## New Policy Sets Limits on Absences

In recent years poor attendance had been a major problem in the nation's school. In trying to correct this problem, Wheelersburg High School adopted a new attendance policy. A student cannot miss over twenty days for a full year course or ten days for a one semester course. If he does miss over this maximum, then the student must make up each day missed in excess of twenty days to receive credit for the course.
The main reason for this rule is that a student cannot learn if he does not attend school. A student who has had an extended illness may request to have his case
reviewed by an attendance committee. Approximately forty students had to return at the end of the regular academic year to make up days.

Results of this policy showed a definite improvement in average daily attendance. Students missed an average of 10.06 days this year as compared to an average of 16.4 days last year. This reflected an improvement in attendance from approximately $9.4 \%$ of the students absent per day last year to $5.7 \%$ absent this year.

## Learning Disability Center Established

This year a new learning disabilities program was instituted under the direction of Mrs. Crawford. This program is designed for students who have missed out on the basics used for learning more difficult subjects, or they have a more specific problem that prevents them from learning.
This class is different from most classes in that a student could be tutored in different subjects or could take required courses for credit toward graduation and possibly prepare for college. Since not all students have the same problem, there is a wide variety of teaching methods used to help each student progress at his or her own pace. Another major difference is that not only do students receive class instruction, but they learn to cope with everyday
instances. Also, if at any time the teacher felt a student has controlled or overcome their disability, he or she could re-enter the regular classroom.
Mrs. Crawford handled about 28 students a day but hoped to expand the program further. The main problem was the heavy amount of paperwork needed to get a student into the program.

## Educational T.V. Expands Curriculum

The audio-visual department received equipment to begin and maintain a new program this year. Two video-tape recorders and two televisions were purchased for classroom use. COE-TV produces educational programs through Ohio State University and make them available to schools in southern Ohio. Topics of these programs include American and English literature, history, science, art. and career and job exploration. A teacher could request that a
program be taped when it was aired and later have it replayed during any class that they wished.

Teachers found the shows to be useful in providing information to which they normally would not have access. The programs also provided some variety in methods of instructing students. Students enjoyed the break in the normal classroom routine to have experiences such as seeing a Shakespearean play or learning of the history of artists and their works.

 Six-two senior, Scott Gray, a four-year varsity team member, has been named to the first team All-State for the 1979-80 season. His accomplishment is a first for W.H.S. In addition to his high state ranking, he was named Division II Player of the Year in the Southeastern Ohio District and elected to the first team All-S.O.C. Due to his high placement, he has also been chosen to play in the Ohio allstar North-South game.Besides these achievements, he was named player of the week several times and was selected as a finalist in the McDonald's nation-

# East Gets Gas Rationing 

A shortage of gasoline, especially during the summer of 1979, forced some eastern states to begin the first odd-even gasoline rationing according to the date and license plate. This helped diminish the long lines that had formed by angry motorists even where gasoline had reached $\$ 1.39$ a gallon.
The Ohio Turnpike limited $\$ 6$ sales per customer. Other areas limited gasoline by either quantity of sale or, more frequently, by hours that the service stations pumped gasoline. Truckers, angry at the nonavailability and price of diesel fuel, blocked roads and went on strike causing farmers to dump their milk and watch their produce spoil.
The scarcity and price of fuel forced many Americans to take vacations closer to home and form more carpools.

## Movies, Songs, T.V.

Some of the most popular movies were The Jerk, Apocalypse Now, The Rose, Kramer versus Kramer, Coal Miner's Daughter, Norma Rae, Little Darlings, and American Gigolo.

Songs that teenagers enjoyed listening to included "Pop Musik" by M, "Still" and "Sail On" by the Commodores, "Do That to Me One More Time" by Captain and Tenille, "Crazy Little Thing Called Love" by Queen, "Another Brick in the Wall" by Pink Floyd, "Fire Lake" by Bob Seger, and "Theme from The Rose" by Bette Midler.
T.V. shows that attracted a lot of attention were Benson, The Associates, Knot's Landing, Real People, Dallas, and That's Incredible.

## Cubans Flee to U.S.

Beginning in May, Cuban refugees seeking to escape impoverishment, political repression, and Castro arrived in Key West, Florida, to shape new lives for themselves in the U.S. The influx forced the Florida governor to declare a state of emergency. Processing of the refugees is slowly taking place with over 100,000 Cuban refugees presently in the U.S. at the time of this writing. Castro, as a retaliatory move, emptied Cuba's prisons and mental institutions sending the unwanted individuals to the U.S.

## Young, Vance Resign Posts

In August, 1979, Andrew Young resigned as U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations. His resignation followed an uproar among U.S. and Israeli officials when it was learned that Young had met with an official of the Palestine Liberation Organization in violation of repeatedly stated U.S. policy, and then deliberately misled the Department of State about the meeting. The forbidden meeting came at a time when Israel was already concerned that the U.S. was reaching out to try to bring the P.L.O. into the Middle East peace process. The meeting was a great embarrassment to the then Secretary of State Cyrus Vance.

After the failure of the attempt to rescue the hostages in Iran, Cyrus Vance resigned as Secretary of State. Vance had opposed the mission before it was attempted and had written his resignation four days before the ill-fated venture. Senator Edmund Muskie was named to replace him.

# Olympics Held at Lake Placid 

The XIII Winter Olympic Games were held in Lake Placid, New York, with the results being mixed triumphs, surprises, and disappointments. Eric Heiden of the U.S. won an unprecedented five gold medals in speed skating in the $500,1000,1500,5000$, and 10,000 meter events losing none that he entered.
A tragic and touching moment came when the U.S. pair skaters, Randy Gardner and Tai Babylonia, were unable to compete due to a pulled muscle in Randy's thigh. The pair were the current world champions and were the best hope the U.S. had ever had for a gold medal in that event. It was decided that they should not compete when Randy fell repeatedly during the warm-ups.

Tre: mosi thrilling event of the Olyrupics came when the young underlog U.S. hockey team tied the svedes 2-2, beat the Czechs 7-3, and the Norwegians 5-1, upset the invincible U.S.S.R., and defeated the Finns 4-2 for a gold medal. Women's figure skater Linda Fratianne took the silver medal.

## Mexico Spill Reaches Texas

A hot undersea drill hit a volatile pocket of oil and gas in Mexico's Bay of Campeche. A relentless flow of uncontrollable crude has continued to boil to the surface creating a vast oil slick that reached the Texas shoreline polluting beaches and killing sea life. The blow-out implies a major oil find by Pemex, the Mexican State oil company.

## "The Duke" Dead at 72

On June 12, 1979, Americans lost one of the most well-known and best-loved movie heroes of all times. John Wayne, "The Duke," succumbed to cancer after a courageous fight. He had once before licked "the big C" in 1964.

Born Marion Michael Morrison in 1907, Wayne played American heroes in more than 200 films. His parts were always masculine roles of ten as a fearless and determined soldier, lawman, or rancher who was out to create order where formerly there was none.

As a measure of Wayne's immense popularity and almost legendary stature, Congress, one month priot to his death, had a gold medal struck in his honor. He was the 84th recipient of the medal of honor. Wayne's last public appearance was on April 9 at the Academy Awards where he received an ovation.

## Russia Invades Afghanistan

In January the Soviets invaded Afghanistan. To show that the U.S. strongly disapproved of such military occupation, President Carter ordered all contracts for shipment of grain to Russia be cancelled, an embargo placed on technical equipment, and Russian fishing in American waters be severely curtailed.

When a deadline for withdrawal of the Soviets from Afghanistan was not met, the U.S. boycotted the summer olympics held in Moscow. Some other countries joined the boycott. Despite this and condemnation by the U.N. Security Council, the Russian forces remain in Afghanistan at Iran's back door.

# U.S. Volcano Awakens 

On May 25, Washington State's Mount St. Helens blew the entire top of the mountain in a volcanic explosion of a force of nearly 500 times the Hiroshima atomic bomb. Clouds of hot ash belched 12 miles into the sky as gigantic mud slides rushed down the slopes knocking down trees.

The eruption blew down 150 sq. mi . of timber worth about $\$ 200$ million and caused an estimated $\$ 222$ million in damage to crops. Logs jammed rivers, mud choked Portland harbor and destroyed homes, and thick layers of ash fell on eastern Washington covering plants, clogging streets and cars, and shortcircuiting electric generators. Toutle River and Spirit Lake were destroyed by the eruption. Deaths were estimated at 71 . The last time Mount St. Helens erupted was in 1857.

## Gold Prices Skyrocket

On a single day, gold climbed $\$ 74.50$ per oz. or more than twice the total value in 1971. During the week of Jan. 7 it climbed $\$ 148$ to hit $\$ 660$ per ounce. Other precious metals such as silver, titanium, platinum and copper followed the trend in rising prices.

## F.B.I. Stings Congress

In an investigation that took 23 months, cost $\$ 800,000$, and involved about 100 agents, the FBI recorded on audio and video tape transactions made betwëen disguised FBI agents and lawmakers.

Dubbed Abscam, for Arab Scam, the main site of the scandal was a rented expensive two-story colonial brick house in a fashionable area of Washington, D.C. The house was renovated for some $\$ 25,000$ and furnished with antiques from the Smithsonian Institution. One agent dressed up in a burnoose and posed as a sheik who was interested in investing money in New Jersey gambling casinos, East Coast port facilities, and an American titanium mine. The phony sheik sought to protect his investments by buying political influence in Congress. Other agents posed as the sheik's American emissaries, translating the Arabic-sounding commands.
Another phony sheik was created who claimed that one day he might have to flee his home country and seek asylum in the U.S. The asylum could be provided if a member of Congress would introduce a private bill granting him special status to bypass normal immigration procedures. The sheik would generously reward any legislator willing to sponsor such legislation. A number of officials showed up at different times to get in on the hand-out of money in return for favors shown the sheiks.

When the FBI sting ended, its supervisors alleged that the honey pot of Arab money had attracted one U.S. senator, seven members of the House and two dozen state and local officials - all facing possible charges of accepting bribes or being caught in an illegal conflict of interest.

# Master of Suspense Dies 

Alfred Hitchcock, the "master of suspense," died at the age of 81 . He had directed 53 films and hosted a television show of funny-scary stories. Some of his best-known films were Psycho, The Birds, and North By Northwest.

Hitchoock was the greatest handler of film that ever lived. He believed that acting did not really count in movies but concentrated on photography and editing in his films to build suspense. The audience is presented with scary facts and events that are hidden from the protagonist's point of view.

At the beginning and conclusion of his television show Alfred Hitchcock Presents the solemn-faced stately man made ghoulish observations and puns about the evening's tale in a sepulchral voice. The conclusion of the story usually left the audience in suspense as to the outcome of events.
He became the only director whose name about the title did much more for the promotion of the production than almost any star he could hire. Born in England, he had moved to Hollywood at the age of 40 and later became a U.S. citizen. However, Queen Elizabeth knighted him in 1980.

## Skylab Has Fiery Splatdown

Following much anticipation as to the location and time of its breakup, the largest machine that man has ever put into space crashed to the earth in a shower of burning debris. The American Skylab vehicle, nine stores tall and weighing 77.5 tons, lit up the sky over Perth, Australia, with hundreds of shining flashes as its 500 some fragments crashed to the earth in a sparsely populated area of Australia. The crash did no harm to human or animal life.

Prior to the fall Americans made a joke of the impending crash by displaying gimmicks such as T -shirts bearing a bull's-eye and proclamation of an official Skylab target. The San Francisco Examiner offered $\$ 10,000$ for the first piece of Skylab (which an Australian man collected), survival kits containing plastic helmets sold well, and numerous office lotteries were held on the time and location of splatdown.

## Iran Holds American Hostages

In November, students invoking the name of Iran's Ayatollah Rubollah Khomeini invaded the U.S. embassy in Iran, overwhelmed its Marine Corps guards and took 62 Americans as hostages. Crowds of Iranians surrounded the embassy crying "Death to America," "Death to Carter." They demanded the return of the deposed Shah of Iran, who was under treatment in the U.S. for cancer, in return for the hostages.

The request for the Shah's return was denied and President Carter countered with economic reprisals of stopping all purchases of Iranian oil $(700,000 \mathrm{bbl}$. per day or $4 \%$ of U.S. consumption) and freezing all Iranian government assets in the U.S. There was talk of cutting off the flow of nearly $\$ 500$ million worth of food that is shipped to Iran annually and deportation of 50,000 Iranian students in the U.S. but neither action was taken. Meanwhile anger grew among the American citizens over the taking of the hostages. Khomeini declared that the hostages would be tried as spies. Approximately two weeks after the take-
over, five white women and eight black men were released.

In Saudi Arabia, a band of extreme religious zealots seized the Sacred Mosque in Mecca. In Pakistan, a mob enraged by reports that the U.S. had inspired the attack set fire to the U.S. embassy gutting it and killing two Americans.

In December, the Shah, whose presence in the U.S. triggered the crisis, left the United States for Panama. The Iranians said that this move made no difference in the plight of the hostages. Neither did the imposing of diplomatic and economic sanctions against Iran including the expulsion of 35 Iranian diplomats from the United States.

An attempt to rescue the hostages in a secret mission had to be aborted when three of the eight helicopters assigned to the mission developed electrical or hydraulic malfunctions that rendered them useless. Eight American military air crewmen died in the Dasht-e-Kivir, Iran's Great Salt Desert, when one helicopter on take-off crashed into a C-130 transport.

## Presidential Race Is On

The presidential campaign began in 1979 with a number of candidates at the starting line. The Democrats were offered Jimmy Carter and Edward (Ted) Kennedy for the primaries while the Republicans had a wider choice of Ronald Reagan, Howard Baker, George Bush, John Anderson, and John Connally.

By June a battle had developed between Carter and Kennedy with Carter winning more than enough delegates in the primaries to be nominated at the convention. Kennedy refused to withdraw from the race but set about the task of persuading uncommitted and doubiful Carter delegates to join his camp. Reagan remained the only candidate in the Republican party when the last contender, George Bush, withdrew in favor of Reagan. Anderson, unpopular with the Republicans, was seeking to run on an independent ticket.

## Eleven Perish At Concert

In December, thousands of kids holding unreserved tickets to a "Who" concert at Riverfront Coliseum in Cincinnati charged across a concrete plaza toward two unlocked entrances. Eleven people were killed by suffocation when they had fallen in the crowd. Eight others were injured by the rushing stampede. The cause of the tragedy was attributed to the festival seating (first come - best seat) and the doors not being opened by 7:20 for the 8:00 performance of the rock group.

# Cambodians' Plight Critical 

The U.S. government, International Red Cross, UNICEF, and other countries and agencies shipped food and medical supplies to people starving in Cambodia. The country from which people are leaving to take refuge in Thailand was a base for the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese and the target of U.S. bombings. People dying from malnutrition, tuberculosis, dysentery, and malaria were a common sight in the refugee camps in Cambodia.

## America Welcomes Pope John Paul II

In October, Americans of all religious faiths joined together to welcome Pope John Paul II as he made an historic seven-day journey of joy through the U.S. Crowds of up to one million-plus gathered where the Pope celebrated Mass and heard him speak on human rights and freedom. Pope John Paul showed himself to be an incadescent leader that inspired confidence in the basic goodness of humanity. Nineteen thousand youths at Madison Square Garden cheered him for nine minutes. People everywhere felt genuinely touched by the warmth shown to individuals and the crowds.

To Catholics he reiterated the traditional conservative restrictions made by the centuries-old Church by condemning birth control, divorce, abortion, extramarital sex, and homosexuality and by denying marriage among priests and the priesthood to women and married males.

ALEXANDER GODUNOV - Soviet Ballet Star Alexander Godunov defected to the U.S. while the Russian ballet Bolshoi was in New York. His wife, Ludmila Vlasova, returned to Moscow.

DAVID JANSSEN - An actor most noted for the T.V. series The Fugitive died of a heart attack.

STEEL MILL - Cyclops Corporation announced that the Empire-Detroit Steel Mill in New Boston would close by June Ist. Buyers for the mill are being sought.

MORTGAGE RATES - Mortgage rates for houses reached $17 \%$ making home ownership more difficult and decreasing construction.

MOTHER TERESA - Mother Teresa of Calcutta, a 69 -year-old Roman Catholic nun, was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Mother Teresa works among the "poorest of the poor" in the slums of Calcutta, India, and will use her $\$ 190,000$ monetary award to build more hospices for the lepers.

BISHOP SHEEN - Bishop Sheen, noted for his religious programming on television died at the age of 84 .

GEORGE MEANY - President of the AFL-CIO for 24 years, George Meany died in January of cardiac arrest at the age of 85 .

INDIRA GHANDI - Mrs. Indira Ghandi returned to power as Prime Minister of India by a landslide election.

GENUINE RISK - A filly, Genuine Rish, won the Kentucky Derby for the first time since 1915.

JOE HIBBITTS - An outstanding business and community leader in Wheelersburg, Joe Hibbitts died of a heart attack. He was a dedicated patron and loyal fan of WHS who maintained an interest in all aspects of the school. He served as master of ceremonies for athletic banquets and announced the team at basketball games. Always ready with a smile. friendly teasing, and a word of encouragement, he will be missed by the community and school.

SUNSHINE SKYWAY - A Liberianregistered freighter crashed into the Sunshine Skyway Bridge in Florida breaking the span and killing about 40 people.
