


CLASS HISTORY



Girls' Glee Club


In September when school opened. Miss Moore took charge of the Girls Glee Club which had previously been taught by Miss Hazelbeck.

songs,














Boys' Glee Club In 1936 a Boys! Glee Club, the first of its kind in Grant School, was organized by

Grant boys are showing an increasing interest in track and a better showing is expected this year.

GRANT PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION

In common with other organizations in the city, Grant School P. T. A. was interrupted in its monthly meetings by the flood. The organization did accomplish some of its major aims before the deluge, however.




