-all reading skills when students participate for an entire semester.

The reading lab is constantly growing, adding new programmed materials,
reading machines and audio tapes. Students have new opportunities to work on reading pacers, tape deck and Language Masters, and the administration has allocated funds for further expansion in the coming year.

At the present time, the reading lab accommodates twenty students per class who work directly with Ms. Westerfield or her aide. Ms. Westerfield has earned her reading validation ( k -12) from Ohio University and has served an eleven month internship in various labs providing her with extensive practical experience in the field of reading instruction.

## COIN Is New Aid

Toward the end of the school year, "COIN" became the new password for the guidance office. No, the counseling staff had not begun charging admission. COIN (Coordinated Occupational Information Network) was simply the newest equipment in the guidance office for obtaining career information.
Unlike many occupational information systems which utilize large
file cabinets or volumes for storing their knowledge, COIN's information is contained within a small index file. This is possible because COIN is a microfiche system. Over 10,000 pages of occupational and educational information are photographed, reduced in size, and arranged on a series of small plastic sheets (fiche) about the size of index cards. As many as ninety-eight pages can be contained on one fiche. When placed in a viewer the pages are magnified to a readable size. An index is used to help students locate information about occupations, college majors, specific colleges, apprenticeship programs, and the military. Students found the new equipment to be not only quite helpful but also fun to use. The COIN display quickly became a popular place for obtaining additional career and college information.

## U.S., China Normalize Relations

In December, 1978, President Carter announced to the nation that the U.S. and China had decided to normalize diplomatic relations ending nearly thirty years of separation. Under the agreement which took effect on Jan. 1, 1979, the U.S. would terminate diplomatic relations with Taiwan, cancel the 1954 defense treaty committing the U.S. to guarantee Taiwan's military security, and withdraw U.S. troops from Taiwan. News of the agreement angered Taiwanese who protested American recognition of the Communist country. In March the U.S. and Peking traded ambassadors and in January, Vice-Premier Teng Hsiao-p'ing visited the United States.
China embarked on vast improvements and advancements in the areas of agriculture, industry, science and technology, and defense which they referred to as the Four Modernizations. Trading would open up between the United States and China as well as with other countries. These were all giant steps for the country that has isolated itself from the life of the rest of the world in a style of total self-reliance and independence.

The Chinese people, comprising onequarter of the world's population, eagerly set about learning of techniques, fashions and entertainment of other countries. They began taking crash courses in foreign languages, making arrangements to send students to study overseas, and encouraging tourist trade. They even plan to construct a golf course, have given Coca-Cola exclusive rights to sell in the Peoples Republic, and have consulted McDonald's about possible fast-food techniques. China happily began emerging from a cocoon.

## England Greets First Test-Tube Baby

In August, 1978, Leslie Brown, wife of Gilbert John Brown gave birth to a 5 -pound, 12 -ounce girl in Oldham, England. The unusual aspect of this birth was that new-born Louise was the first baby to be conceived outside the mother's womb. Britain's Dr. Robert Edwards, a gynecologist, and Dr. Patrick Steptoe, a physiologist, fertilized Mrs. Brown's egg with Mr. Brown's sperm in a glass dish and five days later implanted the dividing cells into the mother's uterus. Mrs. Brown had previously
been unable to have a child due to blocked Fallopian tubes.

The in vitro birth brought new hope to those women who had been unable to conceive a child while at the same time raised moral and ethical questions concerning the conception of a fetus outside the mother's womb. Some feared that the event would start a trend toward human reproduction in test tubes as in Aldous Huxley's book Brave New World.

## Bakke Wins Anti-Discrimination Case

## Hayes Loses in Gator Bowl

After 28 seasons of being head football coach, Woody Hayes, 65, was fired by Ohio State University President Harold Enarson. The dismissal came after Hayes slugged a Clemson University player who had intercepted a pass at the Gator Bowl where Ohio State lost 17. 15. Hayes, who had compiled a 238-7211 college coaching record, had a reputation for violence after several previous incidences involving cameramen who had gotten too close. During his great career, Woody's team had won 13 Big Ten titles, and he had twice been named college coach of the year.

## Illustrator Dies

Norman Rockwell, well-known artist and illustrator, died in November at the age of 84 . Rockwell paintings - 317 of them reproduced on Saurday Evening Post covers - had the characteristic of sentimentally depicting life of the middle class American. His illustrations often poked fun at the little noticed events of American life and often expressed patriotism and religious worship.

## Grant Bridge Closed

The U.S. Grant Bridge linking South Shore, Kentucky, and Portsmouth, Ohio, was ordered closed by the Ohio Department of Transportation on July 7, 1978, when an inspection revealed frayed wires in the suspension cables near the center of the span.

All traffic had to be rerouted along U.S. 52 to Ironton until a ferry service was established to help accommodate the daily average of 13,000 vehicles. Repair crews began work on the bridge while possibilities of a second bridge and its location were discussed in the two states.

## Nuclear Disaster Averted

A nuclear accident at Pennsylvania's Three Mile Island changed the thinking of many Americans toward the safety of using nuclear reactors as the solution to the energy crisis. In April, reactor Unit 2 's turbine shut down, and an emergency core-cooling system which is designed to dump thousands of gallons of water onto the reactor's core also failed.

As temperatures rose in the core, the danger of a "meltdown" became evident during which the core could drop into the water coolant at the base of the chamber causing a steam explosion that could rupture the 4 ft . thick walls of the containment building, or the molten


## Peace in the Middle East?

In an effort to bring peace to the Middle East, President Jimmy Carter invited Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin to Camp David for talks. Never before had leaders been so isolated for so long in an attempt to resolve disaggreements. The informal setting of Camp David was also highly unusual - completely away from the press.

Although agreement between the two leaders seemed beyond hope, the three men happily emerged after thir-
teen days to sign two documents which brightened the possibility of peace. The documents called for Jordan and the Palestinians to work out over five years the final status of the West Bank and Gaza, an Israeli-Egyptian peace treaty to be signed within three months, normalization of all relationships between the two countries within a year, and complete Israeli withdrawal from Egyptian territories within three years.

However, peace was not to come to the countries by the prescribed dead-
lines as found in December when Begin and Sadat could not agree on details of the pact. Begin accused the U.S. of being one-sided and U.S. Secretary of State Cyrus Vance returned home early in frustration after six days of shutling back and forth between Cairo and Jerusalem.

A second round of talks was held at Camp David in search of an agreement which would be acceptable to the Israeli government. Finally after 16 months of negotiations, the peace treaty between the two countries was signed on the White House lawn in April before 1600 guests, 5000 spectators, and a national television audience.
core could melt into the earth. Either would release lethal radioactive gases. As scientists struggled to find ways to cool the core they were further hampered by a hydrogen gas bubble that had unexpectedly formed in the top of the steel housing.

During the process of reducing the size of the bubble and even from the time the accident first occurred, small amounts of radioactive gases leaked or were released from the containment building causing Pennsylvania Governor Thornburgh to advise the evacuation of pregnant women and small children.

Although the disaster was averted by the eventual cool-down of the reactor, the effects on the people living near Three Mile Island will not be known for years. The event set off a number of "anti-nuke" demonstrations across the country and caused government officials to take a questioning look at the recent proposals for expansion of nuclear plants.

PETE ROSE - Third baseman for the Cincinnati Reds. Pete Rose, at the age of 37 became a free agent and signed a four-year contract with the Philadelphia Phillies for about $\$ 3.5$ million making him the highest paid baseball player in history.

GOLDA MEIR - Former Israeli Premier Golda Meir died.

MICHELLE MARVIN - Michelle Triola Marvin sued actor Lee Marvin for half of his earnings during the six years she was his live-in girl friend.

QUEEN NOOR - Jordan's King Hussein married American Lisa Hulaby making her his fourth wife and Queen Noor.

ECLIPSE - North America's last solar eclipse of the century occurred in March, 1979. The next one will be in the year 2017.

PORTSMOUTH TIMES - The Porsmouth Times changed its name to The Daily Times connoting coverage of six counties rather than just Portsmouth.

PRINCESS CAROLINE - Twenty-one-year-old Princess Caroline of Monaco, daughter of Prince Rainier and former American actress Grace Kelly, married French financier Phillipe Junot, 38, an unpopular choice of the parents.

EDGAR BERGAN - Comedian and ventriloquist died. He was well known for routines with his dummy sidekicks Charlie McCarthy and Mortimer Snerd.

DEATH PENALTY - The U.S. Supreme Court struck down Ohio's death penalty laws. The court claimed that the laws did not allow the proper consideration of circumstances for each individual defendant. The state at that time had 95 men and 4 women on death row.

NELSON ROCKEFELLER - Nelson
Rockefeller, multi-millionaire and former New York governor and Vice-President under Gerald Ford, died of a heart attack at the age of 70 . Rockefeller had a zest for life, politics and art surpassed by no one. He loved to solve complex public issues but never managed to obtain the goal he sought - the presidency of the United States.

## Gacy Claims 32 Victims

To investigate the complaint of a missing teenager, Robert Piest, police searched the home of John Gacy, a respected individual in his community who loved to perform as a clown for children. There they found, after excavating the house and garage, the remains of 27 victims young men and boys whom Gacy had sexually assaulted and murdered. Gacy claimed to have murdered 32 people; he had thrown five into the Des Plaines River. The acts would make Gacy the worst mass murderer in the history of the U.S.

## Catholics Mourn Death of Popes

After a 15 -year reign as the 262 nd Roman Catholic pontiff, Pope Paul VI died of a heart attack on August 6, 1978. The 80 -year-old leader of the world's 500 million Catholics died at the summer palace of Castel Gandolfo in Italy and was buried in the crypt of St. Peter's Basilica. Pope Paul had a troubled reign following the reforms begun by his predecessor, Pope John XXIII in Vatican Council II.

Thirty-four days after the selection of Paul's successor, the Catholics of the world were stunned to learn of the death of the new pope. Sixty-five-year-old Pope John Paul I died also of a heart attack in his sleep on Sept.

28, 1978. During his brief reign, Pope John Paul exhibited an informal style, sense of humor, and warmth which endeared him to the hearts of Catholics everywhere.
The College of Cardinals later again shocked the world's Catholics by electing as the next pope Karol Wojtyla of Poland. The new 58 -year-old Vicar, who took the name of Pope John Paul II out of respect to his predecessor, was the first non-Italian pope elected in 456 years and the youngest since 1846. NonItalians were jubilant over the choice and quickly grew to love the kind man who is conservative and anti-Communist.

## 910 Die in Jonestown Massacre

The United States was shocked to learn of the mass suicide-killing of 910 members of the Peoples Temple, a religious cult located in Jonestown, Guyana. The deaths occurred after Congressman Leo Ryan and three American newsmen were shot to death on an airstrip. Congressman Ryan had gone to Guyana to investigate mistreatment of Americans who were members of the cult led by Rev. Jim Jones, a native of Indiana.

Members of the cult followed Jones order of giving to their children a mixture of Kool-Aid and cyanide and then
drinking the deadly poison themselves during a ritual. It was believed that armed guards in the gathering persuaded the cultists to kill themselves, but many voluntarily drank the potion then wandered off to await their death in about five minutes. Jones was found dead of a bullet wound in the head.
The U.S. military was sent with cargo planes to accomplish the grisly task of collecting the bodies, which were rapidly deteriorating in the tropical sun, for transport to relatives in the United States.

## California Taxpayers Revolt

California voters created waves of astonishment and wonder when they passed by a $65 \%$ vote the nationally known Proposition 13 in June of 1978. Proposition 13, the brainchild of Howard Jarvis, cut the property taxes of Californians by approximately $57 \%$ or more than $\$ 7$ billion.

As a result of the Jarvis-Gann victory, budgets had to be cut drastically with unknown effects on public services. While some officials predicted doom,
others reasoned a cut in inflated budgets was due and would also encourage industrial and commercial expansion. Also the loss of tax deductions would benefit the federal government by some $\$ 2.3$ billion which would boost California's income tax, since it is tied to the federal income tax.

The rest of the nation and its angry taxpayers watch California in anticipation of their own tax revolts.

## DC-10 Crashes

The nation's worst aviation disaster occurred on May 25 when one American Airlines jumbo jet crashed immediately after take-off when one of its three engines fell off the wing. The reason for the crash of the DC- 10 which killed 273 persons was not certain. It was originally believed that a bolt had broken thus releasing the engine. DC-10's of the eight domestic airlines were ordered grounded until they could be inspected. Later they were ordered grounded until further notice due to the discovery of cracks in the engine mounts of one plane. Cause of the cracks were not yet determined.
