## Tylenol Deaths Cause Panic

In October of 1982, seven mysterious deaths occurred in the Chicago area due to the cyanide poisoning of ExtraStrength Tylenol Capsules. The death of twelve-year old Mary Kellerman was the first in a string of seven, which began a nationwide panic. Not only were poison control centers swamped with calls from fearful Tylenol users, but officials were overwhelmed at the number of calls reporting products that had been tampered with Although most of these reports were false, many proved to be valid, which increased the panic among American citizens.
Although in the beginning the officials' main concern was to mimimize the number of consumers using Tylenol, their over-riding concern was to discover the source of the cyanide. During interrogation, the Tylenol Manufacturing Company admitted that they use cyanide to test for the absence of lead in their product to assure its safety, but the company claimed that their security methods were strict. with this information, investigators believed that they may have discovered the source of the cyanide, but they later realized that the Tylenol responsible for the seven deaths came from two factories, one in Pennsylvania and one in Texas. It seemed unlikely that the Tylenol could have been contaminated in each plant, so officiais deduced that the tampering must have occurred in the store. This meant that investigators were left with a search for a madman, a random killer.

Because of a $\$ 1$ million extortion letter written to the Tylenol company, officials believed they had found the guilty persons. The suspects were James and Leann Lewis, also known as Robert and Nancy Richardson. Lewis, after writing that extortion letter, seemed a likely suspect because his record shows that he has a history of being somewhat mentally unbalanced and has been admitted to mental institutions twice before officials traced the Lewises to New York, where it appears they had been living when the tampering would have had to occur. The investigators, however, never caught up with the Lewises, and the case is as yet unsolved. The panic, however, has subsided. People have begun using Tylenol products again, and steps have been taken to prevent similar incidents from happening in the future.

At one time, Garfield had six of his sixteen books hit the New York Times Best Seller List simultaneously. He also enjoyed the success of his first T.V. Special, Here Comes Garfield. Even with all the attention and fame Garfield has received through the past year, he still thinks it's a "Big, Fat, Hairy Deal?'

On June 21, 1982, Princess Diana gave birth to Prince William Arthur Philip Louis of Wales. The 7 -pound $11 / 2$-ounce Prince is expected to some day rule the United Kingdom.

## THE MIRACLE OF GIVING LIFE

Dr. William DeVries of the University of Utah Medical Center has been congratulated as one of the most competent surgeons in his field. As chief of Cardiothoracic surgery. DeVries performed one of the most outstanding technical and humane miracles of our time.
Barney Clark, a dentist of Seattle, at 62 years old was four days from death when DeVries replaced his deteriorating heart with a plastic one. DeVries and a team of the medical center had been experimenting with the heart on sheep and calves. After meeting all of the F.D.A. requirements, Clark and DeVries discussed, and decided to use the Jarvik-7 plastic heart.
This was not the first artificial heart transplant. In 1969 and 1981 two patients died shortly after such transplants. Barney Clark's heart was the first transplant intended as a longterm replacement. After a $71 / 2$ hour operation, Clark was listed in critical condition for a few days. He improved and the outlook was very good. He survived for 112 days. Unfortunately he died on Thursday. March 24, 1983.

His death was not caused by the heart failing. It was the one remaining functioning part. His lungs and kidneys malfunctioned due to a medication side effect prescribed for his pneumonia, which developed a poison in his blood.

Through Clark's entire time in the hospital with the heart he was cheery. Though he died, DeVries and all the doctors thank him for his contribution to science studies. They feel as he did when he said a day before he died, "It's worth it."

THE DEATH OF GRACE KELLY
As in the Jeath of any favorite person, the death of Grace Kelly was quite a shock to all her fans.

Her career in movies lasted only five years. While working with many famous stars, she was awarded an Oscar for the award winning movie "The Country Girl" in 1955. Her movie career ended when she retired to wed Prince Rainer of Monaco in 1956. Much of her time was spent working for favorite charities such as the Red Cross and the Princess Grace Ballet School. Nine years after her marriage, much of the attention went to mothering her children Caroline, Albert, and Stephanie.

Even in its 11 th year it ranked as the third most popular show of the 1982-83 season, trailing only 60 Minutes and Dallas. And, counting reruns, which are shown up to three times daily on 194 stations nationwide, the series in recent years has been watched by 224 million viewers every week

## Lou Brock Visits the Burg

One of the most exciting events Wheelersburg and the Portsmouth areas were involved in this year was the Lou Brock Scholarship Award. The Scholarship was to be awarded to a student who qualified in four major areas: scholastic integrity, physical fitness, cultural awareness, and community service.

## Computer Science Added to Curriculum

The completion of the new rooms onto the building this year also provided for a new course being added to the curriculum. The semester elective in Computer Science gained immediate popularity with students.

Approximately forty-five seniors received instruction in the historical development of computing devices, in parts of the computer (hardware), and in programming in the language BASIC.

They gained practice in storing programs on a floppy diskette and in loading programs from a diskette into the computer that they were using.
