Together, Orlett and Webb made a good addition to the board and brought a fresh perspective.














Hasta La Vista









Overall the cross-country season was an outstanding and victorious one!









The lady Mohawks ended their season with a record of 10-8.














A very unique prom was just what the seniors were wanting. In order to do this, the senior class decided to step beyond prom tradition and make their prom memorable and exciting.
