## TRADE AND INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION

O. M. GWINN

Supervisor-Director

Vocational education prepares boys to enter trades and industrial occupations. Three hours each day are spent in the "shop" of the student's choice where the correct use of hand and machine tools are taught. The work performed in the shop must be on a useful basis under actual job conditions so far as possible. Students are given individual attention rather than group instruction in their shop training.

Approximately thirty percent of the student's time in school each day is devoted to the study of trade technology which includes shop mathematics, science, blueprint reading, sketching and trade information. These subjects differ from general subjects in that they are designed to apply directly to the chosen trade.

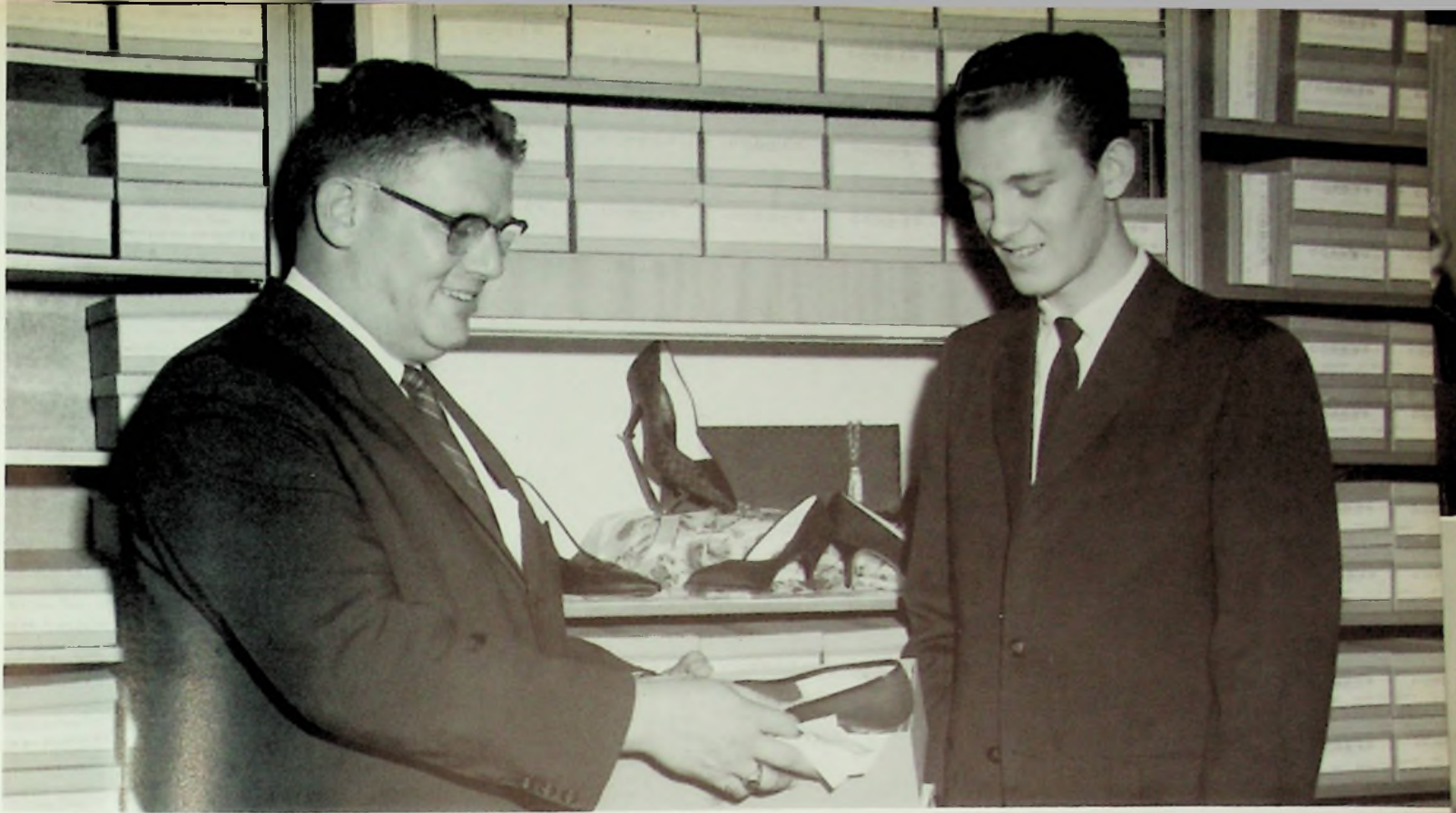

Cooperative office education coordinates work experience with the school program; thus, theory and practice are more closely integrated, and students find greater meaning in their studies.

This coordinating of work and study increases student motivation. As students see relationships between the duties they perform on the job and the things they are learning in the classroom, greater interest in their work develops.

# TROJAN FOOTBALL RECORD—1962 SEASON

## CHARLESTON STONEWALL JACKSON SLICES P.H.S. IN OPENER 31-0 Municipal Stadium — September 7, 1962

A powerful Stonewall Jackson team ripped through the smaller, less-experienced Trojan squad in the season opener and Bill Apel's debut as head coach of Portsmouth High's football team.

Lack of actual game experience was costly for the Troy men. Only four seniors with previous service played in the game. The other players were mostly juniors and sophomores participating in their first varsity game.

Although the Trojans were unable to muster much of an offense, they managed to gain an edge in first downs, netting eight while holding the Generals to seven.

The team received much spirited backing from the cheer-ali-ers, spectators, and the band, proving the students were behind the Trojans all the way.

## McKELL STUNS TROY MEN 36 to 6 Municipal Stadium — September 14, 1962

It was a well-gear-ed McKell High School football team that stormed through the Portsmouth Trojans and, for the first time, handed PHS a 36-6 defeat.

McKell repeatedly made big holes in the Trojan defensive line on the gridiron, gaining most of its yardage with off-tackle slants and end runs. However, one bright spot for PHS was the improved showing of their offensive.

The Bulldogs scored once in the first three periods and twice in the fourth. Bob Jackson made the only TD for PHS late in the first quarter. A pass from Bob Novinger to Ken Sanderlin picked up 23 yards in the drive for the TD. The attempt for extra points proved a failure.

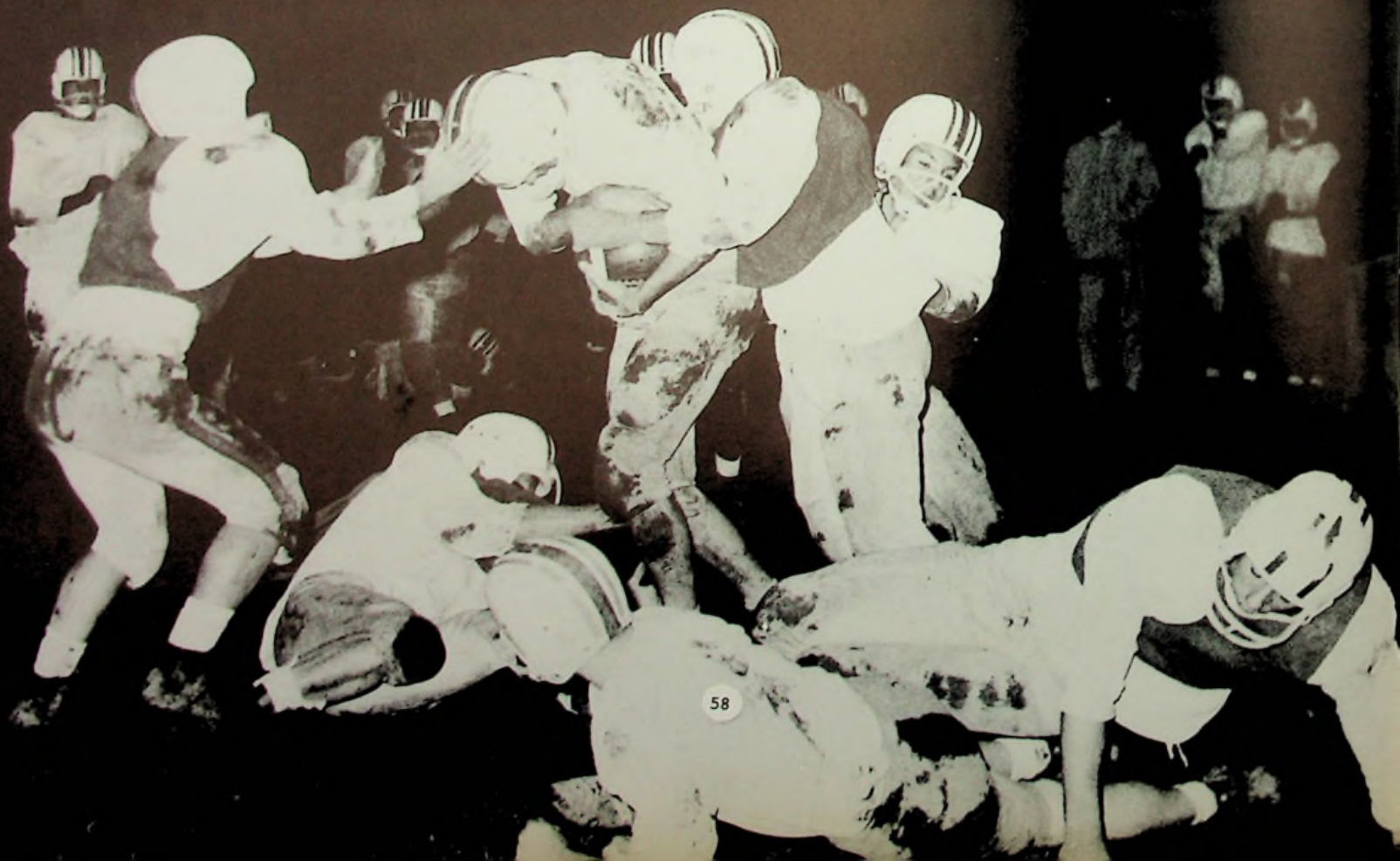
## CINCINNATI WALNUT HILLS HANDS TROJANS 3rd DEFEAT Municipal Stadium — September 21

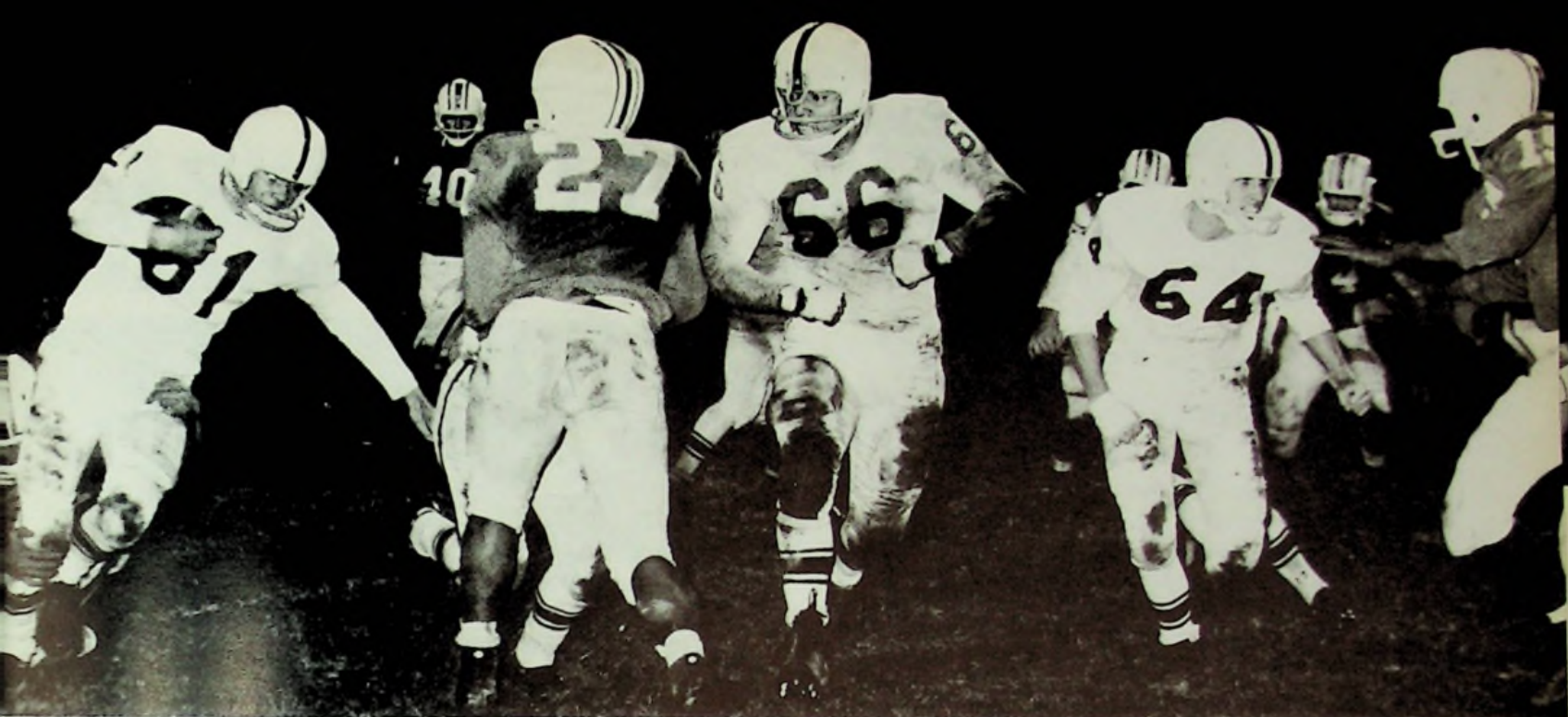
The second half showed that the PHS eleven were somewhat improved, although by the beginning of the third quarter the score of 24-0 had placed the game out of reach.

The Troy men were hit hard by these three TD's and never recovered. The lightning-fast backs of South roared down the gridiron to go on record with 24-0 at the end of eight minutes of play.

Portsmouth was unable to get a serious scoring drive under way throughout the game. They penetrated into South's territory three times; once in the second, and again in the third, and finally, once in the last when they recovered a fumble.

This was the fourth Trojan defeat in the football season; and it really started the GOL competition off with a beautiful beginning.

**CAVALIERS SMASH TROJANS 24-0**  
 Herrnstein Stadium — October 5, 1962

The Cavaliers of Chillicothe stunned the Trojans by defeating them for the third straight year after 24 years of consecutive losses. The defeat was the fifth for the Men of Troy.

Chillicothe, with a speedy and powerful backfield, ran through and around the Trojan line with little resistance.

The Cavaliers' defense also was a strong factor in stopping the Portsmouth team on the ground and making their passing attack almost useless.

Chillicothe returned the opening kick and marched 62 yards in 13 plays to score. From here the Cavaliers dominated the offensive action of the contest and scored three more touchdowns to end the game 24-0.

**MIDDLETOWN ROUTS PHS IN HOMECOMING**  
 Municipal Stadium — October 12, 1962

Portsmouth High School suffered through one of its longest nights in football history when the Middies went on a record-breaking scoring spree to take a 98-14 victory over the Trojans in PHS's second GOL clash.

As a result of the game, the scoring total set a new record for Middletown, and the Trojans lost by the biggest margin in 22 years.

The Middies scored 13 of the 15 times that they had possession of the ball! Thus the only bright spots in the game for PHS were the 14 points that it scored, the most scored in any one game this year. Bob Jackson and Dave Bates each scored a TD, and Bates added the two conversion points.

**TROJANS BOW TO HAMILTON GARFIELD 44-6**  
 Municipal Stadium — October 19, 1962

PHS went down to its seventh straight defeat of the season and its third in the Greater Ohio League, as Hamilton Garfield powered its way to a 44-6 decision. The Trojans and Griffins played fairly even throughout the first half, but Garfield's reserve strength wore the Trojans down in the second half and turned the game into a runaway.

PHS scored midway in the second quarter when a bad center on a punt attempt was downed by Garfield on its two-yard line. The Troy

Men took over and Bob Jackson triumphed for the TD. However, the Griffins continued to dominate the entire game, and the Trojans found the Hamilton defensive unit too stubborn to move.

**TROJANS STAY WINLESS — DROP TO LIMA 51-6**  
 Lima Athletic Field — October 26, 1962

The Lima Spartans threw a punishing ground attack and strong defense against the Portsmouth Trojans to run off with a 51-6 victory. This was the eighth defeat for the Troy Men, their fourth defeat in the GOL. This game marked the end of Trojan participation in the GOL, having been voted out of that league.

After Lima got its ground attack rolling, the Spartans were hard to stop from gaining easy yardage. Five different Lima backs crossed the goal line.

The one and only Trojan TD came in the third quarter when Portsmouth was trailing 37-0. Bob Jackson set up the score with a 56-yard jaunt to the Lima 14, and then raced 13 yards to the 1, and finally on the third carry bulled over for the score.

**THE DETERMINED TROJANS YIELD TO ASHLAND TOMCATS 42-12**  
 Ashland Stadium — November 2, 1962

For the first time this season the Trojans got the jump on their opposition, but went down to a ninth defeat as the Ashland Tomcats gained a 42-12 victory.

The Trojans' Bob Jackson, in the first 52 seconds of the game, ran 72 yards for a TD. This gave PHS its first lead over its opponents. The second TD for Portsmouth resulted when Jim Cyrus received a pass from Bob Novinger and raced into the end zone from the 10-yard line.

Even with these runs, the Tomcats kept plowing through to gain 42 points. The Trojans helped the Tomcats as they fumbled three times with Ashland recovering.

Although the Trojans had determination, the Tomcats had the weight and ability; thus they won the victory.

**IRONTON'S HERD TRAMPLES TROJAN WARRIORS IN RAIN, MUD, 34-8**

The Mud Bowl — November 9, 1962

The Trojans maintained their perfect record as they went down to their 10th straight defeat leaving them 0-10 for the season. This defeat by the Trojans ties them with the team of 1951, the first team in Trojan history to go down to total defeat.

A heavy downfall of rain made the field one huge "mud bowl," and the numbers on the players' uniforms were obliterated in a few minutes.

Eleven fumbles occurred in this muddy game, Portsmouth recovering 6 of them. The Troy Men couldn't take advantage of them until the fourth quarter. The lone TD occurred when a fumble gave the ball to PHS on the 22-yard line, and from there it was scored in five plays. Bob Novinger was credited with the TD and the extra points.

Ironton managed to outmaneuver the Trojans' offense and chalk up 5 TD's. Thus the Tigers won their second game of the season.

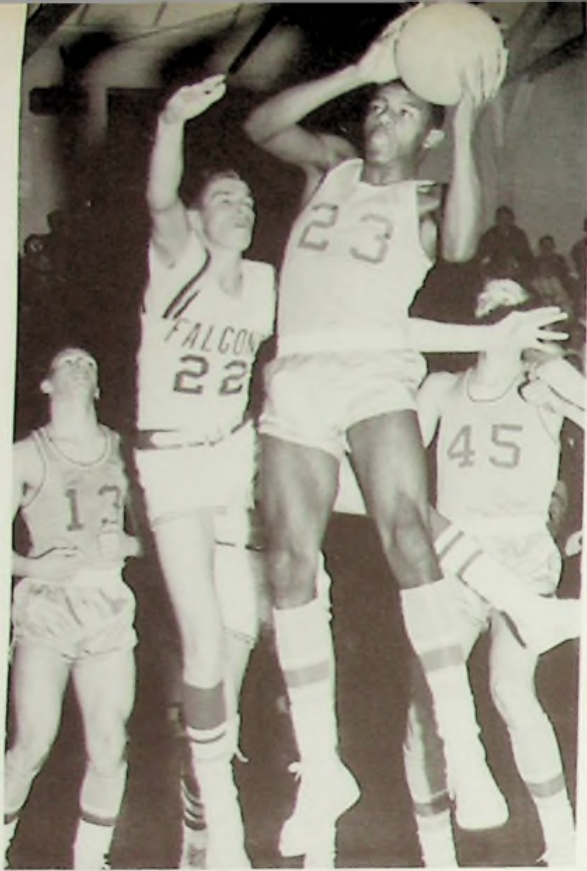

The Portsmouth Trojans won the Athens district tournament and the trophy for the Class AA District Championship.



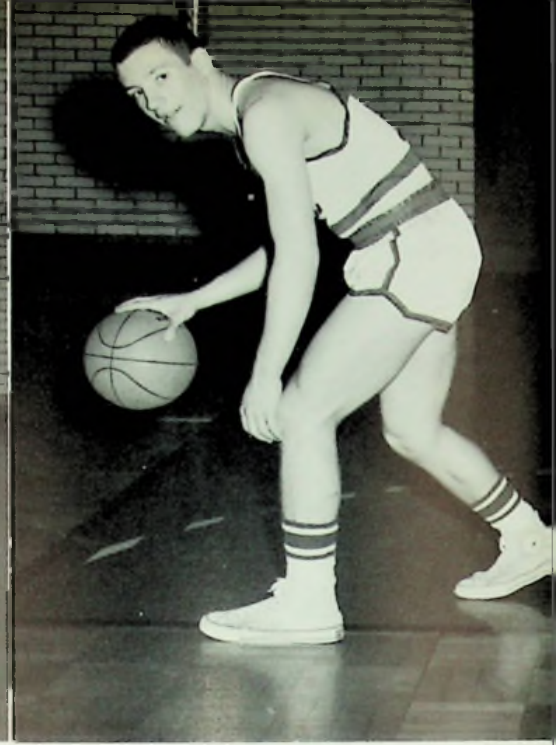

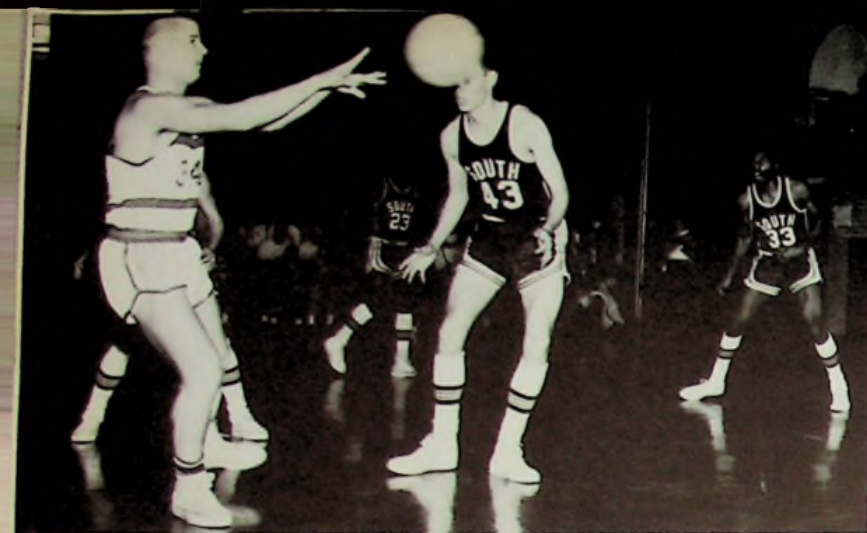
Bob Novinger, a junior, was the scoring gun as he hit a season's high of 28 markers.

The score was tied 13 times with the lead changing on 11 occasions. The Troy Men, minus a flu-stricken Barney Apel, had to battle back on the final 3:08 of the last period to gain the win after trailing 53-58. Garfield's top scorer was held to only seven points.

### TROJANS WIN LAST HOME GAME OVER LIMA 76-62

The Portsmouth Trojans captured second place in the Greater Ohio League by taking a wild 76-62 victory over Lima's Spartans. PHS Played a terrific first half but became erratic in the third period; midway in the fourth quarter they came to life again. The Trojans won the game in the first half when they scored 15 straight points while keeping Lima scoreless. PHS hit everything from layups to foul shots during this time.

This was the last home game for seniors Terry Routt and Barney Apel. Scorewise Larry Hisle led PHS with 22 points.

### TROJANS OUTCLASSED BY MIDDLETOWN 105-64

The Middletown Middies, Number-1-ranked in the state of Ohio, tied their biggest point total of the season by defeating the Portsmouth Trojans 105-64. PHS finished its season at 11-5 with a 5-3 record in GOL competition.

## WHAT FREEDOM MEANS TO ME

A young man stepped into a poll booth election day and voted for the candidates he thought were best. An eager editor printed his views on a proposed levy. A Negro was elected to the state legislature. In a Methodist neighborhood a Jewish family of immigrants found welcome. A Roman Catholic took the oath of office as 35th President of the United States. Where do these things happen? In my country, America.

These instances illustrate the freedom you and I enjoy. Yet, to most of us Americans the concept of freedom is a bit vague. Like the air we breathe, we take it for granted. Sometimes we have to be shocked into a proper regard for its meaning by seeing a picture such as appeared in a popular magazine showing the bullet-ridden body of an East German whose hunger for freedom had been so intensified by its lack that he died in its search by the wall which was the only thing between him and freedom. His action was not an impulse, but a calculated risk. For him, nothing, not even death itself, was too much to risk in return for freedom.

I can best demonstrate the merits of freedom by comparing it to its counterpart—despotism. There are no better examples of these two forces than the United States of America and the Soviet Union. A noted educator and traveler, Dr. Firby, recently made the observation that there are four fundamental dreams of mankind. One is the dream of peace; the second dream is having enough to eat; a third is the dream of self-government; the fourth, the attainment of dignity for all members of the human family. Who can assess these dreams, common to all men, without realizing how fortunate he is to be an American, or how great is his heritage of freedom! Who, but an ungrateful person, would not join in the solemn prayer "God Bless America"!

Let's examine the records of the United States and the Soviet Union with regard to the climate each supplies for the realization of these four human goals. Our record in peace is almost without blemish. The forbearance shown in the Cuban crisis is typical of our country's attitude toward peace up to the point where our national security is endangered. Russia on the other hand is committed to a policy of violence, so much so that they inseparably link progress and violence. As for the second dream—enough to eat—our problem is to curtail our farm production because our graineries are already overflowing. Needy nations are benefited by our surpluses. Our totalitarian rivals must resort to an iron curtain to conceal the shortcomings of slave laborers on their state farms. Self-government, the third dream, has reached its grandest expression in this, our "land of the free." In Russia such ideas as the two-party system and the Bill of Rights are impossible for they believe man has no purpose except to serve the state. None of these dreams mean so much to me, personally, as the fourth—the attainment of dignity for all members of the human family.

As a Negro, a member of one of the largest minorities in America, I have very definite and deep-seated convictions. Little Rock, and Oxford were stages on which I saw portrayed facets of human nature, emotional immaturity, and race hatred, which good Americans wish did not exist. And we may be sure our enemies did not fail to exploit these incidents to their advantage. Let our enemies write the full story and tell of countless cities throughout this land where the process of raising human dignity ran more smoothly. Let them tell of the gain made in civil rights and economic opportunities on all fronts, and ask them to match them. Add then, these are the rewards of freedom and I am proud to be its champion.

Yvonne also won \$1,000 in the Ohio VFW contest after having won the same contest a year ago in 1962. In addition to winning two State-of-Ohio awards, she also won in District 12 competition the last three years.
