


FOREWORD

SAINT MARY OF THE ANNUNCIATION

The Blessed Virgin is the general theme of the Annual this year. The influence of Mary on a young student may be very great. I was not ten years old when I read my first book about the Blessed Virgin. It was a small book on "The Origin of Lourdes" written by Henry Lasserre, as an act of gratitude for the recovery of his sight. The history of Lourdes made a deep and lasting impression. After that, devotion to the Blessed Virgin was easy and natural.

At Notre Dame University, devotion to Mary is promoted among the students as a helpful means to maintain good discipline. A large Grotto of Lourdes is reproduced beyond the college church. Crowning the high dome of the Administration Building is a statue of Mary, the Mother of Grace, covered with gold leaf and shining down upon the whole campus. Student life is spent there in a religious atmosphere.

It so happens here, that our church has the title of Saint Mary of the Annunciation. Our church is filled with many references to the life of our Lady. Three grand paintings emphasize her Immaculate Conception, Annunciation and The Sacred Heart of Mary is the picture in her Assumption. Three statues represent her as Our Lady of Lourdes, Standing Beneath the Cross and Receiving the Body of Jesus. The art glass windows depict her Espousals to Joseph, the Holy Family, the five Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary, her Coronation in Heaven, and the giving of the scapular to Simon The "Ave Maria" and the Rose of Sharon, emblems of Mary, are at the tops of several windows. But the most impressive decorations in our church are the ten large angel figures, which fill the panels of the ceiling. Each angel holds a ribbon on which is a verse of the Canticle, "Magnificat". Truly, all generations are calling her blessed.

Devotion to Mary will preserve one's faith. No one who has a right understanding of Mary's place in the economy of our redemption will ever fall into heresy. Devotion to Mary is an inspiration to high scholarship; it is a means for the preservation of morals. It promotes the love of God and the regular practice of religion.

Mary is the Star of the Sea. She will guide one safely across the oceon of life to the harbor of eternity.

November 1 Central's football squad began the month by losing another game. Playing the worst game of the year, the Titans were defeated by Sciotoville 14-7.



November 8 To observe Catholic and National Education Week, several members of the senior class presented a punel discussion on National Defense, followed by an open forum.


November 9 Today marked the end of the observance of Catholic Book Week. The members of all the English classes took an active part by making posters and


January 22 Semester tests began today. No time to write more - have to get back to my studies. I even stayed home from a basketball game and did not see Central beat Minford again, 63-27.

February 28 Homer Chaillaux made his annual visit to Portsmouth. He addressed our assembly on good citizenship and the part the American Legion plays therein.


February 28 We had an open forum on topics of the day conducted by Mr. William Burke and Mr. Charles Vandervort.


March 18 We got "inspected" today. The gentlemen from the state department visit-



April 1 No April fooling about this, Diary. You should have seen the crowd that started out for spring football today.






April 7 Scholarship selection tests, today, and were they tough! Now everyone is waiting eagerly to see who is going to Athens (for tests, I mean).


mothers at a breakfast in the cafeteria. But we didn't forget our dear old dads - they were present also.



Upper right: Athens Scholarship Team; lower right: Cast for April 24; left: Cast for April 23.








May 14 Another step closer to graduation, Diary. Our announcements arrived today. Now, pencil in hand, each Senior is seen checking over long, long lists.
