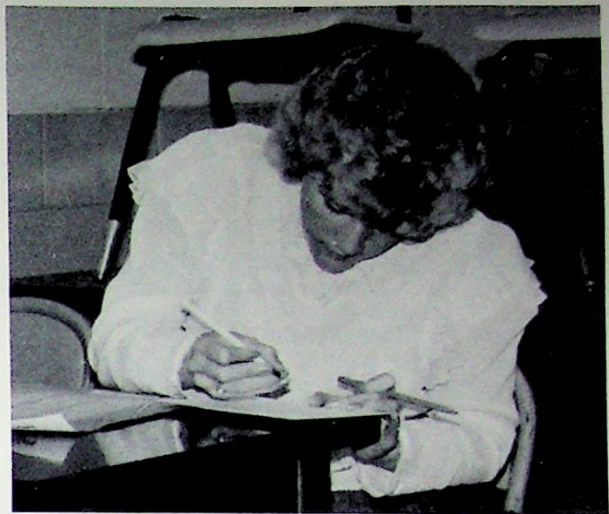

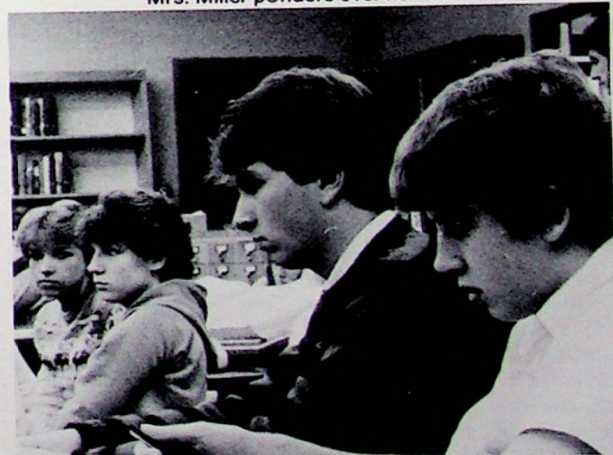

The Junior Classical League, which consists of all first and second year Latin students, had a very successful and productive year, with much enjoyment for the members in 1983.

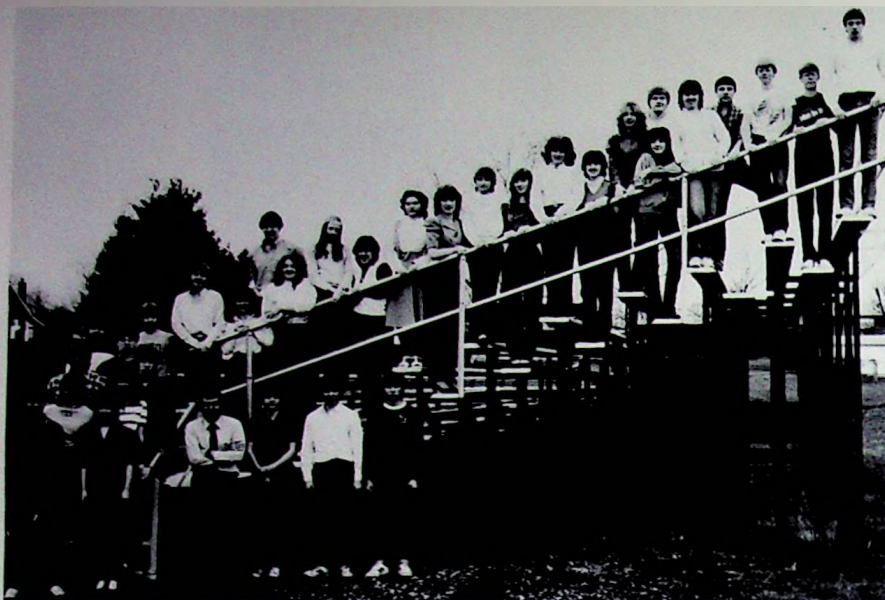

In addition to the usual decorations, at Christmas the library was converted into a virtual "Christmas Town." The "elves" worked very hard and were awarded with a pizza party.

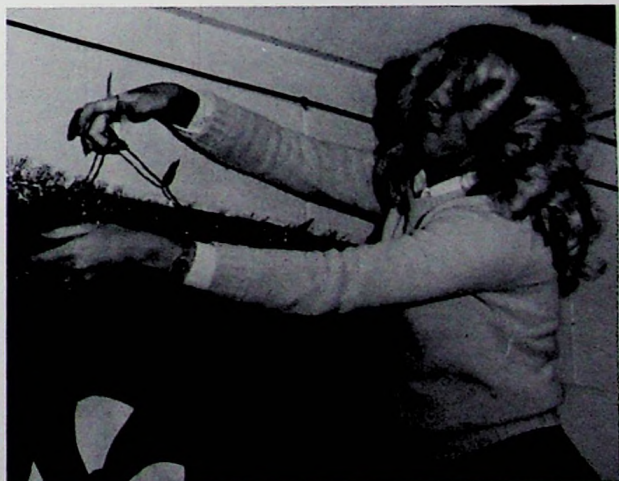

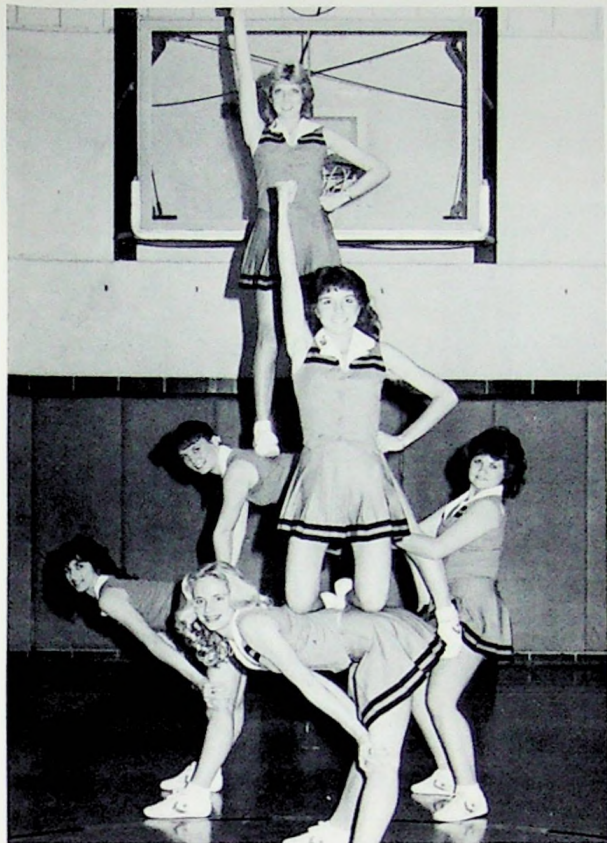

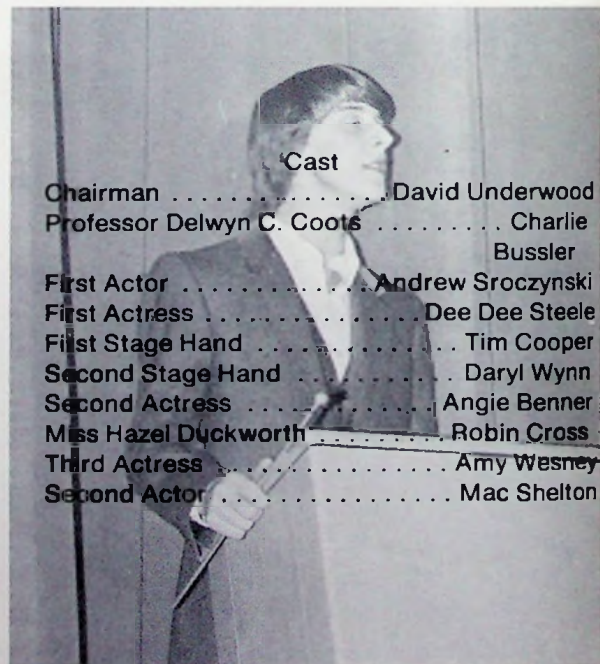

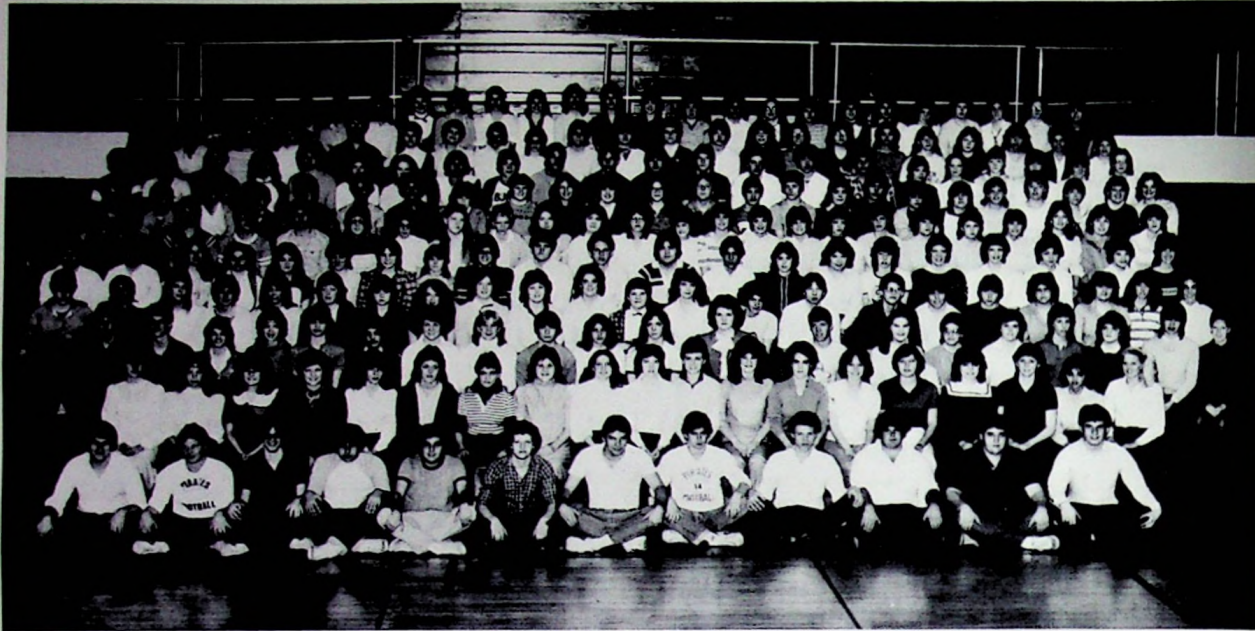

Tylenol Deaths Cause Panic

In October of 1982, seven mysterious deaths occurred in the Chicago area due to the cyanide poisoning of Extra-Strength Tylenol Capsules. The death of twelve-year old Mary Kellerman was the first in a string of seven, which began a nationwide panic. Not only were poison control centers swamped with calls from fearful Tylenol users, but officials were overwhelmed at the number of calls reporting products that had been tampered with. Although most of these reports were false, many proved to be valid, which increased the panic among American citizens.

Although in the beginning the officials' main concern was to minimize the number of consumers using Tylenol, their over-riding concern was to discover the source of the cyanide. During interrogation, the Tylenol Manufacturing Company admitted that they use cyanide to test for the absence of lead in their product to assure its safety, but the company claimed that their security methods were strict. With this information, investigators believed that they may have discovered the source of the cyanide, but they later realized that the Tylenol responsible for the seven deaths came from two factories, one in Pennsylvania and one in Texas. It seemed unlikely that the Tylenol could have been contaminated in each plant, so officials deduced that the tampering must have occurred in the store. This meant that investigators were left with a search for a madman, a random killer.

Because of a \$1 million extortion letter written to the Tylenol company, officials believed they had found the guilty persons. The suspects were James and Leann Lewis, also known as Robert and Nancy Richardson. Lewis, after writing that extortion letter, seemed a likely suspect because his record shows that he has a history of being somewhat mentally unbalanced and has been admitted to mental institutions twice before officials traced the Lewises to New York, where it appears they had been living when the tampering would have had to occur. The investigators, however, never caught up with the Lewises, and the case is as yet unsolved. The panic, however, has subsided. People have begun using Tylenol products again, and steps have been taken to prevent similar incidents from happening in the future.

THE MIRACLE OF GIVING LIFE

Dr. William DeVries of the University of Utah Medical Center has been congratulated as one of the most competent surgeons in his field. As chief of Cardiothoracic surgery, DeVries performed one of the most outstanding technical and humane miracles of our time.

Barney Clark, a dentist of Seattle, at 62 years old was four days from death when DeVries replaced his deteriorating heart with a plastic one. DeVries and a team of the medical center had been experimenting with the heart on sheep and calves. After meeting all of the F.D.A. requirements, Clark and DeVries discussed, and decided to use the Jarvik-7 plastic heart.

This was not the first artificial heart transplant. In 1969 and 1981 two patients died shortly after such transplants. Barney Clark's heart was the first transplant intended as a long-term replacement. After a 7½ hour operation, Clark was listed in critical condition for a few days. He improved and the outlook was very good. He survived for 112 days. Unfortunately he died on Thursday, March 24, 1983.

His death was not caused by the heart failing. It was the one remaining functioning part. His lungs and kidneys malfunctioned due to a medication side effect prescribed for his pneumonia, which developed a poison in his blood.

Through Clark's entire time in the hospital with the heart he was cheery. Though he died, DeVries and all the doctors thank him for his contribution to science studies. They feel as he did when he said a day before he died, "It's worth it."

THE DEATH OF GRACE KELLY

As in the death of any favorite person, the death of Grace Kelly was quite a shock to all her fans.

Grace Kelly grew up in Philadelphia. Here she not only made her big entrance into the spotlight as a glamorous movie star, but went on to become an elegant Princess. Her career in movies lasted only five years. While working with many famous stars, she was awarded an Oscar for the award winning movie "The Country Girl" in 1955. Her movie career ended when she retired to wed Prince Rainer of Monaco in 1956. Much of her time was spent working for favorite charities such as the Red Cross and the Princess Grace Ballet School. Nine years after her marriage, much of the attention went to mothering her children Caroline, Albert, and Stephanie.

Many times she was asked if she would ever make another Hollywood movie. Her reply was

always no. Although she did hope to write a memoir, the things she looked forward to the most were to see her children happily married and being a grandmother.

Songs that were heard blaring from a box as everyone jammed out were "1999," by Prince, "Hungry Like the Wolf," by Duran Duran, "Beat It," by Michael Jackson, "Love Lifts Us Up," by Joe Cocker and Jennifer Warren, "Down Under," by Men At Work, "Billy Jean," by Michael Jackson, and "Little Red Corvette," by Prince.

FAREWELL M*A*S*H

There was a death in the American family on February 28, 1983. After 11 years and 251 episodes, M*A*S*H came to the end of its remarkable life as the most intelligent, true to life, passionate, imaginable, and extremely funny comedy series in the history of U.S. television. As might be expected the show went out in style. The last show — a scheduled two-and-a-half hour final, written and directed by star Alan Alda — was expected to draw one of the largest audiences ever to tune in to a T.V. show.

M*A*S*H lasted about three times as long as the Korean War that served as its setting. It had been nominated for 99 Emmy Awards and won 14 of them. Even in its 11th year it ranked as the third most popular show of the 1982-83 season, trailing only *60 Minutes* and *Dallas*. And, counting reruns, which are shown up to three times daily on 194 stations nationwide, the series in recent years has been watched by 224 million viewers every week.

The series starred, throughout the years, eleven actors. They were: Alan Alda (Capt. Benjamin Franklin "Hawkeye" Pierce), Wayne Rogers (Capt. John "Trapper John" McIntyre), Loretta Swit (Maj. Margaret "Hot Lips" Houlihan), Larry Linville (Maj. Frank "Ferret Face" Burns), Gary Burghoff (Cpl. Walter "Radar" O'Reilly), William Christopher (Father John Francis Patrick Mulcahy), Jamie Farr (Cpl. Max Klinger), MacLean Stevenson (Lt. Col. Henry Blake), Henry Morgan (Col. Sherman T. Potter), Mike Farrell (Capt. B. J. Hummicut),

David Ogden Stiers (Maj. Charles Emerson Winchester, III).

When asked why they were stopping M*A*S*H, Alda commented, "The reason we're doing it is only that we love it so much. It's a fear that we won't be able to do our best for a whole season. We don't want to put ourselves through the agony of running dry. We want to finish at a point where we can still say we're proud. I've been choked up all day. Every time I did anything, I thought, this is the last time I'll do it, and I start to cry." Perhaps everyone around the world watching it cried that night. Farewell M*A*S*H.

MILESTONES

LEONID BREZHNEV, the General Secretary of the Communist Party's Central Committee and President of the Soviet Union, died November 10, 1982, at the age of 75. The cause: heart and vascular disease. He was replaced by Yuri Andropov.

LEROY "SATCHEL" PAIGE, known for his record breaking

fastball, was the first black pitcher in the American League. Paige died of a heart attack at the age of 75 in June of 1982.

APOLLO 13 ASTRONAUT JOHN L. SWIGERT, JR., died of lung and bone marrow cancer in January, 1983, at the age of 51. Swigert died one week before he was to be sworn in as a Republican Congressman from Colorado.

MARTY ROBBINS, well-known pop-country singer, famous for his song "El Paso," died of a heart attack at the age of 57.

HERMAN LAY, creator of the first national brand of potato chips, died of cancer in December, 1982.

MARTY FELDMAN, best remembered as Igor in Mel Brooke's *Young Frankenstein*, passed away after filming a new comedy in Mexico City. He died in December of 1982 at the age of 49.

SOUTH KOREAN LIGHTWEIGHT BOXER DUK KOO KIM died of a brain hemorrhage suffered in a title fight with Ray "Boom-Boom" Mancini. He died in November, 1982, at the age of 23.

GRACE KELLY, better known as Princess Grace of Monaco, a previous award winning actress, died in September, 1982, of a stroke and injuries suffered in a car accident at the age of 52. Her best-known films are *High Noon* and *High Society*.

FAMOUS AWARD-WINNING ACTRESS INGRID BERGMAN died of cancer in September, 1982, at age 67. Her most famous film was *Casablanca*, and she received much recognition for her performance in *A Woman Called Golda*.

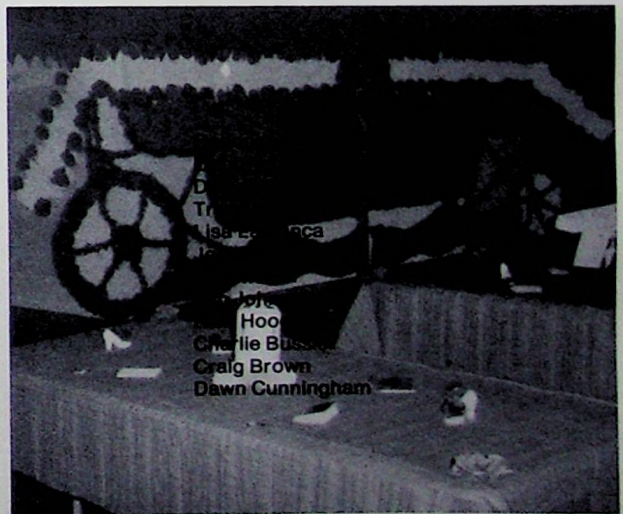

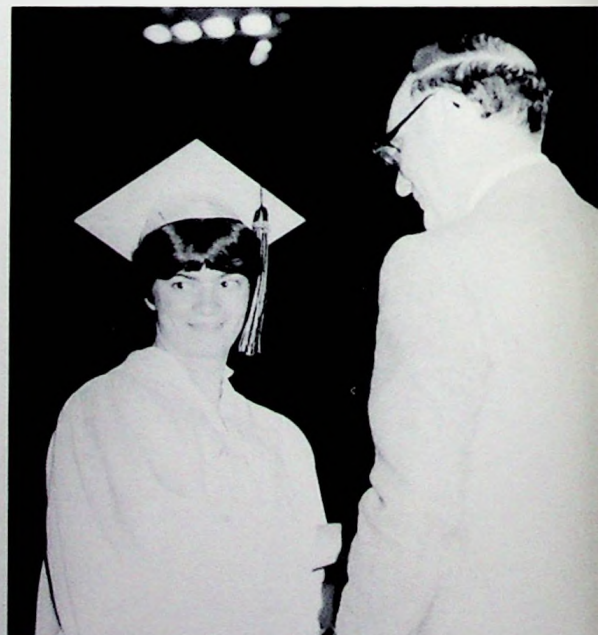

Coaches Boll and Hale also had a winning season with the reserve team.

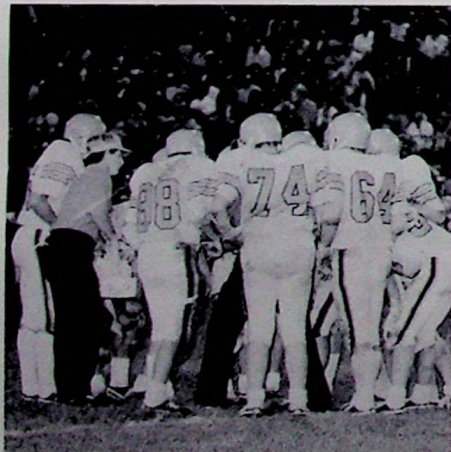

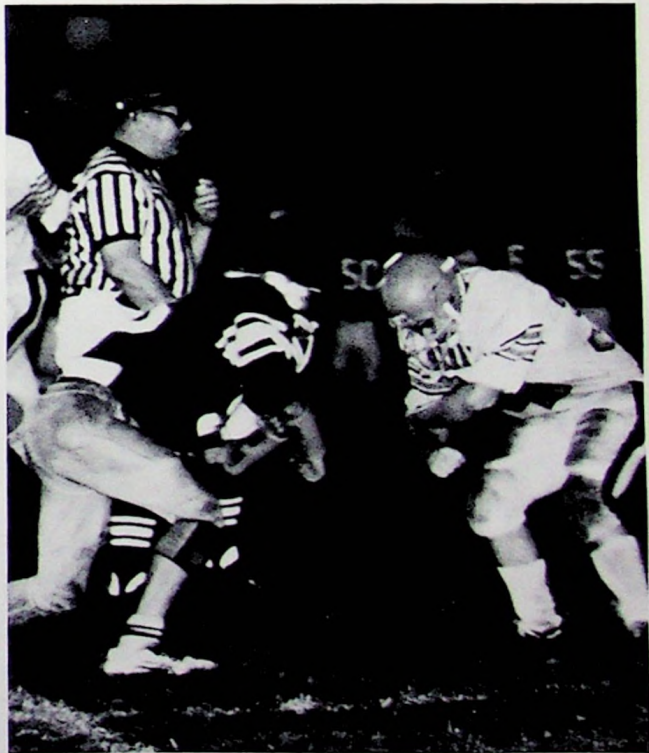

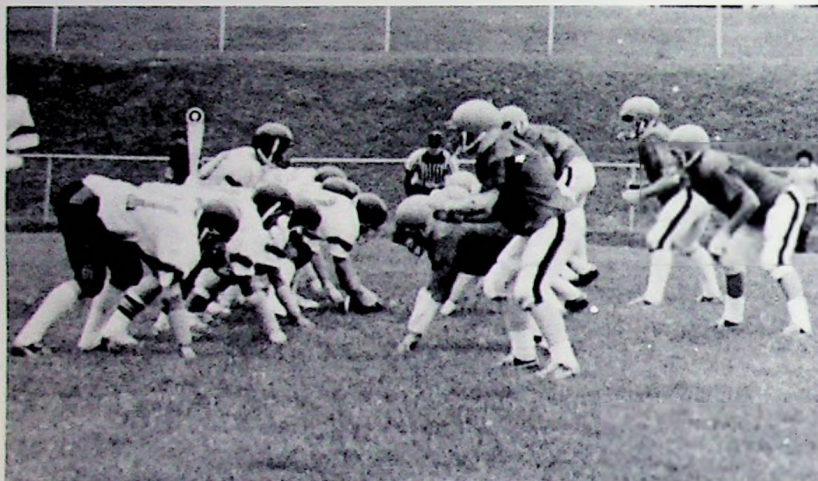


A Hard-Hitting Team

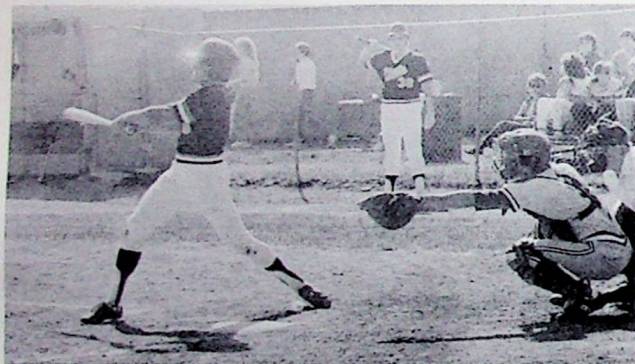

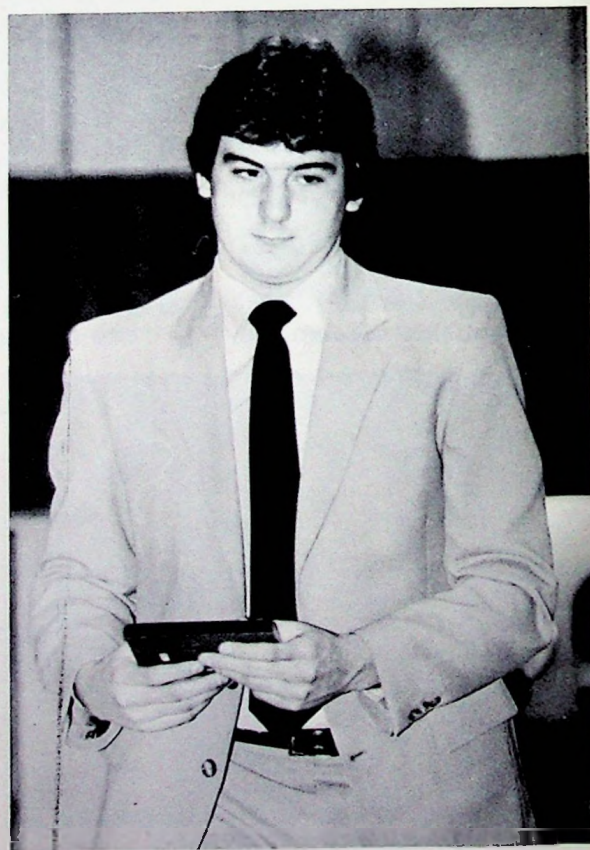

There was also a banquet held at the close of the year.



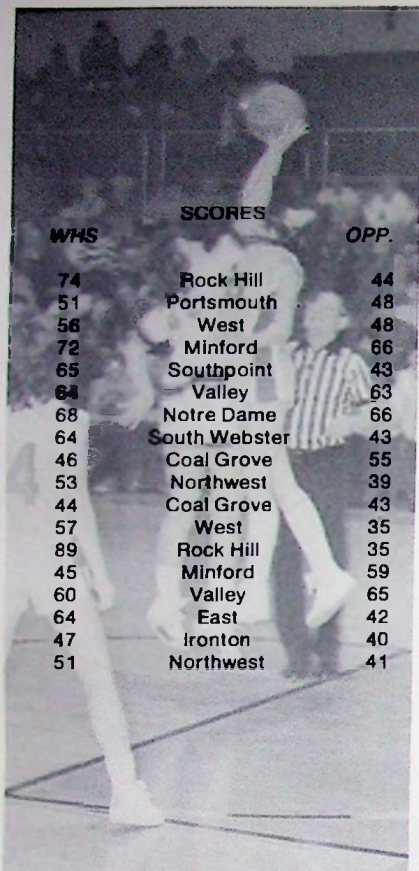

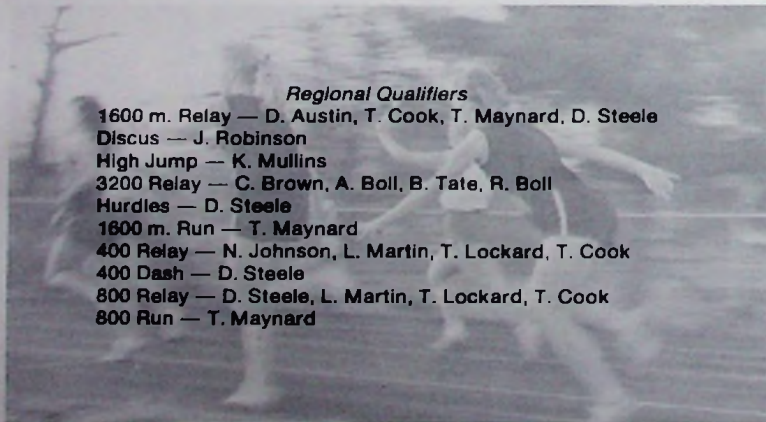
more than one event, showing the Burg's versatility in every event.

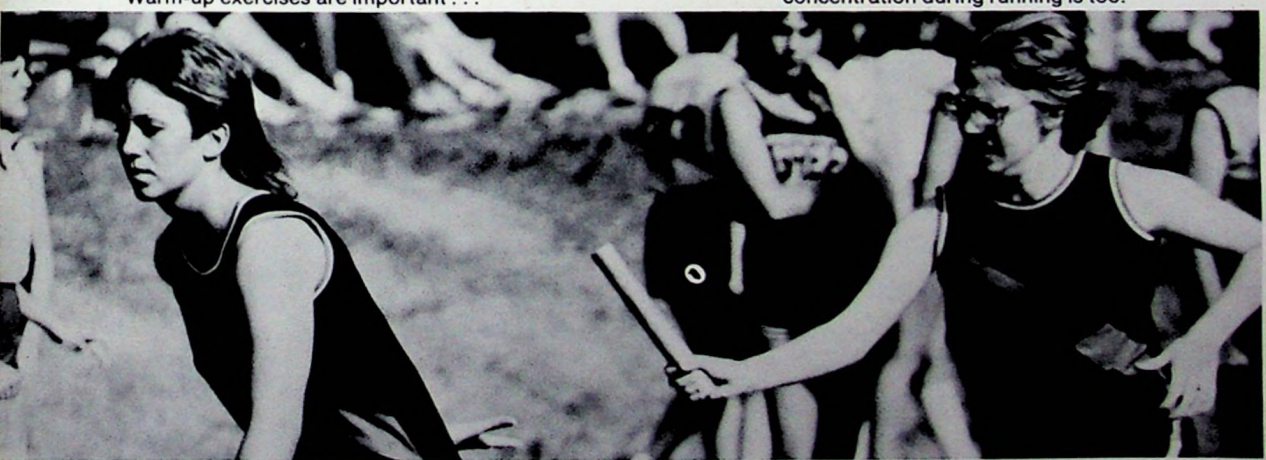

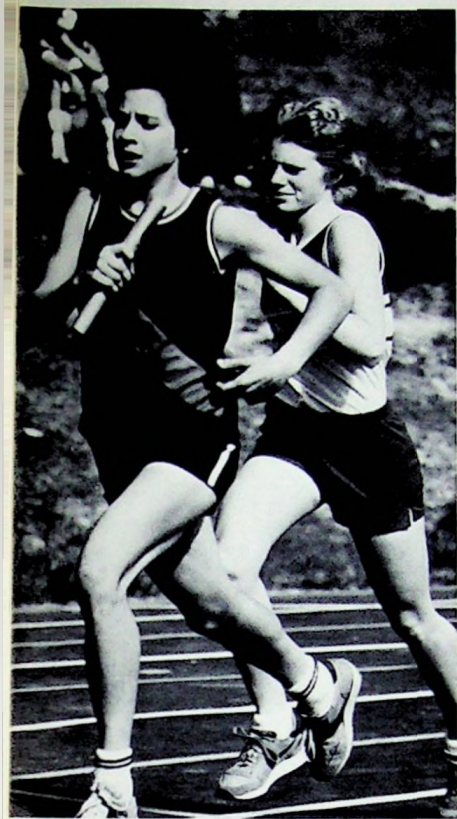

Computer Science Added to Curriculum

The completion of the new rooms onto the building this year also provided for a new course being added to the curriculum. The semester elective in Computer Science gained immediate popularity with students.

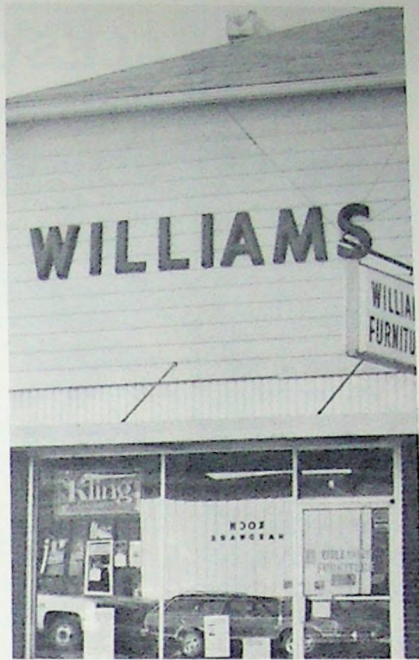
Miss Riepenhoff, Miss Turner, and Mr. Keller each taught one class of Computer Science during the second semester. Approximately forty-five seniors received instruction in the historical development of computing devices, in parts of the computer (hardware), and in programming in the language BASIC.

Students learned to write their own programs and correct or "debug" them to make the computer perform calculations, print tables of information, "draw" pictures, and perform a variety of other functions. They gained practice in storing programs on a floppy diskette and in loading programs from a diskette into the computer that they were using.

The computer lab presently is equipped with seven Apple II Plus microcomputers and a printer. Six of the microcomputers are for student use with all microcomputers being connected together through a network to the central microcomputer used by the instructor.
