Because this is the usual rule in the origin of every change. I know of ne better advice to offer to

Think out exactly why you are a Catholic, why you are intolerant of wrong principles and wrong religious beliefs, yet very tolerant of one who honestly and sincerely lives up to such principles and beliefs.

Think out exactly why a Catholic cannot be a Mason, yet can be an Elk, cannot be a Communist and yet can join a religious order where private property is forbidden.

Think out exactly why as a Catholic you hold marriage to be a most sacred thing, yet condemn extra-marital licenses and intra-marital birth control. If you do not think exactly on these and many other principles, your life will be a failure.

When you have the habit to think straight, then the next thing to do is to talk straight. Talk with confidence because you have the courage of your convictions. Do not go about with a chip on your shoulder. Be not aggressively religious, fanatically proselytising. Be ready to give a straightforward expression of the reasoned convictions which you have, temperately, prudently and above all tactfully. The last is important. It means that you always assume that the other person is sincere, and always speak with him so as to give no offence. A person must take care not to give offence, and not to trim or pare down one's position.

Think straight - talk straight - and then act straight. Remember, the biggest task you will ever do in life is to be the Catholic man or woman that you ought to be. Actions speak louder than words; and the toughest argument against the Church, is the argument from the lives of bad Catholics. Act straight, live the honest, truthful, consistent lives that you ought to live; that is the finest piece of Catholic Action you can do.



The Chorister group is made up of forty selected voices of boys from the ages of ten to fifteen years. Through the special training they receive in their weekly practices, they aim at achieving the ideal of the Church as expressed in the "Motu Proprio" of Pius X, by fittingly and correctly interpreting the sublime spirit of her liturgy, embodied as it is in her sacred music, and in eventually combining them with the male chancel choir which St. Mary hopes to have in the future.

The boys have advanced from the initial stage of correct tone production in unison singing, to that of three and four voice-part work, sung both accompanied and unaccompanied. At present their repertoire includes masses, motets, and sacred music from such composers as de Lassus, Arceldt, Dubois, Palestrina, Toni-Lotti, Vittoria, Montani, Rossini and Father Finn. The choir sings the High Mass each fourth Sunday of the month, and on all Holydays and special occasions throughout the year; it sings hymns at low Mass each second Sunday.





sweet to me all the time but today, he-he-asked me to marry him. Sister: Yes?


Angela: I don't know what to do. When I'm with him nothing seems right, until we come to this garden. But somehow I--I----


Francis Duplain, one of the three musketeers of the Sophomore Class, has a great future in store for him.
