Our local school board is an elected group of men who organize and maintain a system of graded schools in our township. They give many hours of time to see that our school system operates efficiently.

Mr. Arthur D. Preston is the Local Superintendent of Wheelersburg Schools. This means that he is very busy in the field of public relations. Mr. Preston is the coordinator between the Board of Education and the entire personnel of the school system.
