## TRADE AND INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION <br> O. M. GWINN

Supervisor-Director
Vocational education prepares boys to enter trades and industrial occupations. Three hours each day are spent in the "shop" of the student's choice where the correct use of hand and machine tools are taught. The work performed in the shop must be on a useful basis under actual job conditions so far as possible. Students are given individual attention rather than group instruction in their shop training.

Approximately thirty percent of the student's time in school each day is devoted to the study of trade technology which includes shop mathematics, science, blueprint reading, sketching and trade information. These subjects differ from general subjects in that they are designed to apply directly to the chosen trade.

## TROJAN FOOTBALL RECORD-1962 SEASON

CHARLESTON STONEWALL JACKSON SLICES P.H.S. IN OPENER 31-0
Municipal Stadium - September 7. 1962
A powerful Stonewall Jackson team ripped through the smaller, lessexperienced Trojan squad in the season opener and Bill Apel's debut as head coach of Portsmouth High's football team.

Lack of actual game experience was costly for the Troy men. Only fcur seniors with previous service played in the game. The other players were mostly juniors and sophomores participating in their first varsity game

Althouah the Troians were unable to muster much of an offense they managed to gain an edge in first downs, netting eight while holdina the Generals to seven.
The team received much spirited backing from the cheer-a-liers, spec fotors, and the band, proving the students were behind the Trojons all the way.

McKELL STUNS TROY MEN 36 to 6
Municipal Stadium - September 14, 1962
It was a well-geared McKell High School football team that stormed through the Portsmouth Trojans and. for the first time. handed PHS a 36-6 defeat.

McKell repeatedly made big holes in the Troian defensive line on the gridiron. gaining most of its yardage with off-tackle slants and end runs. However, one bright spot for PHS was the improved showing of their offensive
The Bulldogs scored once in the first three periods and twice in the fourth. Bob Jackson made the only TD for PHS late in the first quarter. A Dass from Bob Novinger to Ken Sanderlin picked up 23 yards in the drive for the TD. The attempt for extro points proved a failure

## CINCINNATI WALNUT HILLS HANDS TROJANS 3rd DEFEAT

This was the fourth Troian defeat in the football season: and it really started the GOL competition off with a beoutiful beginning.

## CAVALIERS SMASH TROJANS 24-0

Herrnstein Stadium - October 5, 1962
The Cavaliers of Chillicothe stunned the Trojans by defeating them for the third straight year after 24 years of consecutive losses. The defeat was the fifth for the Men of Troy.

Chillicothe, with a speedy and powerful backfield, ran through and around the Trojan line with little resistance.
The Cavaliers defense also was a strong factor in stopping the Portsmouth team on the ground and making their passing attack almost useless.

## MIDDLETOWN ROUTS PHS IN HOMECOMING

Portsmouth High School suffered through one of its longest nights in football history when the Middies went on a record-breaking scoring spree to take a 98.14 victory over the Trojans in PHS's second GOL elash.

This was the eighth defeat for the Troy Men, their fourth defeat in the GOL. This game marked the end of Trojon participation in the GOL. having been voted out of that league.

After Lima got its ground attack rolling, the Spartans were hard to stop from gaining easy yardage. Five different Limo backs crossed the goal line.

## WHAT FREEDOM MEANS TO ME

A young man stepped into a poll booth election day and voted for the candidates he thought were best. An eager editor printed his views on a proposed levy. A Negro was elected to the state legislature. In a Methodist neighborhood a Jewish family of immigrants found welcome. A Roman Catholic took the oath of office as 35th President of the United States. Where do these things happen? In my country, America.

These instances illustrate the freedom you and I enjoy. Yet, to most of us Americans the concept of freedom is a bit vague. Like the air we breathe, we take it for granted. Sometimes we have to be shocked into a proper regard for its meaning by seeing a picture such as appeared in a popular magazine showing the bullet-ridden body of an East German whose hunger for freedom had been so intensified by its lack that he died in its search by the wall which was the only thing between him and freedom. His action was not an impulse, but a calculated risk. For him, nothing, not even death itself, was too much to risk in return for freedom.

I can best demonstrate the merits of freedom by comparing it to its counterpart-despotism. There are no better examples of these two forces than the United States of America and the Soviet Union. A noted educator and traveler, Dr. Firby, recently made the observation that there are four fundamental dreams of mankind. One is the dream of peace; the second dream is having enough to eat; a third is the dream of self-government; the fourth, the attainment of dignity for all members of the human family. Who can assess these dreams, common to all men. without realizing how fortunate he is to be an American, or how great is his heritage of freedom! Who, but an ungrateful person, would not join in the solemn prayer "God Bless America"!

Let's examine the records of the United States and the Soviet Union with regard to the climate each supplies for the realization of these four human goals. Our record in peace is almost without blemish. The forebearance shown in the Cuban crisis is typical of our country's attitude toward peace up to the point where our national security is endangered. Russia on the other hand is committed to a policy of violence, so much so that they inseparably link progress and violence. As for the second dreamenough to eat-our problem is to curtail our farm production because our graneries are already overflowing. Needy nations are benelited by our surpluses. Our totalitarian rivels must resort to an iron curtain to conceal the shortcomings of slave laborers on their state farms. Self-government, the third dream, has reached its grandest expression in this, our "land of the free." In Russia such ideas as the two-party system and the Bill of Rights are impossible for they believe man has no purpose except to serve the state. None of these dreams mean so much to me, personally, as the fourth-the attainment of dignity for all members of the human family.

As a Negro, a member of one of the largest minorities in America, I have very definite and deepseated convictions. Little Rock, and Oxford were stages on which I saw portrayed facets of human nature, emotional immaturity, and race hatred, which good Americans wish did not exist. And we may be sure our enemies did not fail to exploit these incidents to their advantage. Let our enemies write the full story and tell of countless cities throughout this land where the process of raising human dignity ran more smoothly. Let them tell of the gain made in civil rights and economic opportunities on all fronts, and ask them to match them. Add then, these are the rewards of freedom and I am proud to be its champion.

Senior Yvonne Ferguson won the third-place award in the national "Voice of Democracy" contest sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Yvonne received a $\$ 2,500$ scholarship as one of the top national winners chosen from 55 finalists.

Yvonne also won $\$ 1,000$ in the Ohio VFW contest after having won the same contest a year ago in 1962. In addition to winning two State-of-Ohio awards, she also won in District 12 competition the last three years.
