The team outscored the other thirteen teams at the annual Wheelersburg Invitational. When the SOC competition rolled around, the team came together with a new sense of determination and focus. All their hard work paid off as they outscored their nearest opponent by over 40 points.
Several individual team members received special recognition or awards. Chris Slusher earned First Team All-SOC in the 300 hurdles. Steve Johnson was named First Team All-SOC in the high jump and Second Team All-SOC in both the 110 hurdles and the 200 meter dash. Jason Schmidt was also named Second Team All-SOC in the 800 meter run. The 1600 meter relay team received First Team All-SOC, while the 3200 meter relay team made Second Team.

In regional competition, Chris Slusher placed fourth in the 300 meter hurdles to earn him an invitation to compete at the state level. With several runners doing a terrific job this year, the team looks forward to continuing its tradition of excellence next year.
