## CLASS HISTORY

In the year of nineteen hundred and forty, a large group of diligent boys and girls began a "Journey of Knowledge" to a territory through which they had never traveled. After a three months vacation they again resumed their journey and settled at the town called "Sophomore." During the vacation, four of the colony departed. They were Walter Chandler, Thomas Gaspers, Enid Kitchen, and Earl Burke. However, they had gained four new friends, Ruth Schmeizer, Ruby Jordan, Emma Nelson, and Eloise Clark, so that the loss was not so great as it might have been.

Later in the season, three new members were admitted. They were Genus Jones, George Royal, and Helen Howard. Not long afterward, four more citizens were called to other duties. They were Ruby Jordan, Emma Nelson, Genus Jones, and Billy Herndon.

Mayor Jones was elected for the second term. His new assistants were Harlan Miller, George Davisson, and Billie Hall. They performed their duties very well, helping wherever necessary. At the termination of the year, and to celebrate their achievements, they gave an afternoon picnic.

The next year their "Journey of Knowledge" was spent in the village of "Junior." This year Mr. H. A. Lewis was given the prvilege of being Mayor of this group of thirtysix. At the same election, George Royal, Howard Miller, and Lola Holbrook took the oath of office and carried on their duties very efficiently.

At the beginning of the term they found that three of the members had departed. They were Ida Mae Herron, Helen Howard, and Harold Stewart. Those who took their place were Donna Lewis, Gerald Miller, and Jack Daniels. Later the same year, three colonists sought their pathways in different directions. Cupid pertinently pierced the heart of Opal Arthur and sent her sailing to the isle of matrimony. Leonard Sloas joined Uncle Sam's Army and George Royal became a member of America's great naval force.

The days passed hastily, some bringing gladness and some bringing sorrow. The boys and girls became more involved in the knowledge that they were gaining. Toward the end of the year, they decided to display, for the first time, their theatrical ability. They proved it to be amazing in a performance of a three-act mystery comedy, "Small Town Romeo," directed by Mr. H. A. Lewis.

The citizens of the Junior and Senior villages had many good times during the year. A "Kid" party was sponsored by the seniors at which everyone dressed as small children. Later in the year, in honor of the seniors, to repay them for their many kindnesses, and as a farewell tribute to them, the juniors held a banquet at the Wilmere Tea Room in Portsmouth. This ordeal was one to be remembered for many years as a joyous part of the "Journey of Knowledge."

In the fall of 1943, the little band again assembled at "Senior Village" to complete their "Journey of Knowledge." Mr. Galen Besco was chosen mayor and Mrs. Caryl Siembt, judge and chief advisor. Their three excellent helpers were George Davisson, Earl Conley, and Jimmie McAdams.

The only absentee was Gerald Miller, who is now with the U. S. Navy.

With the world still facing a great war and some of the boys already in the armed forces, the villagers had matured and become more serious minded. They knew now the seriousness of the world they were preparing to enter and were determined that nothing would keep them from attaining the goal which they had set.

Between their regular activities, however, they still found time for amusements. To celebrate the beginning of a new conquest, they enjoyed a wiener roast. This was soon followed by a "Backwards" party in honor of the juniors and seniors. They were very elated to have a fine representation in an excellent basketball team that won many honors during the year. This, of course, was accomplished by their superb playing.

In October the seniors again demonstrated their outstanding theatrical talent in another three-act performance,
"Don't Be Bashful," which was directed by Mrs. Caryl Siembt, and Mr. Galen Besco.

A census was taken at the middle of the year and it was discovered that six members had left the "Senior Village" to seek their goal in another region. Three of these, Everett Mitchell, Jack Daniel, and Russell Goodwin, joined their comrades defending the flying colors. Betty Arthur became a member of cupid's mighty force. Ruby Hammond and John Gaspers found other interests.

To break the monotony of regular school routine, the seniors honored two former members of the colony with a party. These two were Russell Goodwin and Everett Mitchell, who were home on furlough from their basic training at a naval base.

On May 6 the seniors were entertained by the juniors at a festive banquet. This was the last affair in which the juniors and the seniors had the privilege to participate.

As they neared the end of their adventurous "Journey of Knowledge," they looked back into the past and found, among those four years of work as well as pleasure, that they had gained a great amount of education other than that obtained from their books. They learned that in order to be successful in life, they must have faith, courage, hope, self-reliance, patience, friendship; they must be cooperative, and they must have the will to achieve.

As their intellectual tour finally terminated, they realized that it was really the commencement of the purposeful life that would bring them success. As they marched bravely from the "Senior Village" they gave a dignified salute as they raised their blue and gold banner upon which was displayed their appropriate motto: "Prepare Today! Achieve Tomorrow!'

The Adams and Hunt families occupy adjoining cottages at Pine Lake for a summer vacation. Nancy daringly goes into action for the first time in her life. A new and very attractive Nancy emerges. In an effort to make Ken jealous, Nancy hires Larry Marshall (George Davisson), a total stranger, to pose as her lover. She even introduces Larry as a popular young artist from the East. Immediately matters take an alarming turn, particularly when Phyllis Burk (Donna Lewis), a newspaper reporter, attempts to interview the supposedly young artist. Soaring to the top, with what many fans claimed the smoothest-working basketball team ever representing Green High, Coach Harry Bitzer's Bobcats compiled the best regular season record of any basketball team, large or small, in the district. Bitzer's boys rose to their peak just a few weeks before the tournament and were in a cooling off period just as the tournament time rolled around. Just before the tournament the smooth-working 'Cats ran up scores like $83-16,75-13,60-6$, and $70-16$. In this manner Bitzer's "Blitzers" rang up a regular season's record of 16 wins and 2 defeats. This year's record needs no flowery words to express its success. In those 18 games the Bobcats hit the hoop for a total of 822 points to their opponents' 367 . That's an average of $452 / 3$ points per game to a combined opponents' average of $201 / 2$ points per contest. That's pretty hot basketball in any state and that defensive mark is just as great as the offensive.

As for the tournament it was just a story of too much Wheelersburg, and not enough of the Green squad that romped through the season. Green first knocked off McDermott, and then Webster in the county tourney. They then dropped the finals to Wheelersburg, after leading throughout the game until the last few minutes. In the District Tourney
it was the same story. Green went into the last quarter leading, but the Pirates' size told the story. Green went into this last quarter determined not to let the county tournament repeat itself, but fouls hit the team hard, and slowly the Pirates forged ahead and Bitzer's boys had played their last game.

The Bobcat reserves also ended the season in a hot streak after losing their first 3 games. They hit their stride and won 8 out of the next 10 games. For most of the boys it was their first year in county competition. The boys who made up the reserve squad were: Harlan Miller, Phil Vinson, Paul Fannin, Russ Goodwin, Howard Miller, Jim McAdams, and Ballard Daniels. Everett Mitchell, sixth man on the varsity; Jack Daniel, varsity timekeeper; and Russ Goodwin, star guard on the reserves, left the team in the middle of the season to go into the Navy.

One thing that the boys on this year's squad have gained, if nothing more, is to have been able to play for a coach like Mr. Bitzer and to have been able to associate with a couple as fine as he and his wife. Calm and understanding, patient, and a great coach, Mr. Bitzer is above all a gentleman. He and his wife will always be remembered by the boys who played under him.
