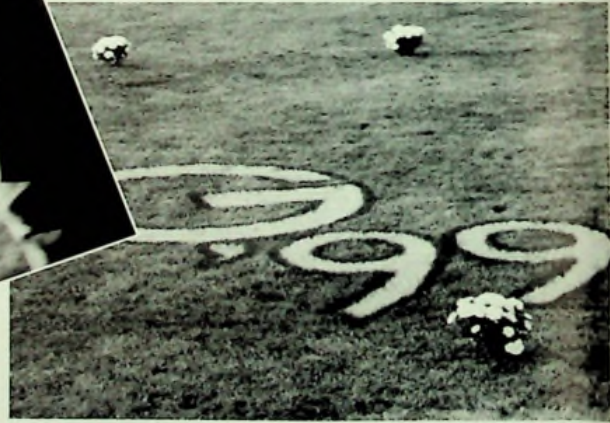
There will be new faces in the staff as well as student body when we begin

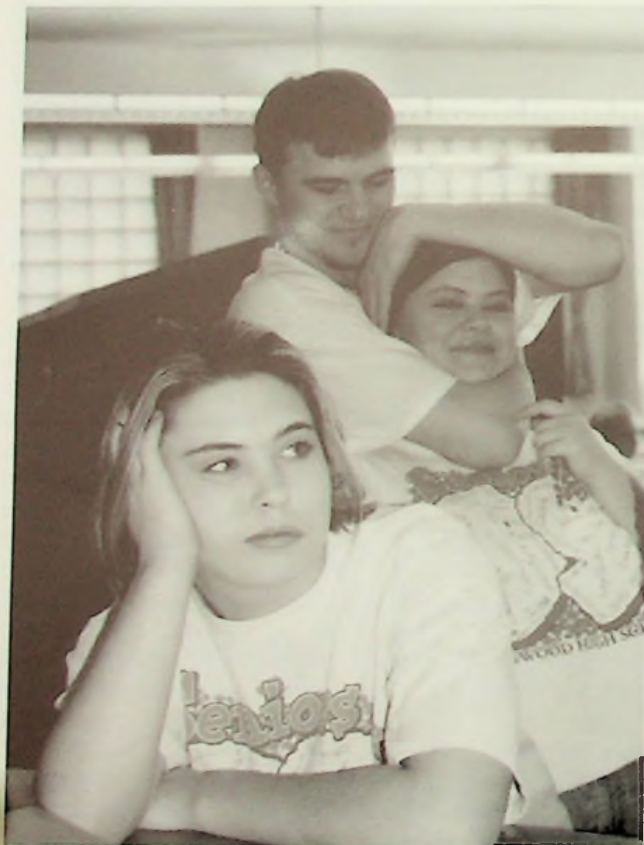


Class Prophecy

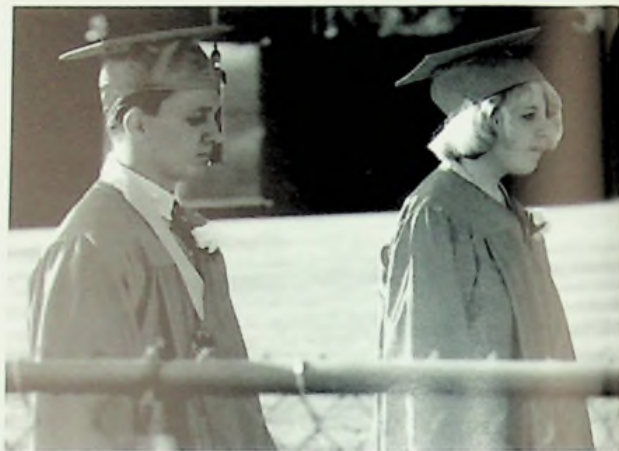

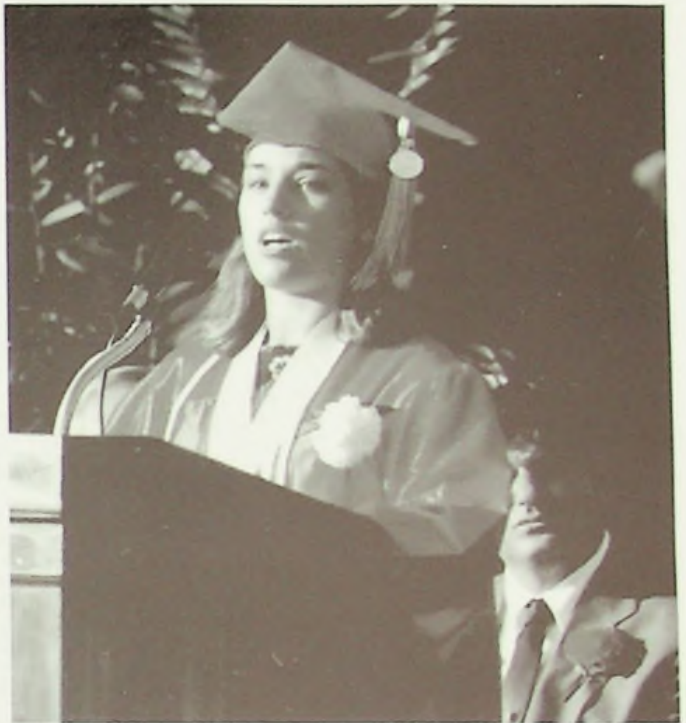

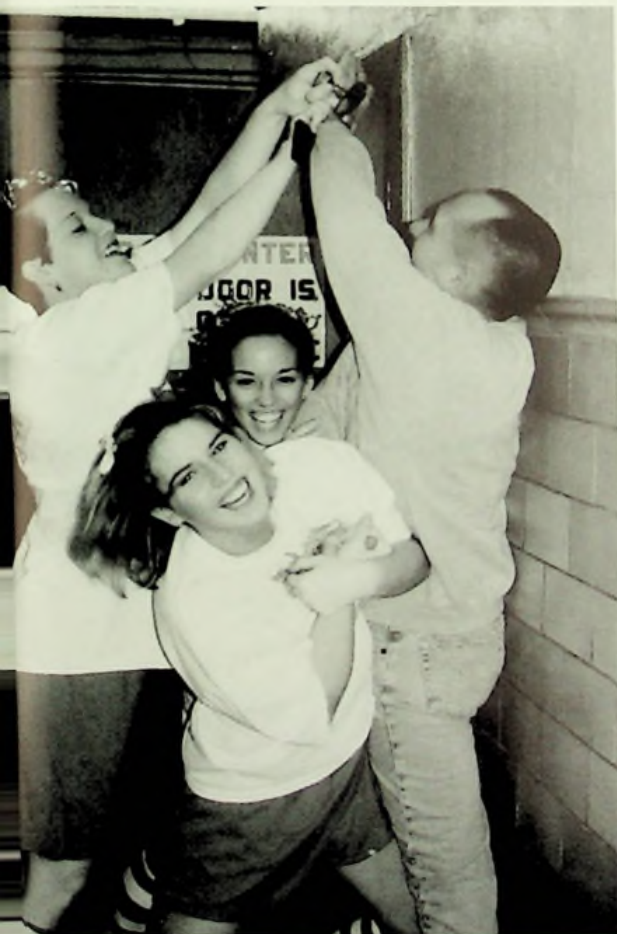

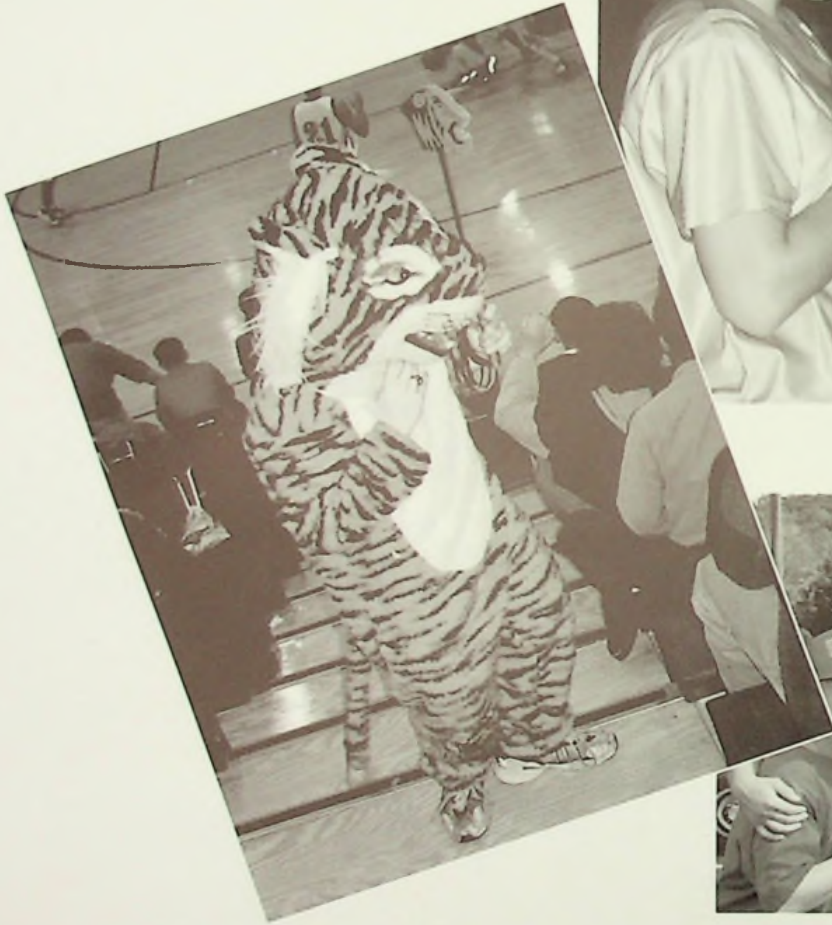
The Civil War era came to life for three members of the senior class. Abby Spears, Kara Whisman and David Page took part in the weekend activities of a Civil War reenactment called Thunder in the Ohio Valley. The forum, held in October, examined the role of this area in the war effort. David is an active member of the First Ohio Light Artillery, Battery L. The Sons of Union Veterans Camp Vienna #26 was established to preserve the memory of those soldiers who fought and died during the war. This local unit established an army encampment in Tracy Park. As part of the activities, Abby, Kara and David dressed in period costumes for a square dance. In the photo David holds the flag which he accepted for the 56th Ohio Volunteer Infantry. David has been involved with the organization since its inception in 1997. He asked Abby and Kara to join him for this event.

David was also involved in the Civil War mural on the flood wall in Portsmouth. Members of Battery L posed for photos for artist Robert Dafford. David's body or likeness appears in two places on the mural. In the background, he appears kneeling by an ammunition box. He is depicted as the soldier in the center of the mural. He is the figure with his back to the viewer who has just loaded the cannon and stepped back as the cannon is fired.

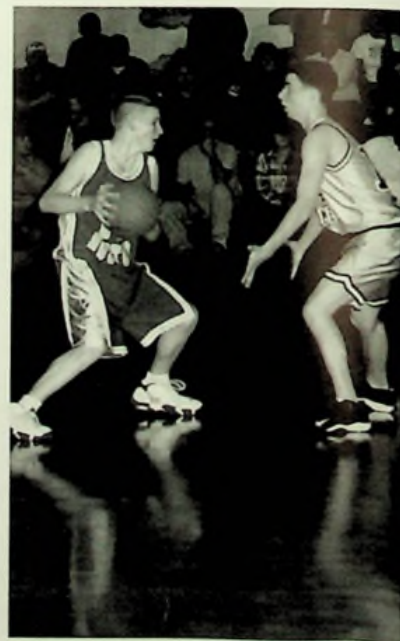

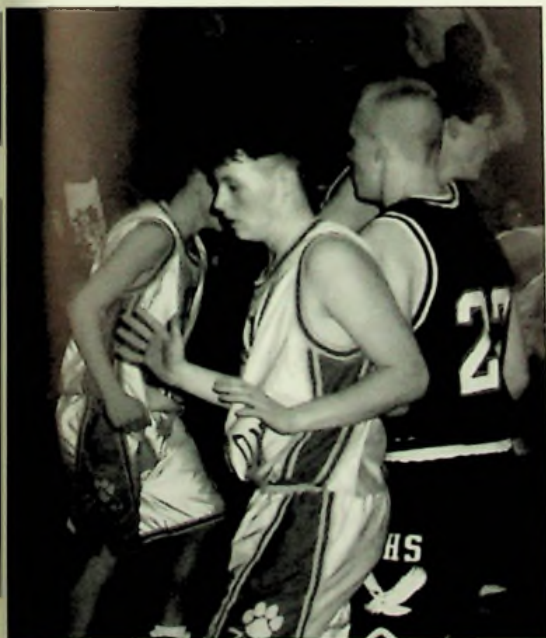

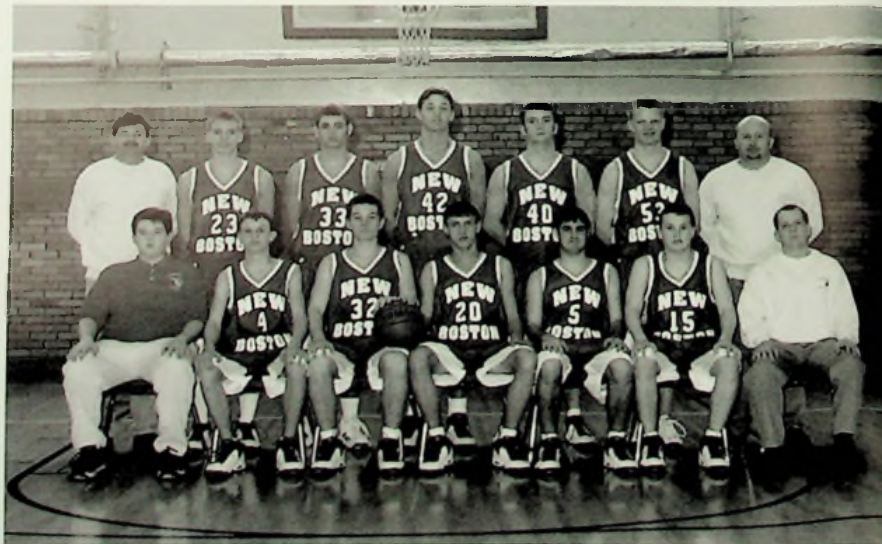

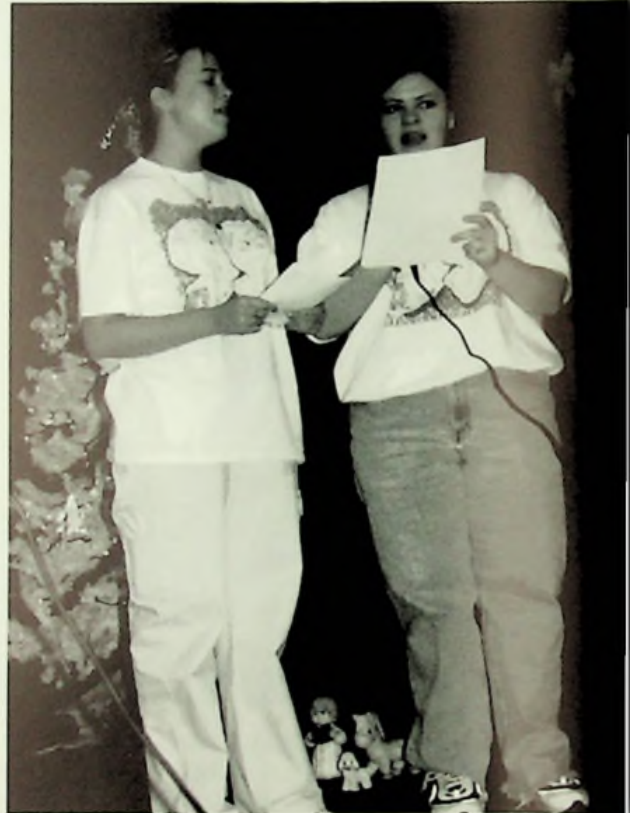
Christmas Chapel

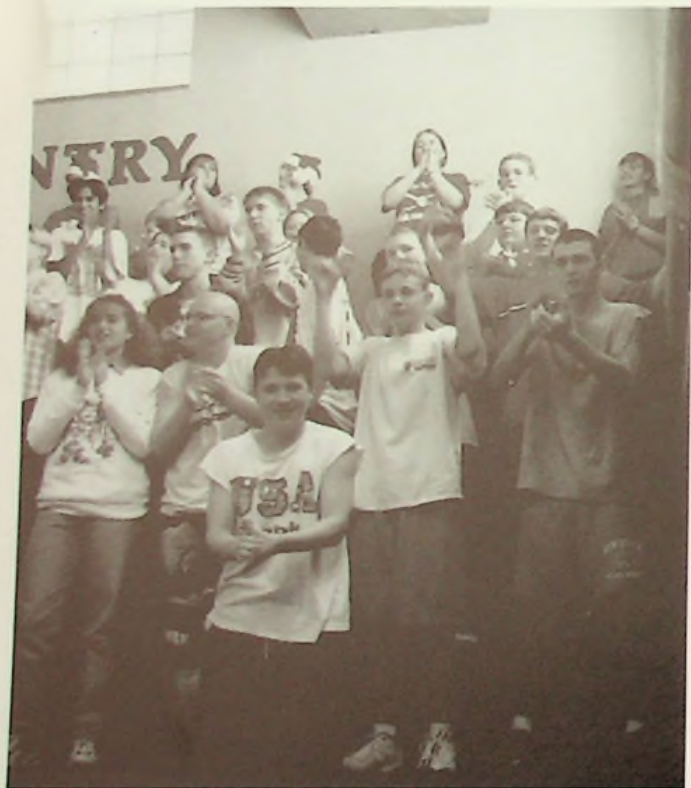

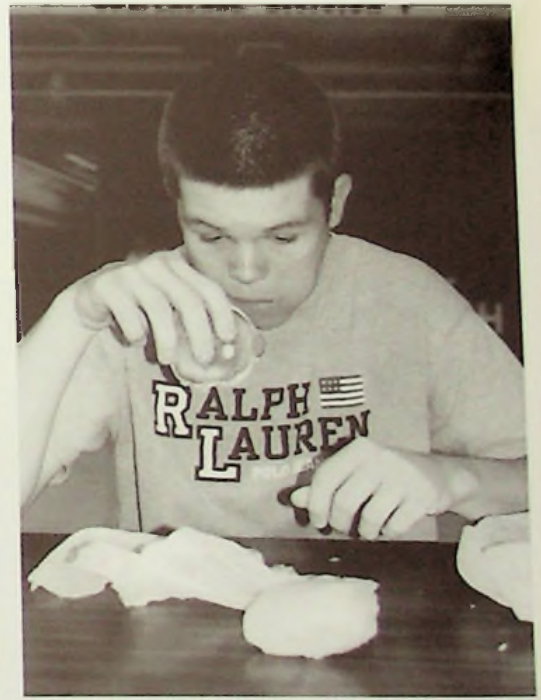

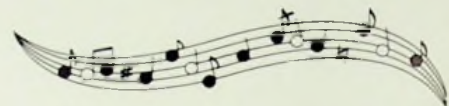

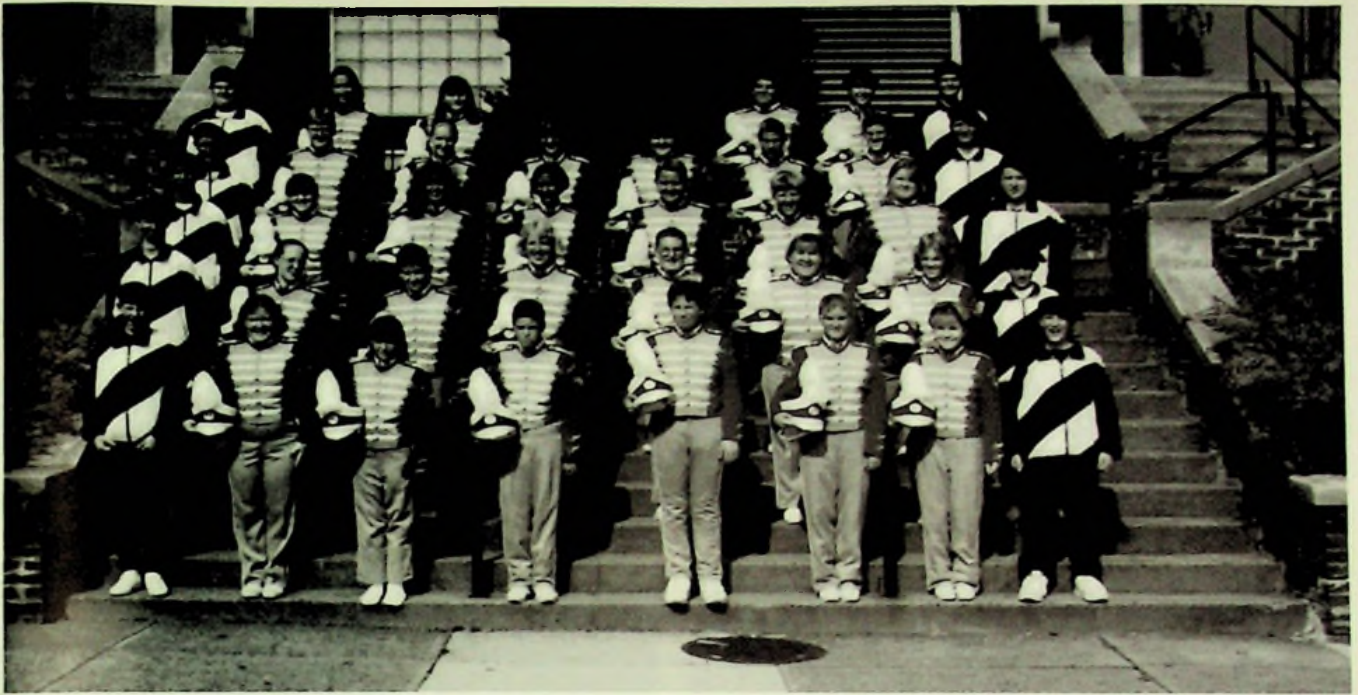

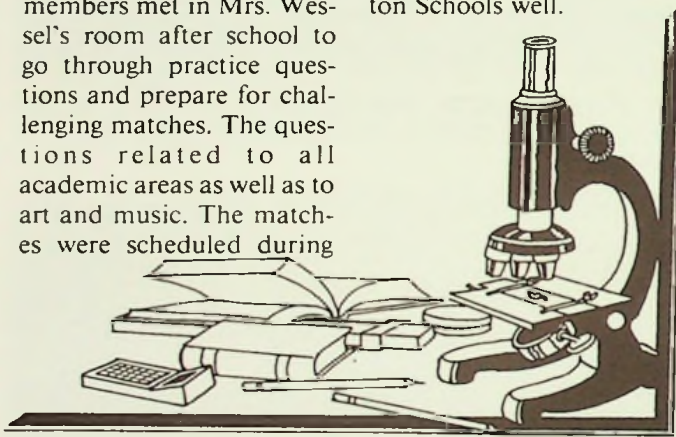

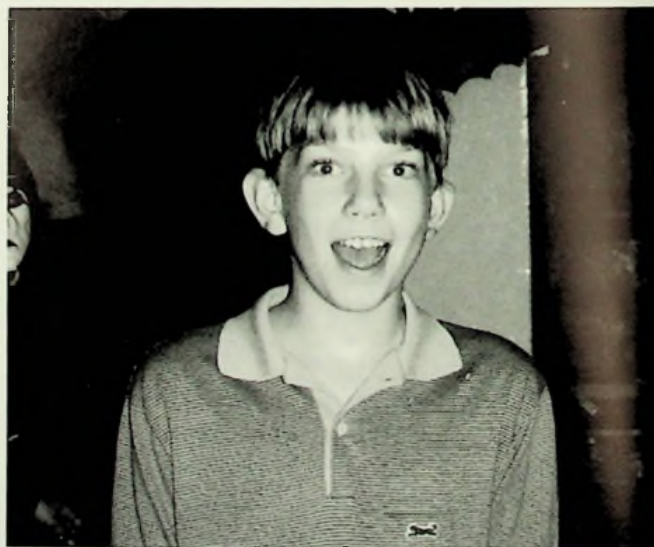

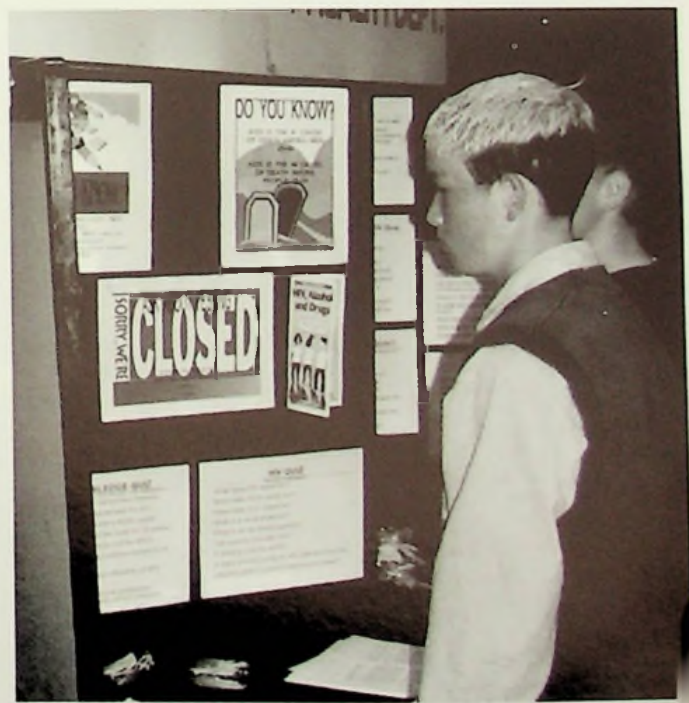

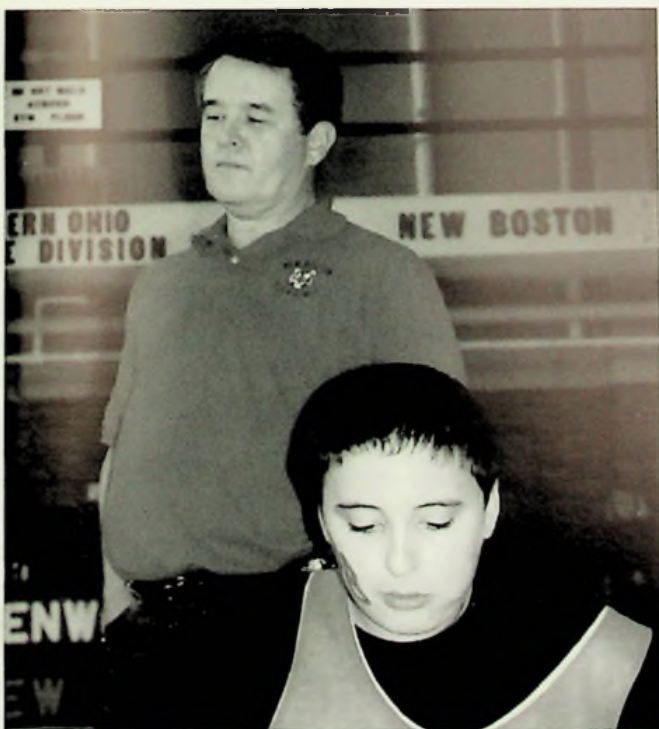
